



## Latest TAP Benefit Nets \$3,300



TUCSON - The TAP Benefit show held at Rita's Rendezvous last Sunday, Dec. 1st was a winner in all respects. It raised a lot of money, and the high energy show put on by a great troupe of performers raised the consciousness of the enthusiastic crowd. As the finale closed the show with the song "That's

What Friends Are For" the performers sang, took their bows and then were inundated by a large group from the audience, pictured above, who just wanted get up on stage to congratulate each other for a very memorable and rewarding evening.

TUCSON - The last fundraiser for the Tucson AIDS Project (TAP) to be held in 1985, was held last Sunday, Dec. 1 at Rita's Rendezvous. This fundraiser, which offered as a grand raffle prize a trip to Hawaii for two for seven nights, was a culmination of several other fundraisers which included shows, raffles, bake sales, car washes, dinners etc. TAP has furnished OBSERVER with a financial report, which appears elsewhere in this issue and lists the income from these various fundraising events, but does not include the proceeds from a show and raffle held at Simone's (which reportedly raised nearly \$2,000), nor this one last Sunday which netted nearly \$3,300. The cost of the Hawaiian trip was deducted from the total proceeds which exceeded \$4,100. A breakdown appears below.

The total receipts were \$4147.05 and the cost of plane fare and hotel accommodations amounted to \$849 leaving a net proceeds of \$3298.05 with a little more money still to come in.

## Miss Gay Tucson To Be Crowned

TUCSON - Local female impressionists will vie for the title of Miss Gay Tucson in the First Annual Miss Gay Tucson Pageant at the Fineline on January 12, at 8:00 p.m.

The Pageant which is affiliated with the state Miss Gay Arizona Pageant and with the National Miss Gay America Pageant, includes competition in evening gown, sportswear, talent, and male and female interviews. Entrants are required to wear white evening gowns for the parade of contestants. Very strict rules and regulations must be followed in order to fulfill the franchise requirements.

The winner of the title of Miss Gay Tucson will receive cash awards, trophy, crown and flowers. She will hold the title for one year and must properly represent the City of Tucson at special events. She is eligible to represent Tucson in the Miss Gay Arizona Pageant in July. If she wins the Miss Gay Arizona title or is first runner-up, she may enter the national contest.

Judges, whose identities are kept secret until the evening of the pageant, are selected from those whose experience, achievements, talent, and/or profession enables them to provide qualified, objective evaluations of the contestants. Judges must use rating scale judging sheets created nationally by the parent franchiser, and provided by the local franchising agent, JBC Productions. Rating sheets are tabulated by an independent auditor and monitored by JBC Productions for accuracy.

Tickets for the pageant will go on sale Dec. 15 at the Fineline and Graduate in Tucson and at Shamoo's, Phoenix Power and Supply and JR's in the Phoenix area.

Entry fee for contestants is \$50 and must be postmarked no later than Dec. 15 and mailed to JBC Productions, P.O. Box 44281, Phoenix, AZ 85064. Cash Prize money is allocated as follows: Miss Gay Tucson, \$150; 1st Runner-up \$100; 2nd Runner-up \$50; Miss Congeniality \$25.

## State tries to cope with AIDS

PHOENIX - Arizona officials like their counterparts in federal health care programs, are trying to cope with growing numbers of AIDS patients they say could end up costing a staggering amount in medical bills. Officials say it costs about \$150,000 in hospital bills for each victim.

The Arizona Health Care Cost Containment System, the state's alternative to the Medicaid program, isn't sure how many AIDS patients are enrolled. Federal Medicaid officials have just started trying to compile a national figure. The Social Security Administration, which considers AIDS to be automatically disabling, has granted benefits to 4,400 of 4,600 applicants in the last 18 months, according to spokesman Jim Brown in Washington, DC.

The United States has about 14,500 reported AIDS victims, 5,000 of whom have been diagnosed in the last year. The total could more than double within a year, according to Steven Englander, the state Health Department's specialist on AIDS.

Arizona had one reported AIDS victim in 1981, 2 in 1982, 8 in 1983, 24 in 1984 and 37 so far this year, Englander says. At least 34 have died. "I would not be at all surprised if this year ends up doubling last year" in Arizona, he adds, although some are "essentially dead at diagnosis."

## State Senator Apologizes For AIDS Poster

PHOENIX (AP) - A state senator who used a poster on AIDS to play a prank on a fellow senator apologized publicly last Friday, Nov. 22.

"It has become clear that the nature of that practical joke inadvertently offended various people in our community," Assistant Senate Minority Leader Jaime Gutierrez said. "I extend my sincere apologies for any offense that was taken from my actions. No offense was intended."

Kirk Baxter, a board member of the National Gay Task Force and the Arizona AIDS Fund Trust, said he applauded Gutierrez's "honesty and new-found sincerity and hope that his apology will in fact serve our purpose in educating other legislators and the general public to the need for a visible show of compassion and action toward dealing with the AIDS crisis."

The original poster, distributed by the state Health Department shows pictures of a used glass, a toilet, a doorknob and a handshake and is titled "None of these will give you AIDS".

In the prank poster, a picture of Senate Minority Leader Alfredo Gutierrez was pasted over one of the original pictures and the initial "K" was blanked out, making the poster read "one of these will give you AIDS".

The Gutierrezes, both Democrats, share an office and a secretary but are not related.

Baxter said he saw nothing funny in the poster, especially since lawmakers are likely to be considering

bills on AIDS next session. The prank was discovered by Baxter. He said he spotted a copy of it in the Senate Press Room on Thursday, and removed it from the wall to take it with him so he could show it to others. Calls from Gay rights groups soon began to inundate the Gutierrezes' office but aids initially thought they might stem from an elaborate counterprank by Alfredo Gutierrez, who is known for his practical jokes. The pranks, known as "goons" in legislative slang, have been going on for years between staffers and lawmakers.

"I personally have had three close friends that have contracted the disease, and a couple of them that have died," Baxter said. He called the poster an example of "bigotry and perhaps even ignorance on the part of the Legislature." "I'm not speaking as a Gay individual," he added. "I'm speaking as an individual citizen, taxpayer and voter."

As of November 18, AIDS had struck 14,852 people in the United States and claimed 7,628 lives since 1979.

**HOMOSEXUALS ANONYMOUS:  
Ministry serves those  
who want to give up the  
Gay Life**

**TUCSON** - Michael Hastings, is the founder of "True Perceptions" - a ministry that offers group counseling sessions called Homosexuals Anonymous. Homosexuals Anonymous, is a five-year-old fellowship that started in Reading, Pennsylvania, and has been in Tucson since September. Hastings, a 26-year-old graduate of Oral Roberts University, brought the ministry here to help others cope with a problem he said he had.

Hastings, a Born-Again Christian who led a homosexual lifestyle for one year, said he always remembers being attracted to members of his gender. "I was as Gay as Gay could be." But Hastings decided he could not remain a homosexual because he said the Bible says God intended all people to be heterosexual.

He attended Homosexuals Anonymous seminars in San Francisco and Los Angeles. And he worked with a ministry offering similar assistance in San Diego. Then he came to Tucson to try to help others like himself. "This is not an activist group. The ministry is simply there and available for people who want to be free from homosexuality," he said. They include Gays who feel depressed, suicidal or lonely because that lifestyle is not working out for them, he said. About 25 have joined the Tucson group thus far.

TO ORGAN PIPE CACTUS  
MONUMENT THIS WEEKEND**

**TUCSON** - The Tucson Chapter of Great Outdoors will hold a carcamp at the Organ Pipe Cactus National Monument this Saturday and Sunday, Dec. 7 and 8.

The National Monument consists of 300,000 acres in a remote preserve in the Sonoran Desert. Here are the largest stands of Organ Pipe and Senita cactuses to be found in Arizona. Although common farther south in Sonora, Mexico, these types are rather scarce in the United States. Two loop drives provide opportunities to explore by car the contrasting flat basins and craggy ranges typical of the monument; several hiking trails are also available for the more ambitious.

In addition to the floral curiosities are the residents of Quitobaquito Spring, the oasis home of many small animals including the rare Desert Pupfish. A visitor center provides interpretive displays and self-guided tour booklets. The NPS campground is well developed: restrooms, water, tables, tent pads and grills - everything the Interior Department feels is necessary for a proper camping experience.

You can find out more about this outing from Chris at 791-7430. Standard outing fees for a weekend trip such as this is \$5 for members and \$15 for non-members. Special trips such as this may require additional charges involving use of National Park Service facilities. Also, please be prepared to negotiate carpooling costs with your driver if necessary.

**NOVEMBER BUSY ONE  
FOR AAF-T IN PHOENIX**

**PHOENIX** - The Arizona AIDS Fund Trust (AAF-T) was a busy operation during November. Five individuals with AIDS were given financial assistance - rent, utilities, food. There are at least ten who are being assisted by volunteer counselors or friends. The telephone was expanded to two lines; a volunteer replaced the handsets and set up four telephones. The office is handling nearly 200 calls weekly.

700 mailing pieces were sent to supplement the publicity for the 5k Run held on Nov. 23, and Orsini's New Year's Eve Party. Volunteer questionnaires have been sent to 119 persons since the first of October.

AAF-T in Phoenix currently has 120 volunteers: 14 counselors; 47 friends of Persons with AIDS; 7 office and telephone responders; 45 engaged in fundraising and 8 doing work in Education and Outreach.

Interested persons and volunteers and encouraged to attend the last open meeting of the year on Tuesday, Dec. 17, 7:00 p.m. at the auditorium of the Phoenix Public Library. The program will include a guest speaker discussing Section 8 Public Housing and small group discussions of outreach and education, counseling, friends of PWAs, mutual assistance, fundraising, shared housing and volunteer recruitment.

**AIDS-FIGHTING STEPS  
ADVISED FOR CHINA**

**PEKING (AP)** - China should ban homosexuality, crack down on "sexual liberation" and require blood tests for all foreigners engaged to Chinese as measures against the killer disease AIDS, a leading daily newspaper said.

The Nov. 29 Guangming daily Ribao, seen in Peking last Monday, also urged the Ministry of Public Health to ban importation of all human blood products except for limited amounts of plasma globin.

There have been no reported cases of acquired immune deficiency syndrome among Chinese, although an American tourist died of the disease in Peking last June.

The article urged the government to "launch criticisms of so-called bourgeois 'sexual liberation', ban homosexual love and prohibit intravenous drug injections."

Homosexuality is rarely heard of in China because of strong social and government condemnations of the practice.

required to report AIDS

there are also cases where patients pay for their care out of their own pockets rather than tell an insurance company or a government agency they have the disease, most of whose victims are homosexual or drug addicts.

"I have a number of patients who are not reported," says Dr. Kenneth Fisher, a family practitioner here who works with private patients as well as ACCESS clients.

One unreported patient, a restaurant owner, paid thousands of dollars out of his own pocket before letting his insurance company know he had AIDS because he feared people would stop coming to the restaurant, Fisher said.

But Englander says he believes most of the victims do get reported eventually, if only when the government checks death certificates. "I think the guy's been reported, anyhow," he said of the restaurant owner, who was not identified. "Eighty percent or more of the cases end up dying."

The average cost of an AIDS case is estimated at \$140,000 to \$150,000 for hospitalization alone, not counting doctors' fees, outpatient service, and other costs.

Arizona has refused to let insurance companies deny payments for AIDS so far, but several companies are considering excluding AIDS from coverage in future policies, according to state Insurance Director S. David Childers.

In the meantime, a foundation that Fisher helps direct is paying insurance premiums for some disabled AIDS victims so that the companies continue paying for treatment. But many AIDS patients aren't insured, and several of Arizona's approximately 72

cases have ended up on ACCESS, after exhausting their own assets or being certified eligible through Social Security.

ACCESS contracts with local governments and private health plans for indigent health care, paying a flat fee every month per patient, rather than reimbursing actual costs. Health plans are supposed to make enough money on healthy patients to cover their losses on unhealthy ones, although the state generally does pay 80 percent of the costs greater than \$20,000. That could pose problems for Fisher, who is known in the homosexual community as sympathetic to AIDS victims and is treating three or four of them for Access Patients' Choice, one of the health plans that has a contract with ACCESS.

The exact fee varies according to the type of patients, but AIDS patients rarely live more than a few years, and the average monthly fee of around \$100 won't begin to pay for the \$45,000 or so each AIDS victim is likely to cost, even when the state picks up 80 percent of the costs greater than \$20,000.

Fisher says his health plan's managers have not complained so far, but he acknowledges that his activism "is probably unfair to Patients Choice" because it represents "a big drain on them financially. And he and Englander note that some other plans, notably the one that Maricopa County runs, also care for multiple AIDS patients.

ACCESS does not keep track of the number of AIDS patients in the system, although it is retooling its computer system in hopes of finding out, according to Deputy Director Joseph Anderson. "It is not a reportable disease, so we do not know how many we have," says Medical Director Albert Bostrom who has started asking health plans such as Access Patients Choice for data he can forward to the National Governor's Association.

**SHARING COMMUNION CUP OK**  
ANAHEIM, CA (AP)- Episcopal church leaders meeting in California say there's no evidence that worshippers can catch AIDS by sharing the communion cup. But they concede that some do not agree. The Right Reverend William Swing of San Francisco has issued a pastoral letter about it. In part, it says the Episcopal Church is aware that AIDS is not transmitted through the communion cup but that many people are uneasy about saliva and the use of a common cup.

The letter says the "AIDS virus has been found in saliva," but the deadly ailment has never been traced to saliva. But Swing has urged what he calls "Understanding for the cautious person who now only receives bread" at holy communion rather than also taking a sip from the common cup of wine.

After a hotel room meeting of 15 bishops, Bishop Oliver Garver of Los Angeles said, "The trouble is that you cannot deal rationally and factually with people on this matter." In his words, they are just desperately afraid. "There is something out there that is killing people," says Bishop Garver, adding, "People are scared - for themselves, for their children."

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

## A FEW MORE WORDS ABOUT AIDS

On Sunday, 24 Nov., two stories came across the news wires which dealt with two differing aspects of acquired immune deficiency syndrome -- AIDS. The story from the Associated Press was about the Veterans Administration, and how they plan on dealing with future cases of AIDS from within the military. The United Press International dealt with a story from the Polish magazine *Polityka* about the idea to create an organization which would set up alternative meeting places for homosexuals.

some more figuring would show about 2,100 potential full-blown cases of AIDS would come from this new testing. I'm not trying to make any point here, just ruminating a bit....

Secondly, the Polish magazine story. The Community Party magazine *Polityka* carried a story by an "acknowledged homosexual" writer, Krzysztof Darski which said, "The (organization) would be responsible for establishing alternatives to homosexual contacts now established in parks, railway stations, toilets." He continued with, "This form of providing facilities for homosexuals and meeting their needs in comfort and safety would enable (the government), in turn, to exercise some control over this social group." AHA!

Firstly, the story on the VA. The defense Department which announced plans to test all military personnel (2.1 million) has also announced that it will give medical discharges to those persons who have contracted the disease. These people will all be eligible for medical treatment by the VA for any reason, including treatment for AIDS. Julian Barber, health-affairs director for the Defense Department, said that the Pentagon doesn't expect a large number of new cases from the testing, stating that only 100 cases have been found among active-duty personnel so far. Dr. Howard Cohn, associate deputy chief medical director for the VA says that the VA estimates it will only see about 1,000 cases by 1986, and 1,500 cases by 1987. I can only hope that his estimates are correct.

Now, in Poland, homosexuality among consenting adults (there's that term again....) is legal, but when a Communist Party magazine starts advocating more rights for homosexuals, one has to take pause to think about ulterior motives -- if there are any. (Let us not forget what happened in Berlin in 1932 to the headquarters of the Scientific Humanitarian Committee. Nor let us forget that Hitler rose to power advocating the re-structuring of a world that --at that time-- allowed homosexuality, et. al.)

From what we have been told for so long, about 10% (conservatively) of the population is homosexual. Quick figuring tells us that 10% of 2.1 million is 210,000. Estimates as high as 70% say that San Francisco's population of Gay men could have been exposed to the virus, and could be carrying the virus, although most would show little or no outward indication that they are carriers. Let us be conservative: Let us say 10% of the general Gay population has been exposed, some more quick figuring would say 21,000 of these military persons would be tested positive for this virus. Studies reported that about 3-15% of these people would develop full-blown AIDS cases, and

Although this story advocated the organization to allow (homosexuals) to "come out from the darkness", and to help prevent the spread of AIDS, something tells me that this would be one good way to eliminate homosexuality very quickly: put all the homosexuals in one group, then suddenly, bomb the place and --poof!-- no more homosexuals. Again, no real point is being made here, just more ruminating.

I think organizing groups of Gays and Lesbians is a great idea, but I think we should all be wary when the government steps in and offers its "help" for organizing us.

DO SOMETHING NOW. IT IS UP TO YOU.

By far, the most important aspect of AIDS or any other disease, is our mental attitude and our spiritual condition. Having a well balanced, open-minded, positive mental attitude is essential. Being spiritually healthy within yourself is being who you are all the time. Meditation, yoga, and just listening to relaxing healing music is a comfort to the soul. Developing a better sense of humor is very important, also. These simple techniques can be the difference between a good life or death.

The following are excerpts from *New Realities Magazine*, March/April 1985. Title: William Calderon. "Incredible Triumph Over AIDS Brings

### New Hope."

"My recovery began when I believed that I didn't have to die, when I knew I could heal myself." Hope is the first and most important message: If William Calderon could survive AIDS, so might others. "God gave us a mind to take care of ourselves," which translated into having the belief that the mind influenced illness and health. Every act of support came with love, and he actively worked on thinking loving thoughts whenever negative feelings arose. The struggle over who to believe -- medical experts on AIDS who said he would die, or Skutch and Simonton who said he could get well -- got resolved on the side of recovery.

Calderon, by surviving AIDS is accomplishing an "impossible" that may allow others to follow in his footsteps. "I want people to know that it is possible to heal themselves and be healthy. And I want to help other patients with AIDS believe that they can live, too."

William Calderon's approach to Healing Terminal Illness:

- \* Get support from a partner, friend, relative or anyone that will work with you.
- \* Lead your life as normally as you can.
- \* You must forgive everyone. Think good thoughts of everyone, even if you don't like them.
- \* The fear of the disease is worse than the disease itself. Don't give in to it.
- \* Take some type of mind training course and counseling to develop the conviction that it is possible for people to change their lives.
- \* Learn how to use visualization and change negative attitudes.
- \* Good nutrition and vitamins are important.

- \* Lots of rest.
- \* Faith.
- \* Love.
- \* Humor.
- \* Love.
