Sexually active Tucson man with AIDS virus warned by Health Dept.

TUCSON - Dr. Patricia Nolan, the Pima County Health Director was about to issue an order this week, prohibiting a Tucson man who is infected with the AIDS virus from having sex unless he tells his partners he is infected. The man, however, is out of town and is not expected to return until September if the man still refuses to abide by health department conditions, the order will most likely be issued.

Nolan, who is still drafting the order, said she decided to issue one when it was apparent that the man would not come close to following the health department's suggestions. She said that if the man doesn't follow the order, she will seek to have him quarantined.

Under the order, the unidentified man will be required to warn his sexual partners that he is infected with the AIDS virus. He also will be prohibited from having sex without using a condom and from engaging in other dangerous behavior, such as sharing hypodermic needles.

Nolan said cease and desist orders would not be issued indiscriminately to infected people, but could be given only to those who endanger others.

Because of confidentiality laws, Nolan would not identify the man and did not say whether other AIDS cases could be traced to him. She did say he is not a prostitute, although prostitutes infected with the AIDS virus who continue to engage in unprotected sex could also face similar orders.

The order will be the first one issued to an AIDS patients in Arizona. Charles Pyle, an assistant county attorney working with Nolan on the order, said he was unaware of such action being taken anywhere else in the United States.

As a last resort, Nolan said she would seek to quarantine the man, even though it is unclear whether state law would allow that. An administrative hearing would be provided before any quarantine action is taken, Nolan said.

"I would think this would not be a lifetime situation... more like a mental health commitment during which we can try to alter their behavior," Nolan said. But she also said that no judge has upheld a quarantine order.

About 165 people in Pima County have been confirmed as having the fatal disease, according to statistics compiled by the county disease-control section. As of June 1, the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta said that AIDS had been diagnosed in 40,970 Americans and that 20,849 of them had died.

THE LETTER

[Below is a letter written to Vice President George Bush by Tucsonan Herb Skinner. Herb is the father of Newton-John Skinner who passed away from the ravages of AIDS on August 5, 1985. Newton was one of the first AIDS patients to "go public" with his diagnosis in hopes that his experiences would be of some help to others. He gave talks wherever he was asked and his career as an actor made him a most articulate speaker.

Herb Skinner has carried on in Newton's memory, speaking about this horrible disease that took his son's life as well as the lives of thousands in our Gay communities across the country; and now is extending on to the non-Gay communities around the world. He knows of what he speaks. His experiences are first hand. His letter to Vice President Bush is but one example of his commitment].

Dear Vice-President Bush,
On June 14th, 1984, Father's Day, my son Newton John, a Gay person, suspected correctly that he had full-blown AIDS. He made three related decisions. He was going to show the Gay Community of Tucson that you can have AIDS with dignity (what ever dignity may mean). He was going to fight "the monster" with every means at his disposal. He was going to be public about what it's like to have AIDS.

July 17th, 1985 he made his final appearance at a forum held by the Tucson AIDS Project (TAP).

an organization he had been instrumental in starting. He ended his talk by saying: "Reach out to your friends, forgive your enemies, and you can begin to find peace and courage and happiness, and some day we will be the victor. We will conquer AIDS."

We have his speech on tape. I take every opportunity to show and talk about Newton and the issues involved in what we, as a society, are forced to address. I don't pretend to have the answers, or to even know the questions to the many, many changes of events this disease will bring. The consequences to the individual are devastating. The consequences to society and it's institutions, if not addressed rationally, may be just as devastating.

The AIDS virus is a member of a set of organisms called Retro Viruses. It's preferred environment is members of the Human Species. The AIDS virus jumps from human to human by fluid to fluid contact. Genetic copies of the virus in a given human have the potential to find their way into each and every human being.

The arguments go back and forth as to how many people infected with the virus will eventually have on their death certificate "the underlying cause of death was AIDS". There may very well be people who exist now that are genetically able to survive and reproduce. Then again, as this virus has the capacity to wait for some triggering mechanism - there may not now exist indi-

Dear Mr. Skinner:

That was a very moving letter, yours of June 4. Now it must hurt to have a grown son wrenched from your arms.

Enclosed is a speech I gave recently on this ghastly disease, AIDS. I would like you to give me a frank critique on this speech. What should I have left out? What should I have added?

I firmly believe we need a knowledge base -- some disagree. I firmly believe we need more education and research -- none disagree. This is not a problem that will be solved or even solved by the "extremes." Reasonable people must be out front trying to find the way, then trying to lead. I hope I am such a person.

I have been out to the National Institutes of Health. I have talked several times with Dr. Koop, for whom I have a high regard. A leading doctor at the prestigious Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center in New York City has been advising me. Now I am asking the loving father of an AIDS victim to help me.

Thanks so much for taking the time to spell out so beautifully your feelings.

ARIZONA DANCE TROUPE IS JAILED

LAKE CHARLES, LA - Five members of an exotic all-male dance troupe from Arizona have been arrested for "lewd and improper entertainment" at a show attended by female undercover officers, Calcasieu Parish sheriff's deputies said.

"What they were doing is allowing women to touch them, to put money into their G-strings," said Chief Larry Dailey.

The members of the group, Creative Energy, based in Scottsdale, were performing at Garfield's Lounge last week when two female undercover officers observed the action getting out of hand.

The troupe members could be fined up to \$2,500 and could get three years in jail. They remain in the Calcasieu Parish jail.

BABBITT ATTACKS AIDS POLICY

BOSTON, MA (AP) - Former Governor Bruce Babbitt of Arizona, a candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination, attacked the Reagan administration for failing to face up to the public health emergency caused by AIDS.

Babbitt, a Harvard Law School graduate speaking at the Harvard School of Public Health, said AIDS will be a major issue of his campaign.

First we had moralism and dogma from ignorant people who took a medical illness as divine confirmation of their prejudice," he said. "Then we had six years of inaction. Now we have testing," he said, referring to Reagan administration suggestions that mandatory tests be made for the deadly disease.

The Reagan administration, he said, has balked at dealing with the problem of acquired immune deficiency syndrome. If a mandatory testing policy is implemented, he said, it will drive most of the people who need to be tested and counseled underground.

Babbitt also criticized the administration for failing to advertise to get the message out about AIDS. Other countries are putting direct advertisements on national television, he said.

MARCH ON WASHINGTON CIVIL DISOBEDIENCE ACTION TO BE HELD

WASHINGTON, DC - A large non-violent civil disobedience action to protest the U.S. Supreme Court decision in *Hardwick v. Bowers* will be held Oct. 13 at the U.S. Supreme Court. Participants will also protest inadequate government response to the AIDS crisis and to widespread violence against Lesbians and Gay men. Over 50 activists from around the country attended a meeting in Boston earlier this month to plan the action called "Out and Outraged: Life, Love, Liberation."

The civil disobedience action is one of a number of events sponsored by and occurring in conjunction with the National March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights. The march itself is planned for Sunday, October 11.

"This promises to be a watershed for the Lesbian and Gay political movement," said Michelle Crone, chairperson of the Civil Disobedience Committee for the March on Washington. "This will be the first time a large national direct action tactic has been used to fight exclusively for Lesbian and Gay civil rights. The Boston meeting is also historic for our movement because it brought together Lesbian and Gay men who are veterans of the civil disobedience movement but who have not yet worked together to resist government oppression of Lesbians and Gay men.

Members of the outreach work group will begin distributing the "Call to Action" and set up dates for non-violence trainings. A civil disobedience handbook is scheduled to be printed in late August and will include information about civil disobedience as a political tactic, the history of Lesbian and Gay political organizing, the *Hardwick* decision, the AIDS crisis, women and sodomy laws, women and AIDS and specific plans for the October 13th action.

A third national civil disobedience meeting is planned for Sept. 19 in Washington, D.C. For more information call Michelle Crone at (518) 463-1051. 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Oregon kills Gay rights bill, passes mixed AIDS bill

SALEM, OR (GNC) - Despite furious last-ditch lobbying efforts by pro-Gay forces, the 1987 Oregon Legislature adjourned without taking action on a Lesbian and Gay rights bill. Legislators did approve a bill that makes it more difficult to quarantine persons with infectious diseases, including AIDS, but which also requires testing some state prisoners for the HIV antibody.

House Bill 2067 adds due process and notification-of-rights requirements to the existing state quarantine law, according to Dave Fidanque of the American Civil Liberties Union's Eugene office. And for the first time, Oregon health professionals are required to have a patient's informed consent before performing an HIV blood test. However, some state prisoners convicted of drug or sex offenses must submit to HIV testing, Fidanque said.

The AIDS bill also mandates random, anonymous, non-traceable testing of Oregon hospital patients to determine the extent of HIV infection in the state. The bill allocates one million dollars for AIDS education in the schools, and one million dollars for AIDS education and treatment for prisoners. A provision of HB 2067 that required HIV testing for persons seeking marriage licenses was removed after Gov. Neil Goldschmidt threatened a veto of the bill, Fidanque said.

The Lesbian/Gay rights bill, HB 2325, would have amended existing Oregon civil rights laws to protect Lesbians, Gay men and bisexuals from discrimination in housing, employment, education, and public accommodations. The bill was introduced at the beginning of the legislative session in January at the request of the Oregon ACLU and 22 other religious, labor, women's rights and Gay rights organizations.

According to ACLU literature, nearly two-thirds of the witnesses testified in favor of HB 2325 at a Feb. 23 public hearing at the state capitol in Salem. Among pro-Gay witnesses were Secretary of State Barbara Roberts, House Speaker Vera Katz and a representative of Gov. Neil Goldschmidt.

Nevertheless, the bill languished in House Judiciary Subcommittee No. 3 because subcommittee chair Tom Hanlon didn't think the bill had the 31 votes necessary to pass the Oregon House.

On the Senate side, "We got real close to moving a bill out of the Senate Labor Committee," Fidanque said. The Senate bill would have banned discrimination in employment on the basis of sexual orientation. President John Kitzhaber refused to put the bill before the full Senate, because he wasn't sure the bill would receive the 16 votes it

needed to pass.

Fidanque said pro-Gay activists "are well-positioned to begin the educational process for the next time around." The next regular session of the Oregon Legislature begins in 1989.



viduals who can survive and reproduce without showing the effects of the virus. But there is no guarantee that the virus won't mutate and be selected because it can multiply rapidly and destroy those people who now seem able to resist it. On the other hand, the genes of people mutate as well, and the virus has no guarantee that the process of mutation won't develop people that will be selected because they can adapt to any environment that contains the AIDS virus.

Each of us was selected for some past environment, an environment in which the AIDS virus was unknown. The AIDS virus has created a whole new environment, one which is extremely hostile to those with full-blown AIDS. These processes have no time schedule. Nature does not care which species survives, and a hundred years, a thousand years or a million years makes no difference. It may be that homo-sapiens disappear, or it may be that some sort of coexistence will result. In any event, there is one thing for certain - the processes are in place and they will work themselves out. Biology has no time schedule.

Stephen Jay Gould, in an article printed in the New York Times Magazine of April 19th, "The Terrifying Normalcy of AIDS", states: "Yes, AIDS may run through the entire population and may carry off a quarter or more of us. Yes, it may make no biological difference to homo-sapiens in the long run: There will still be plenty of us left and we can start again."

But start again from where and with what. We need to ask: What social institution can survive? Will it be said that "Our Democracy" was a victim - a victim of the AIDS virus? Where is or are the leaders capable of

leading us in such a way that when the smoke has cleared, Democracy is not only alive and well, but better for the dignified and human way in which it faced "this monster".

It is interesting to read that today there are 1,500,000 people in the United States with the AIDS virus. There are 8,000 people with the AIDS virus in Japan. There is only one significant thing about these numbers - they never go down. At one time there were 8,000 people with the virus in the U.S. It seems clear that someday there will be 1,500,000 people with the virus in Japan. Our generation may escape, but that does not mean succeeding generations will escape. The virus is here - it is looking for environments in which it can survive and reproduce. That environment is us. Evolution is at work - it does not care how long it takes or who gets it.

Newton John was fond of saying "I may be a sissy, but I've got spunk". He fought the monster, and, in one sense, he lost. But in another sense he beat "The Monster". He redefined what dignity means, and his "spunk" is alive and well in many of those who watched him face up to what for all is an intolerable situation. The ability to reach out to his fellow man, when he himself hurt so badly, is catching.

When I go about talking about Newton, I point out that the government can legislate money for research. The can legislate money for education - they can even legislate (reluctantly) money to help those people now sick, but no government can legislate human kindness, nor can it legislate compassion, nor the respect and love that sick people so badly want.

These sorts of things can only come and do require an extraordinary kind of leadership. We must begin and must decide, as Newton did, just how we are going to behave as this insidious disease works its way "through our population". If this sort of undefinable leadership is not forthcoming, we will have to start again - not from strength but from weakness and chaos. The challenge of our times is to find and develop this sort of leadership.

We as a nation may have been blessed in that AIDS struck the homosexual community first. They have not given into fear and panic. They have responded in a way that makes one proud to be a human being. They have done the things our sick people need. They have not shirked the unpleasant tasks that come up as someone or another goes through the process of dying. They do not ask first who or what you are when you are in trouble - they just reach down one more time and do the impossible. Whatever altruism may have meant - it has a new and clearer meaning today. These people have not spoken the word compassion - they have acted in a compassionate manner. For me, they have listened to my nonsense - they have picked me up when I have been down. They have done the things Newton would have done had he lived. Father's Day for me will not go unnoticed - and I am grateful to this segment of our society.

A species survives because it presents variations to an environment. Yet our society for some reason or another believes the variant called homosexual is in some way inferior. Democracy has in many ways passed them by. It is not easy to be homosexual in this society. As this virus finds the heterosexual world, we will turn to these people, who have seen their friends melt away - have met the challenge, and did

not come up wanting.

In the end, will it be said of Democracy that "It reached out to its friends. It forgave its enemies - it began to find peace and courage and happiness and it was the victor - it did conquer AIDS"?

Like it or not, we are about to find out - so fasten your seat belt, it's going to be a bumpy ride!



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

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

IF ONLY I COULD HAVE BEEN AT STONEWALL

As a member of the fraternity of journalists I try to communicate what I see in the world around me to those who may not have seen or experienced those things which I report or comment on. True, I do zero-in on those items of specific interest to Gays and/or Lesbians because I feel the "mainstream" press tends to—with intent or not—overlook them.

I was not in New York in June 27, 1969. In fact, I was barely tall enough to reach a counter to buy candy; I was not bar-hopping that year.

Lucky for me, I was able to experience the thrill of the Stonewall revolt through the medium of audio tape. It was but one story on the cassette tape of "Time Line" — a retrospective of events in the Lesbian and Gay community which have generally been under-reported in "mainstream media".

The "Time Line" tape is a compilation of various news reports which aired on the Gay-themed radio program "imru" in California. Times and attitudes have changed a lot since that night in 1969, but one thing is still the same: news events involving Gays and Lesbians do NOT get the coverage they deserve.

"Well Christopher, what can we do to change this situation?"

I am glad you asked that question.

Coming soon to a radio station near you, a new show called "Inside Out". As an international, weekly, radio program for Gays and Lesbians, about Gays and Lesbians, "Inside Out" will markedly change the face of news reporting as we know it.

A sweeping statement? Yes. Listening to "Time Line" made me realize that—even as personally involved as I am—I do not know, nor have access to, all the information about Gay and Lesbian events as I could—and need to have.

"Inside Out" is very much like National Public Radio—which airs on the FM band in most cities across the country. The pilot-tape of "Inside Out"; which I have heard, was slickly produced, well-written, and filled with a wealth of information that is wonderful standing alone; imagine how wonderful it would be every week.

"Inside Out" is a media

event which will profile newsmakers, talented Gays and Lesbians, performers and all the rest that makes up our world.

Interesting? You bet! Interested? You should be.

Already, program directors of 39 public radio stations across the country have shown an interest in airing this weekly program of Gay and Lesbian interests. And THAT huge response is without any heavy marketing attempt. Can you imagine that?

Currently plans are in the works for a 13-part pilot series to be run on public radio stations for 13 consecutive weeks. This will make "Inside Out" THE FIRST REGULARLY AVAILABLE, NATIONAL, WEEKLY RADIO PROGRAM OF GAY AND LESBIAN INTERESTS.

Every week. Every SINGLE week.

Do you want to be a part of this ground-breaking event? Well, you can.

As with all public radio and public television series, funding is always critical—most of these funds come from viewers or listeners of the programming. Although you haven't actually had the opportunity to hear the wonderful things I have heard, I guarantee you, you will also be as thrilled and excited about these shows as I am.

Although much of the funding will come from grants, a lot of the funding MUST come from the Gay and Lesbian community itself.




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
