## EDITORIAL



Gov. Evan Mecham has attempted to keep a low profile these past few weeks in an attempt to stem the rising tide of dissatisfied constituents concerning his governing of the state.

However every once in a while word gets out to fortify the feeling that the governor has not changed his mind about anything.

On Wednesday, Aug. 26, the governor told a group of Tucson religious leaders that America is beset with problems of pornography, homosexuality, substance abuse, family violence and "men who father children and then abandon the mothers and children." Does homosexuality really belong in a list such as that?

The governor, when asked by one clergyman about dealing with homosexual practices between consenting adults - Mecham replied, "There will always be those who don't want any rules to infringe on that which they do." Mecham also said, "I never attacked the Gays. They came looking for me. I only said that homosexual activities are illegal as are heterosexual acts outside of marriage."

At a luncheon celebrating the 57th anniversary of Women's Equality Day, the day women were granted the right to vote, Mecham said, "It was not a day, but a recognition by men that they must work hard to be equal to women." "I hope that when I leave this office, one of the things that can be said about Arizona is that it is where equal opportunity fits everyone," Mecham said. There are very few women who would say that women have achieved equality as Mecham has said here in Arizona nationally.

On the controversial paid state holiday honoring the Rev. Martin Luther King, Mecham told the Tucson Citizen that only two Americans - Abraham Lincoln and George Washington - were of such unquestioned stature to merit a state holiday. "Quite frankly, I

am the only person who has been willing to look the Martin Luther King day in the face and say we shouldn't have one, because he (King) should not be elevated into that category," Mecham said.

Mecham also said that the supporters of the King holiday seemed "more concerned with a free day off" than in recognizing the slain civil-rights leader. Mecham then shocked Capitol observers on June 18 by declaring the the third Sunday in January be celebrated as Martin Luther King Jr. Civil Rights Day.

"Martin Luther King Jr. has become the symbol of a civil-rights commitment," Mecham said. "This proclamation is intended for all time as a symbol of Arizona's commitment to civil rights for all."

The beat goes on. The governor who says that he wants equal opportunity for everyone continues his immoral utterances to the minorities. It is apparent that there are a lot of the majority who are educated enough to join in the total movement to recall the governor from office.

Through all the adversity of the Recall movement - being barred from shopping malls, some dissension within the movement, and now a ruling by state Attorney General Bob Corbin that the constitution says that the taxpayer will pay the bill for Mecham if he is recalled and seeks to regain his governorship.

But through it all, low profile, high profile, adversity and dissension, the dissatisfaction of the majority of Arizona citizens, the Recall movement will succeed.

And in the end, it will prove that the people do have a say in the way that elected officials treat their constituents and will stand as a warning to future leaders that the 'people' majority still govern.

## Pneumocystis treatment looks good

SAN FRANCISCO, CA. (AP) - Researchers reported last Friday, Aug. 28, they may have found a non-toxic treatment for a type of pneumonia that has become the most common infection among AIDS patients.

The therapy uses an aerosol form of the common drug pentamidine to treat patients with pneumocystis carinii pneumonia, which strikes at least 60 percent of AIDS victims, according to researchers at the University of California at San Francisco.

The drug has been proven effective against the disease when injected into the veins. But its toxic side effects are so severe that about half the patients have to switch to another often toxic drug.

Dr. A. Bruce Montgomery, chief researcher, cautioned that the new treatment method is not a cure for AIDS and has not been proven to extend the life of patients.

"This appears to be a good non-toxic therapy for PCP," said Montgomery, assistant professor of medicine. "However, it remains to

be established whether this will increase the long-term survival of an AIDS patients. We are not curing AIDS itself." The research is to be reported in a British journal, The Lancet.

Montgomery said the average hospital stay of the 15 patients he treated with pentamidine aerosol at San Francisco General Hospital was reduced from three weeks to eight days.

All but one patient recovered from the bout. The conventional injection method is effective 80 to 90 percent of the time, according to the study.

"The difference was that there were no systemic toxic reactions in any of the patients in the (aerosol) study," he said.

The aerosol method changes the way the body distributes the drug. When injected, only about 4 percent of the drug goes to the lungs to fight pneumonia. The rest is distributed around the body, causing the toxic effects. Aerosol therapy delivers the drug directly to the lungs with only 1 percent absorbed by the body, Montgomery said.

## Board considers AIDS ordinance

TUCSON - The Pima County Board of Health is considering a request by Health Department Director Patricia Nolan to require people with the AIDS virus to make sure they don't spread the disease.

A minimum behavior standard for AIDS carriers will help people understand what is and is not important in preventing the spread of the fatal disease, Nolan told the board at its monthly meeting last week.

The resolution states that anyone who has the disease or has tested positive as a carrier should not donate or sell or attempt to donate or sell blood, plasma, semen, body tissues or organs.

The person also should inform sexual partners of the infection before engaging in intercourse, according to the resolution. AIDS carriers should not share intravenous syringes or needles unless the equipment has been

disinfected. And the person should not have sexual intercourse without the use of condoms, according to the resolution.

Nolan said that despite lengthy discussion among her staff members, there was no agreement on whether AIDS carriers should tell past sex partners about the disease or whether AIDS carriers should not have children.

The resolution also could clear up some misconceptions, Nolan said. It would tell AIDS patients and carriers, that "they are not expected to stand on the street corner and announce that they have the virus that causes AIDS, or tell their employers they have it, or quit their jobs - unless they are prostitutes."

Nolan also said she is becoming more convinced that criminal charges should be sought against AIDS carriers who endanger others through sexual relations or shared use of intravenous needles.

## BOARD OF DIRECTORS APPOINT PERMANENT TAP STAFF

TUCSON - The Board of Directors of the Tucson AIDS Project (TAP) has announced the appointment of permanent staff. Craig Bradford Snow has been hired as Executive Director and Christopher B. Munoz has been hired as Care Coordinator. A secretary will be hired within a few weeks.

Snow, a former faculty member at Miami University, Purdue University and the University of Arizona, has held several volunteer positions within TAP. Recently he worked as a counselor for Help on Call Crisis Line and with private clients.

Munoz has for over ten years been associated with St. Mary's Hospice, in recent years as Volunteer Coordinator. Previously he worked at City of Hope. Affiliated with TAP for a year and a half, Munoz has developed the client services program for people with AIDS/ARC.

The Tucson AIDS Project recently instituted the community-based Board of Directors. City Attorney Thomas J. Wilson is President; Shannon Davis, Assistant to County Supervisor David Yetman is Vice-President; retired medical administrator Howard Barron is Treasurer and Robert Henry, M.D. is Secretary.

Others on the Board include Marshall Burke, Ph. D., businessman and ecologist; Art Chapa, attorney-at-law; Guillermina Contreras-Arriola, psychotherapist; Kathleen Erickson, substance abuse counselor; Raul Grijalva, UA Assistant Dean of Students; Pam McNair, Proprietor, Gadabout; Eskild A. Petersen, M.D., Had Immunodeficiency Clinic, UMC; and Susan Rusch, Coordinator, Home Health Services, Carondelet.

In 36 years, the ACLU has taken a stand on a judicial nominee only once before - when it opposed William Rehnquist's nomination to the court in 1971.

## AIDS AWARENESS TEST AIRS SEPT. 15

TUCSON - A two-hour, prime-time AIDS special, patterned after the "National Drivers Test" and "National Health Test" shows of the 1960s and 1970s, will be syndicated in most U.S. markets Tuesday, Sept. 15.

"National AIDS Awareness Test" is underwritten by Metropolitan Life Insurance and will air without commercials. The format includes 50 questions on AIDS followed by answers based on the latest research.

Co-anchors are Steve Bell, formerly with "Good Morning America" and Morgan Fairchild with Susan Dey, John Forsythe and Louis Gossett Jr. also on hand.

Experts include U.S. Surgeon General C. Everett Koop and Health and Human Services secretary Otis Bowen. Besides the crucial facts, the special will include a poll from Louis Harris & Associates on such issues as blood testing and AIDS victims in the school and workplace.

MADONNA DONATES \$83,000 TO AIDS PARIS, FRANCE (AP) - Rock superstar Madonna, who gave France its biggest-ever concert last weekend, presented a check for about \$83,000 to a foundation to fight AIDS.

In a brief ceremony at City Hall, French Premier Jacques Chirac praised the singer as "one of the great artists of all times." He then kissed her on both cheeks, a gesture returned by Madonna with an American-style bear-hug.

The premier became an overnight fan of Madonna when his 24-year-old daughter, Claude, made him listen to her recordings, according to his daughter's own account. Madonna met with the Chirac family in their private residence at City Hall. Claude Chirac said she and Madonna exchanged phone numbers before parting.

The pop singer then went before reporters and photographers to present the check to singer Line Renaud, who heads the Foundation Against AIDS.

## MECHAM FEATURED IN "DOONESBURY"

PHOENIX - Gov. Evan Mecham will get a new kind of national publicity next week when he is featured as a character in the "Doonesbury" comic strip.

Mecham declined to comment on "Doonesbury" creator Garry Trudeau's use of a Mecham character in a series of six cartoon strips that begin running next Monday, Sept. 7.

One shows a caricature of Mecham patting a black child on the head and saying, "My, what a cute little pickaninny."

Earlier this spring, Mecham defended the use of the word "pickaninny" in an essay in a book by a man he considers his mentor, conservative constitutionalist W. Cleon Skousen.

The strip also has Mecham responding to claims that he is insensitive are "Lies! Lies spread by queers and pickaninnies!"

In the final strip, the recall movement is reported to be losing momentum, but it received renewed support after Mecham holds a news conference to announce that "all the people involved in the recall are practicing homosexuals."

Mecham Recall Committee founder Ed Buck, is an acknowledged homosexual. Mecham said earlier this summer the committee was a band of "homosexuals and dissident Democrats."

## UA STUDENTS HELP SWELL PETITION SIGNATURES

TUCSON - The Southern Arizona Mecham Recall Committee collected nearly 4,500 signatures in just three days last week while focusing its efforts at the University of Arizona which has just begun its fall semester. Spokesman Steve Foremaster said that the committee collected 4,427 signatures.

By August 19, the statewide effort had collected 103,379 signatures. Almost 217,000 valid signatures are needed by early November to force a recall election of Republican Gov. Evan Mecham.



# Mecham recall

### KOLBE MAY RUN FOR GOVERNOR IF RECALL EFFORT WINS

PHOENIX - If Gov. Evan Mecham is forced to face a recall election, Republican Congressman Jim Kolbe may be a candidate. Kolbe said he isn't ready to make a decision yet, but he told the Phoenix Gazette that some have suggested he run.

"I have had people who have spoken to me about it," said Kolbe who was reached in Tokyo. "But it is not anything that I have yet considered to be in a serious vein." Kolbe is one of several congressmen visiting Japanese and American businesses in Japan on a trip sponsored by the U.S.-Japan Foundation.

Kolbe's Tucson administrative assistant, Vera Marie Badertscher, said that "people have been talking to anyone who has held political office in the last 10 years about running. She called the Gazette story "a very long story on not very much".

The Gazette quoted one top GOP state lawmaker who has encouraged Kolbe, as saying it was "horribly premature" to conclude that Kolbe would run against Mecham. But the lawmaker, who asked not to be identified, said Kolbe would represent the party's best hope to hold the governor's office in 1990.

**NO CONTEST PLEA IN RECALL ASSAULT**  
 KEARNY, AZ - The chairwoman of Pinal County's Republican Party has pleaded "no contest" to a charge of assaulting a volunteer in the movement to recall Gov. Evan Mecham.

Kearny police chief Pat Huntsman said that Nancy Mendoza Brinkman was cited for assault in an Aug. 25 incident involving Will Powers, driver of a van touring rural areas with recall petitions.

Huntsman said she was unfamiliar with details of the incident, but Recall founder Ed Buck said he was told that Brinkman had yelled at Powers, swing at him and hit him, knocking a clipboard out of his hands.

Buck also cited a confrontation in Ringman earlier this month where Powers escaped being hit by a car, adding "in light of the fact that this is the second attack on our recall van in less than a month by an official of the Republican Party, I think a formal public apology is in order from the state GOP."

State GOP spokesman Joe Isbrand, said the party would decline comment until it had a chance to speak with legal counsel.

### LOCAL RECALL PETITIONS HAVE 7,000 GOP NAMES, GROUP ORGANIZER SAYS

TUCSON - Alex Strong, organizer of Republicans for Recall, said that the new group, which has about 30 members, has petitions with more than 7,000 Republican signatures. "If we get a good showing here, Republicans in Phoenix will follow us," Strong said.

Strong said he decided to help organize the anti-Mecham GOP group after being told by Republi-

can officials locally that the party's executive committee decided "all Republicans should back the governor". Many Republicans aren't happy with the job Mecham has done, Strong said. He said the local organization is not connected with the Mecham Recall Committee but hopes to work in cooperation with the recall group.

Pima County Republican Chairman Bob Stash said the state GOP leadership passed a resolution earlier this year calling on all party members to support Mecham. "It's the 11th commandment: Thou shall not do anything bad to any other Republican," Stash said.

Strong said the organization will hold several rallies to support the recall and may organize a parade.

### 'EVAN CHEER'

PHOENIX (AP) - Singer Country Joe McDonald, whose "Fish Cheer" was a rallying cry for '60s anti-war protesters, has recorded a new version of the song as a dig at embattled Arizona Gov. Evan Mecham.

McDonald, once the leader of Country Joe and the Fish, said his single, called "Evan Cheer," will be released next month along with a video in support of a paid state holiday honoring the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr.

Mecham rescinded Arizona's holiday for the slain civil rights leader when he took office in January, saying it was illegally proclaimed by his Democratic predecessor, Bruce Babbitt.

Scott Tuchman, manager at Pantheon Studios in nearby Paradise Valley, said McDonald recorded the song last week, and the "Evan Cheer" is followed on the record by a rendition of "We Shall Overcome".

# Lesbian minister suspended

DOVER, ME (AP) - Both parties claimed victory when the United Methodist Church suspended the Rev. Rose Mary Derman from her ministerial duties until United Methodist ministers from around the state gather for their annual meeting in June 1988. The jury of nine men and four women reached its 11-2 decision after a half-hour deliberation.

The jurors could have removed her from the ministry or expelled her from the church.

"They were men and women of integrity," Derman said as she hugged her lover and fought back tears. "They were telling the church they were not sure the church has behaved like a church. The fact that the jury imposed the most lenient sentence available, Derman felt was a victory for her."

The Rev. Janet E. Smith, chairwoman of the jury, read a statement saying the jury reaffirmed its belief that homosexuals are "individuals of sacred worth" who are entitled to their fair share of guidance.

Derman, 40, says she went from "blatant, raw, fear-filled homophobia" to acceptance of her own Lesbianism in a matter of months. She confided this to her superior, Bishop George Bashore of Boston, and the church granted her two one-year leaves from her two parishes in Conway, New Hampshire. She moved to Portland, Maine, with her lover, the ex-wife of a minister.

Derman plans to transfer in November to the Unitarian Universalist Association, which she finds more accepting of her lifestyle, and she sought a third leave to cover the period until then. United Methodist law allows up to five consecutive leaves, but the church's Board of Ordained Ministry denied her the third leave.

## IT IS TIME FOR THE WEDDING

The Wedding is a demonstration for equal rights. It is not a wedding for people starting new relationships. It is called that because our society has told us we cannot have a wedding. It is time to tell the government and society that we already have committed on-going relationships and they deserve the same recognition as heterosexual relationships.

The Wedding is our chance to demand recognition of our relationships. Those of us in relationships must face the day-to-day repudiation of our on-going commitment. We must face employers that refuse to extend benefits to our partners, and insurance companies that not only reject us while living but repudiate our relationships in death. We must contribute to a tax structure that subsidizes married heterosexual couples. We must fight continually just to preserve our families.

Several years ago the Reverend Moon married a large number of heterosexual couples in a mass wedding. This ceremony was used to join people together; many of them had just met, to obtain the many benefits of legal marriage. While this ceremony made a mockery of the law and real loving relationships, the government still recognized these marriages. It is an outrage that the same government will not recognize our loving relationships. It is time to demand that recognition.

On October 10, 1987, hundreds and perhaps thousands of same-sex couples will demonstrate in Washington, DC for the recognition of our relationships. This demonstration officially sponsored by the National March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights, is intended to emphasize the March demand that Lesbian and Gay domestic partners be entitled to the same rights as married heterosexual couples.

The time has come for our society to recognize the true meaning of the word 'family'. The 'ideal' or 'Leave It To Beaver' family concept of the '50s contin-

ues to be held up both socially and financially without regard to the small percentage of Americans living in that situation.

Through the tax laws, the government subsidizes the traditional families at the expense of the majority of tax payers. After years of living together and sharing our financial burdens, same-sex couples can still not file a joint tax return. We must continue to check "single". It is time to remove family structure from the tax tables.

Through their policies, the insurance industry ignores the existence of same-sex couples and to some extent the children of Gay and Lesbian parents. Only through court action, by the National Gay Rights Advocates, did the American Automobile Club in California extend its insurance policies to cover all co-habiting adults. They still won't let us have joint memberships with the reduced associate membership dues. It is time for all organizations to extend family status to us.

Only because they are Gay, the rights of parents to the custody of their children are constantly being denied. Most states will not let us adopt children. Many Gay parents have actually been told that they must choose between their children and their partner. It is time for the social services community to recognize our families. It is time for the government to stop destroying our families and to leave their hands off our children.

Our own families even refer to our partners as "roommate" or "friend". Too often they ignore our relationships at family gatherings. Some families even strip away shared property upon the death of one partner. It is time for our families to extend the same love that they do for other in-laws.

There is only one qualification for family, and that is love. The lawyers and politicians may need their paper definition but we have our love and commitment. Love makes a family, nothing less, nothing else.

Join us at The Wedding as a participant or supporter for equal rights. On to Washington.







**GOVERNOR'S REPORT DUE OUT SEPT. 8**  
**PHOENIX** - The front page headlines attacking politicians will be gone when Gov. Evan Mecham's fourth tabloid in a year is mailed to nearly 1 million voters around Sept. 8.

In their place will be a color photo of Mecham wearing a T-shirt with an anti-drug slogan. An aide described the publication as a good-news project.

Although some companies refused to buy advertisements, the publication's ad director, Tom Wilmet, said 97 percent of the advertising space has been spoken for. The publication date was delayed a week because of trouble getting advertising business.

The private corporation listed as publisher, Constituents Communications, probably will publish a pro-Mecham quarterly. It is headed by Mecham's brother, Wayne.

**FEINSTEIN RAISES FUNDS FOR POPE'S VISIT TO S.F.**  
**SAN FRANCISCO, CA** - The Sisters of Perpetual Indulgence, survivors of the Jewish Holocaust, feminists calling themselves Whores of Babylon and other protestors gathered outside the home of San Francisco Mayor Dianne Feinstein to demonstrate her hosting a fundraiser for Pope John Paul II's visit to the Bay Area.

According to a bylined story in the New York Native, a Gay survivor of the Holocaust, who was incarcerated in Auschwitz for being a Jew in the Nazi-occupied Netherlands, said he objected to Jews raising funds for the Pope's visit after the Pope's recent official reception of the Austrian President Kurt Waldheim who has been accused of war crimes during the Third Reich.

It is expected that thousands of Jews - as well as other Gays, Lesbians, and feminists - will turn out in force to protest the Pope's visit to San Francisco.

**FALWELL DEFENDS LOAN DEALINGS OF MINISTRY, POLITICAL GROUPS**  
**LYNCHBURG, VA (AP)** - The Rev. Jerry Falwell says loans exchanged between his religious ministry and his political organizations were lawful and ethical.

The News & Daily Advance reported that over the past four years Falwell's political groups and his Old-Time Gospel Hour religious ministry have made loans to each other totaling more than \$2 million.

In the seven months ending Jan. 31, 1987, Falwell's Liberty Federation loaned the Old-Time Gospel Hour \$1.2 million, and the religious ministry made a loan of \$318,441 to the political organization, the newspaper said.

The newspaper reported earlier that the political organizations also made grants totaling \$6.7 million to the religious ministry. Until recently, Falwell had insisted that the religious ministry was separate from his political organizations.

**NEW DEFINITIONS BOOSTS AIDS COUNT**  
**ATLANTA, GA (AP)** - Beginning September 1, the number of American with AIDS will increase as much as 15 percent because of a new definition for the deadly disease.

The national Centers for Disease Control will begin listing in its AIDS statistics patients whose physicians may have presumed they had the deadly disease but whose cases lacked laboratory confirmation.

As a result, more American than ever before will be deemed AIDS victims - now more than 40,000 - and AIDS fatalities, which now number more than 23,000.

HOW MUCH IS TOO MUCH?

The evening of August 16, NORTHWEST AIRLINE flight 255 crashed.

Since then, I have learned more about the passengers on the plane; those who —through some quirk of fate— should have been passengers on the plane, but were not; those who were driving past the airport, and were killed when the plane went down; those who were going to drive by the airport, but changed their minds at the last minute; those who were originally planning a trip to Detroit, but cancelled for some reason; those who are or were planning trips to Detroit within the foreseeable future, but who might not, now; the parents of those killed; the families of those killed; the friends, neighbors, co-workers or those killed and the friend of a friend of some guy who once worked next to the building which once house a company which —at one time— employed some woman whose recent ex-husband knew some other woman who had a neighbor whose paper-boy knew a guy who nearly was on the doomed plane, that I care to know now or ever.

Am I the only one? Or do you get the idea that way too much is being made about the airplane crash. Or any airplane crash for that matter.

When someone dies in a fiery car wreck on the freeway, we hear the name, see some vid-clips of the wreck, and maybe —a couple of days later, if we're lucky— a piece on the news about the funeral or memorial service. Who were

these people? Are they not important, too?

When a gun-toting crazy goes wild and kills a handful of people in a shopping mall or a fast-food restaurant, we hear of those killed —if we're lucky— bunched into a group of "Fifteen men and women killed..." or, "The gunman killed seven and wounded four others". Who are these people? Are they not important, too?

What makes a plane crash —a not-uncommon event— so special, so different that encourages print and broadcast media to go berserk with all the details—you-never-wanted-to-know about those who died? Do we, the viewing public, get the media we deserve? Are we so obsessed with the tiniest details of a tragedy, that we crave for —and thereby encourage media to provide— each and every minuscule point-of-fact?

Although I cannot explain the actions of the respective media, I can tell you that we are NOT detail-hungry. Death occurs. It is all around us.

Yes, people are affected by death. Yes, there is a period of mourning through which each of us must go when faced with a death in order to move on; move toward the rest of our lives. After all, what is life, other than that which occurs between the day we are born and the day we die?

Death will be an all too intimate friend to us all, one day. Is it necessary for us to preoccupy ourselves with its fine points

before we must?

Understand, I am not suggesting we fine-tune death until it is nothing more than a quoted statistic. No, we must be aware of death, and those events —whether accidental or planned— which cause it. But it is hardly necessary to reconstruct a complete moment-by-moment account of the life of those recently deceased.

Grief is a private thing. I think organizations of the media intrude, invade and infringe upon that most private of moments by splashing page after page, and minute after minute of vid-clips, upon the rest of us. Tell us who they were, where they lived, what they did, and how they are remembered. Then, leave them alone.
