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PLANS FOR GAY GAMES II FORGE AHEAD

powerlifting, racquetball, soccer, softball, swimming and wrestling are the sports scheduled for Gay Games II.

Competition in both men's and women's groups will be held for all sports except wrestling, which will be for men only. At the first games in 1982, 40 percent of the participants were women. Next year, it is expected that the number of participants will be approximately equally divided among women and men.

Sports have grown tremendously in the Gay community in the last five years, according to Shawn Kelly, executive director for the games. "We consider participation in sports to be one of the most positive responses we can make to the crisis of AIDS, individually and collectively. Sports not only promotes individual physical fitness, but also provides a healthy way to bring us all together. Gay Games II provides a healthy event both for individuals and our community as a whole," Kelly said. "We hope the games will encourage even more people to become involved in sports."

The games' sports committee, chaired by Sara Lewinstein and Hal Herkenhoff, expect more than 5,000 participants for Gay Games II, compared with 1,300 in 1982. Tens of thousands of spectators from the San Francisco Bay Area and around the world are expected to witness the

SAN FRANCISCO, CA - Plans for Gay Games II, which are held in San Francisco next year, have been finalized. The sports entry procedures and rules and regulations have been announced by San Francisco Arts & Athletics, producers of Gay Games II.

The games, under the theme, "Triumph in '86," are scheduled for August 9-17, 1986. A cultural week is planned in conjunction with the games. Seventeen individual and team sports will be featured at the games. There are no minimum standards necessary to enter the games — those at all levels of ability are encouraged to participate.

NO POLYGRAPH FOR POLICEMAN

The court said the questions are not "related specifically and narrowly to the plaintiff's official duties," and that the officer was "justified in refusing to take a polygraph examination which included those questions."

GREAT OUTDOORS SPONSORS WILDERNESS TRAINING SEMINAR

TUCSON - The Tucson chapter of Great Outdoors is sponsoring a three-weekend Wilderness Training Seminar, providing a brief, but well-rounded educational program to be taught by Mac McGarrity from the San Diego chapter of GO.

January 18 and 19 will be "classroom" teaching. On Jan. 25 and 26 training will continue with a car-camp near Superstition Mountain. For those who do not know, car-camp is an outing where you literally can drive to the campsite. You can pitch a tent, sleep in an RV or anything else that you may be comfortable doing. From the campsite, there will be short hikes for "hands-on" training.

Finally, Feb. 25 and 26, GO will conclude the Wilderness Training Seminar with a backpack into another part of the Superstition Wilderness area.

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IT'S NOT THAT AIR FORCE MEN WEAR EARRINGS

RAMSTEIN, WEST GERMANY (GON) - The European headquarters of the U.S. Air Force has forbidden men from wearing earrings on base even when they are off duty, according to the New York Times. Lt. Colonel William Johnson, who announced the policy, asserted, however, that very few Air Force men actually wear the offending earrings. "It's not really a big problem," he insisted.

Johnson also said a longstanding Air Force rule in Europe forbids men to wear earrings while in uniform. The new policy extends the rule to men on base in civilian clothing. "The wearing of earrings is not consistent with a military image," said Johnson.

WILL THE REAL DAILY NEBRASKAN PLEASE STAND UP

LINCOLN, NE (GON) - Two University of Nebraska-Lincoln students have filed suit against the Daily Nebraskan because the student paper refused to identify them as a Lesbian and Gay man in classified advertising.

Pam Pearn and Michael Sinn, the students, say the paper's advertising policy, which forbids discrimination on the basis of "sex or sexual orientation," is being used to bar ads from Gay men and Lesbians looking for homosexual roommates.

The suit is supported by the Nebraska Civil Liberties Union and claims that Pearn and Sinn "suffer irreparable harm in being denied access to a public forum and to free expression as guaranteed by the First and Fourteenth Amendments to the U.S. Constitution."

Ironically, the same Daily Nebraskan was recently accused of being "staffed by homosexuals, Communists, Democrats and other liberal hooligans" in an October 15 letter to the paper from student George Rankin. Rankin denounced the paper for exposing the fact that the university's basketball team held practice before the time college teams are officially allowed to do so, apparently blaming the coverage on homosexuals, et al. His letter concluded: "Fine reporters of the (Daily Nebraskan). While the rest of us are sitting around with nothing to do, you go to your fashion shows, your charity teas and those 'art films'...live it up now, because soon AIDS will get you all. Every one of you."

GAY LIBRARY TO CORNELL UNIVERSITY

PASADENA, CA - The Mariposa Education and Research Foundation will donate its large collection of library and archival material concerning human sexuality in general and homosexuality and Lesbianism in particular to Cornell University.

Foundation President Dr. Bruce Voeller made the announcement, saying that the late David Goodstein, publisher of The Advocate who died June 22, a long-time supporter of the foundation, had urged that Cornell, his alma mater, receive the collection.

The university has accepted the gift with the condition, in keeping with customary university policy, that an endowment fund be raised for maintenance of the collection and for building upon it. That fund has been placed at \$2 million.

Under terms of Goodstein's will, his half of an art collection owned jointly by him and his brother, Edward, will be sold, and the proceeds applied to that endowment fund. Art experts estimate that this will produce about \$1 million. The university and Voeller will seek to raise the remainder.

GUEST EDITORIAL

Last Sunday, Dec. 8, the Arizona Daily Star featured an editorial titled "AIDS Won't Wait - Sacrificing Education Programs to Narrow Mortality is Deadly." Because of its interest to the Gay community of Tucson, we present the entire editorial here:

"Narrow beliefs about mortality have no place in the protection of public health.

The federal Centers for Disease Control have placed eight proposals for AIDS educational projects "on hold" for fear that some people, particularly those who live and work at 1600 Pennsylvania Ave. in Washington, might find them offensive.

Chances are the president and his sensitive associates will never see any of the printed and audio-visual materials proposed for the eight projects because they do not belong to "high risk" groups.

Those who do will not be shocked. They will, the CDC hopes, be enlightened enough to avoid the practices that spread acquired immune deficiency syndrome.

AIDS destroys the body's immune system, making it subject to attack by serious infections. The patient dies within 18 months after being diagnosed as an AIDS sufferer. AIDS is transmitted through the exchange of bodily fluids such as blood and semen, and through the sharing of unsterilized hypodermic needles. Those at highest risk include male homosexuals and bisexuals, intravenous drug users and their steady sexual partners of either sex.

As of Dec. 1, 1985, 15172 cases

were on record and 7,777 deaths had been reported.

The Reagan administration is known to oppose any government talk about s-e-x, including general education on the subject. Sex came out of most of the nation's closets many years ago, and the mortality rate from sexually transmitted diseases practically disappeared.

The unwritten fear in the CDC decision is that the projects might look to some in Congress and the administration like government acceptance of homosexual behavior.

However, one can't prevent the spread of a disease when one doesn't know its symptoms or by what specific acts it is spread.

The goal of the proposed AIDS education programs is not to "promote" homosexuality or to burden consenting adults with guilt for expressing their emotions. It is not meant to suggest that homosexual and bisexual people return to lonely, deceptive lives. These are not government's functions.

The goal is to teach high-risk people how to express emotion and experience erotic satisfaction without spreading disease. It is the same goal that tons of government-financed information on venereal diseases promotes. It is a legitimate government goal.

AIDS cannot wait. There is no vaccine yet. There is no cure. Further delays in distributing preventive information will cost lives. Protection of narrow moral sensitivities is not worth that sacrifice.

Man with AIDS antibody accused of spitting on cops with intent to kill

FLINT, MICH. (AP) - A man with the AIDS antibody was released after prosecutors charged him with assault with intent to murder for allegedly spitting on four police officers after threatening to spread the fatal disease to them, authorities said.

Two doctors consulted by authorities before the felony warrant was issued against John Richards, 28, of Davison, Michigan, said they doubted the AIDS could be transmitted through saliva. Dr. Willis Weller, Genesee County medical examiner, said he told police Sgt. Michael Ahearn "that AIDS is transmitted from blood and intimate contact. I told him I didn't think his people were at risk."

"I don't see how they're going to make that (charge) stick," said Dr. Dennis Lloyd, the county jail physician. Lloyd, who examined Richards when the man was taken to jail in November, said Richards' personal physician told him that Richards had the AIDS antibody. He did not say why Richards was in jail then.

The presence of AIDS antibodies means a person has been exposed to the AIDS virus. It does not mean the person has AIDS. Approximately 10 percent of those with a positive test will develop AIDS.

Richards was freed on \$10,000 bond. "He's pretty despondent," said Wilson, who drove Richards home after his release from a jail isolation cell. "He thought this whole thing was an overreaction." If convicted, Richards could face life in prison, the sheriff said.

Flint police called to a traffic accident on Friday, Dec. 6, said they were confronted by Richards, who allegedly spat on four officers. "When police arrived, he started spitting on everybody, indicating he had AIDS and he was going to kill everybody around," said county Prosecutor Robert Weiss.

It was unclear how Richards was exposed to the virus, which can be transmitted by sexual contact, the sharing of contaminated needles by intravenous drug abusers, transfusions of contaminated blood or blood products, or infection from mother to child before or around the time of birth. Acquired immune deficiency syndrome destroys the body's ability to fight potentially fatal diseases.

Wilson said Richards, an autoworker, told the Flint-Journal that he contracted AIDS from a girlfriend who caught it after receiving a contaminated blood transfusion. But the sheriff said that according to interviews and

examinations Richards had with county doctors, he contracted AIDS from dirty needles.

"If this case goes through the courts it will be quite a precedent," Wilson said. "But he's (Richards) not too happy. He said he thought it was all ridiculous. It's unusual, to say the least, but I can understand the officers' reaction when someone says he has AIDS and spits in their faces. There's just so much unknown about this disease."

One hundred AIDS cases in Michigan had been reported from 1981 through Nov. 13. Fifty-one of those people have died, according to the Michigan Department of Public Health. As of Nov. 18, AIDS had struck 14,862 people in the United States and claimed 7,628 lives since 1979. The Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta began keeping track on June 1, 1981 and traced cases back to 1979.

N.J. AIDS bill seeks lists of adult bookstore clients

TRENTON, NJ - Anxious to slow the spread of AIDS, Assemblyman Thomas Paterniti, has introduced a bill that would require adult bookstore owners in New Jersey to keep a list of their customers.

"It has been reported that homosexual activity has taken place at adult bookstores," Paterniti said in a statement outlining one step he would like the state to take in combating the spread of acquired immune deficiency syndrome. "Since AIDS is a fatal disease that is primarily spread through sexual contact," he said, "some effort must be made to curb irresponsible sexual activity."

Under Paterniti's legislation, the state Department of Health would license stores selling sexually explicit material. The legislation would require every adult bookstore to record the name, address, Social Security number or driver's license number of its patrons. Owners also would have to collect the same data on people who enter the stores but make no purchases.

The measure would require every adult bookstore to maintain a registry of its patrons for at least a year and to make customer lists available to state health officials.

In Newark, Jeffrey Fogel, executive director of the American Civil Liberties Union of New Jersey, said the bill - and particularly its registry provision - would violate the First Amendment which protects a person's right to buy books and

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GRAY and GAY - It's OK To Get Old

"Can researchers believe that homosexuals self-destruct at the age of forty?" asks Raymond M. Berger, author of "Gay and Gray: The Older Homosexual Man". When the older Gay man is not totally overlooked by the Gay, straight and gerontological communities, he is seen only in terms of the very familiar stereotypes - he is effeminate, fastidious, desperately lonely and prone to preying on young boys. Berger has looked at these stereotypes and the reasons for their persistence. The in-depth interviews with older Gay men in this book do much to discredit the stereotypes. The following is an excerpt from an interview with Matthew, aged 72.:

(Matthew greeted the interviewer at the door of his modest but comfortable home. The neighborhood has long since become "dangerous", but, in his characteristic way, Matthew was determined to remain in this place in which he had invested so much effort and love. The Persian rugs, overstuffed chairs, and antique furniture lent a warm feeling... With his slight drawl and genteel manner, Matthew was the picture of a southern gentleman. There was an air of calmly achieved success about him. The interviewer could not help but think, "What a lovely grandfather this man would make."

"By the time I was in high school I knew I was attracted to other boys, but I had no idea there was anyone else like me. This was in the early 1920's in a small Georgia town, and boys were expected to date girls, so I did. Dating a girl meant nothing more than having the companionship of someone for the prom, dinner parties, or the like. I always thought girls were pretty and led charming lives - I envied them. I was fascinated by their clothes and jewelry and their freedom to have all the things boys were not allowed to have.

"When I was little, father would indulge me with the sorts of things that were considered appropriate only for girls. In retrospect, I understand why he did this. He bought me a dollhouse the size of a small room. It was a wonderful thing. I'm sure I was the only boy in Georgia who had a two-story dollhouse. When father died, my uncle wouldn't hear of allowing me to keep it. The only thing I have left is a little tea set that was inadvertently packed along with the china instead of with the toys that was saved for me.

"I had sought help from two ministers; men who I was taught to believe were sources of wisdom and understanding. One man double-crossed me, and the other totally rejected me. Where was I to turn? I had to make my own decision without any help whatsoever. Rather than turn to the churches again, I came to believe that I was born like everybody else and that my life, too, had come from God. If he had not wanted me to love other men, He would not have made me this way. This became a personal creed that I carried inside me wherever I went...

"The men I have known between the ages of thirty and fifty are much more conscious of the age difference. They are simply not open to the idea of a sexual relationship with a man in his seventies. After the age of fifty, there is sort of camaraderie. The thought is "you're in my same age bracket, you've got the same problems I have, and the same urges I have. So, let's see what we can do about it..."

"The best thing about growing older is all the special privileges

you get. Instead of being blamed, you are excused. You are offered the front seat of the car because it is easier than squeezing into the back seat - little things like that. Another advantage of age is that all the things that mattered so much when you were young don't seem so important now. You are upset less easily.

"There is no difference between heterosexuals and homosexuals in adjusting to aging. It doesn't matter what your sex life has been like, everyone has to accept that we have no choice but to grow old. The process is much easier if you accept it. I think lying to yourself and to your friends about your age is about the most horrible thing people do. I think it is tragic to try to look and act fifty years younger than you are. You're clumsy at it; You can't do it. If it's time to go to bed, do it! And if you don't feel well today, admit you don't feel well and would rather not do something. Don't go out there and be miserable; it will show on your face and in your actions.

"I have never understood why people hesitate to tell their age. Everyone who is younger than I am is looking forward to reaching my age. Living to the age of seventy-two and having done it well is an accomplishment."

MARINE OF THE YEAR IS GAY AND WANTS TO BE HIMSELF

SAN DIEGO, CA - The 1984 Marine of the Year in Los Angeles admits that he is gay and has had enough of life in the military closet, but the Marine Corps, so far, is saying he's good enough man for them and they are not going to discharge him. He is currently being counseled by Chris Bradley, a military counselor at the Lesbian and Gay men's Community Center in San Diego.

Sgt. Rolf Lindblom, a 25-year-old computer programmer-instructor at the Marine Corps Training Center in Chavez Ravine near Los Angeles, says he is gay and wants to become active in gay causes. However, under Marine regulations he fears he might be subject to disciplinary action if he did so.

Last July, Lindblom thought he could solve his problem simply by admitting to his commanding officer that he was gay. That, however, was not enough. "What they are asking is for me to make official statements that I have practiced homosexuality and committed sodomy," Lindblom told the Los Angeles Herald. "If I were to make these statements, they could court martial me and destroy the character of my discharge."

"There will be a congressional inquiry. It will regard the necessity of acts being proven in order to be defined as a homosexual," said Bradley. He has been contacted by the major media.

Major Bill Wood, public affairs officer for the Fourth Marine Division, insisted that the Marines can't discharge someone simply because they say they are gay: "That would be a very easy way to back out of a military contract."

However, according to Jim Woodward, a military counselor at San Diego's Lesbian and Gay Men's Community Center, Marine regulations,

COUNSELING CONCEPTS

FRUSTRATION

Have you ever been frustrated? Have things not gone your way? It happens to all of us. No one is an exception. You'll find that usually frustration takes place when you have no or very little control of the situation. One way of reducing one's frustration or the chance of it is to put yourself in situations where you have more control. That is not always possible. Look at your work situation. This is a major source of frustration for most people. Think about the number of people that it involves. Now, ask yourself how the operation is affected if one person doesn't do their job. Not too much problem. How about 2 or 3? The more people that don't come through with their particular portion of the operation affects everyone to an increasing degree. If a person doesn't care about doing their job well, then you can flow with the status quo and say, "screw it". But, if you are interested in doing your job well then you do have a problem. One can cover for another only for so long. In the meantime it continues to produce more and more anxiety, hence frustration.

hold up their end of the work load. There are a lot of good working teams of persons who work together to help the weak link and that person works at it too. Teams like this compensate for each other and do a tremendous job.

If there is no success, then it is watch-out-for-yourself time. Make sure you are beyond blame. The problem with this forced-into approach is that it means you are coping with the frustration for a longer period of time until the weak cog is found and dealt with. If you know the problem and have confronted the person(s) to no avail, then your only other course of action is to see to it that the problem is discovered by others higher up. Authority and/or the need to impress the boss can spur another on. The hardest thing to do is to accept the fact that things are not changing or will not at the pace you want them to. When a person comes to grips with that then a portion of the frustration is removed.

In other words, do your job well and make sure you have some documentation of it. The last thing you want to have happen is for some incompetent person to take you down with them. It would be nice in a situation like this to go and talk to the boss. The problem here that ratting on someone isn't looked upon favorably by any side. So what do you do? Go to the source of the problem. Confront the person(s) that is responsible for the situation that is causing you and probably others so much grief. See if you can't help the person to work things out so they can

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
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

WILLS BROCHURE PUBLISHED

SAN FRANCISCO, CA - National Gay Rights Advocates (NGRA), the San Francisco-based public interest law firm, has published a new brochure on wills. Written in a question and answer format, the brochure addresses the typical concerns of Gay men and women. Some of the areas covered are probate, taxes, joint ownership of property and estate planning.

NGRA Executive Director Jean O'Leary said: "Wills give us the power to make important decisions about the disposition of our property. With a will, you can make sure your last wishes are respected so that those most important to you will be remembered. Without a will, you simply have no choice."

Leonard Graff, NGRA Legal Director, said: "We just finished successfully defending the validity of a Gay man's will that his two nieces had challenged. Unfortunately this sort of thing happens all the time. NGRA's brochure has a section that specifically deals with the problem of will contests." Graff noted that defense of the will was a joint project with Lambda Legal and Education Fund and the Fund for Human Dignity.

TWO CHOOSE FATAL PLUNGE OVER AIDS

NEW YORK, NY (AP) - In a room decorated with fresh-cut flowers, two men shared a final bottle of wine, tied themselves together at the waist and then plunged from the 35th floor luxury apartment, evidently choosing instant death over the slower ravages of AIDS.

Officially, neither the Police Department nor the medical examiners' office would say whether the men who took their lives last Thursday, (Oct 25), were ill with acquired immune deficiency syndrome. But one detective who declined to be identified told the Associated Press that it was known that at least one of them had the incurable disease. A published report quoted another anonymous police source as saying the men's doctors and medical records confirmed that both were victims of the disease.

The men, bound together by a silken sash, were Charles Villalonga, 43, a U.S. Agriculture Department market specialist in Washington who became too ill to continue commuting to work last March, and Gilbert Rodriguez, 44.

Rodriguez, a potter, artist and part-time chef, moved in with Villalonga and his wife, Connie, 49, about five years ago, according to building service employees. The Villalongas were original tenants in the 10-year-old Ruppert-Yorkville Towers, a 1,200 apartment complex at Third Avenue and 92nd Street, said Hy Cassuto, former building manager.

The double "suicide" was a very violent statement, said Joseph Rispoli, a chiropractor below whose second-floor windows Villalonga and Rodriguez hit the pavement. "They could have done themselves in in their own apartment. Obviously they were trying to say something."

"Charles was seriously ill, but he never disclosed to me that he had AIDS," said neighbor Maurice Farber, a psychology professor at the University of Connecticut and author of a 1948 book, "Theory of Suicide". Farber said he tried to comfort Mrs. Villalonga after police summoned her home from her job as a private nurse. "I said, 'Did Charles get a bad diagnosis?' and she said yes. But I didn't ask what," he said.



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
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
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

Platter Chatter

LP A Winter's Solstice "Various Artists" - Windham Hill Records.
 This is Windham Hill's Christmas Album but not in any traditional sense of the word. It gives one unfamiliar with Windham Hill artists to receive a taste of a wide selection of their artists from David Quaby's guitar to Philip Aaberg's piano. Aaberg does an adaptation from "High Plains" entitled High Plains (Christmas on the high-line). It is not overtly a Christmas piece, but fits the season to a tee. This LP can be described as mellow, contemplative, soothing and uplifting. One is given the 'space' to enjoy this album thoroughly. There is also a recorder and guitar combination entitled "Petite Aubade" by Shadow Fox that is especially intriguing.

LP - Take No Prisoners "Pabo Bryson" - Elektra Records.
 Bryson proves he's the master of heart-breaking ballad with the more positive, "Love Always Finds A Way." "Love always sees the light through the darkest night, when the clouds have no silver lining, she comes through shining." This LP is decidedly more uptempo than other Bryson releases with the title song, "Take No Prisoners (In The Name Of Love)". Here is some good dance music. It has a good clear beat to it that makes even the apprehensive take a chance on the dance floor. From dance music to the ballad, Bryson does an admirable job.

LP - Working It Back - "Teddy Pendergrass" - Asylum Records.
 As over 2 million people around the world witnessed at the Live Aid concert in July '85, Teddy Pendergrass is indeed working it back. Teddy's 10th solo album is certainly the best produced of his career. Asylum has seen fit to use some of the best R&B producers in the country. Teddy proves his own prowess in his producing of "Love 4/2". Teddy's R&B style has taken on a new sensitivity not seen in some previous albums. The 'buried treasure' in this LP is a ballad-style tune entitled "Let Me Be Closer". This song allows Teddy's rich voice and feeling come through in a unique way.

LP Along The Axis - Jon Butcher Axis" - Capitol Records.
 This is Jon Butcher Axis' debut with Capitol Records. They were discovered by Peter Wolf of the J. Geils Band and has toured with the likes of the Scorpions, Del Leppard and Rush. The music on this LP is contemporary rock but should not be put into any hard and fast mold. Butcher uses some interesting techniques in these songs. "Sounds Of Your Voice", is a more reserved rock ballad that could be comfortably played on any pop station in the country. This could be the tune that does it for this group. They show control, sensitivity and musical excellence. "Only The Fox", is another up-beat tune that would be some good dance music. This group shows some real promise.

N.J. AIDS BILL SEEKS LISTS OF ADULT BOOKSTORE CLIENTS
 pamphlets, including sexually explicit material.
 In an interview, Paterniti said his bill would not violate a person's right to freedom of expression. "We're protecting their health and welfare," said Paterniti, a dentist. Under Paterniti's bill, any adult bookstore owner convicted of failing to obtain a state license or to keep the registry would face a fine of up to \$7,500 and up to 90 days in jail.
 The bill also would permit a person who contracts AIDS or any other sexually transmitted disease to sue the bookstore owner in civil court if the plaintiff can show that the "proximate cause of contracting the disease was the person's presence in the adult bookstore."
