TUCSON - On Friday, Aug 28 at a Mecham Recall Wine and Cheese fundraising party, Ed Buck founder of the Recall committee and its current President Garry Smith were guests of honor from Phoenix.

An interview was taped for viewing on Cable Channel 37's "Progressive Video". This video will be seen at a later date. Here however, is a transcript of that interview between Ed Buck and Tucson Recall Director Bill Christie. An OBSERVER exclusive.

C. What was your motivation for setting up the Mecham Recall Committee?

B. My motivation is like everyone else. The night Evan Mecham got elected, I was amazed. This man was elected with 40% of the vote. I said, "We've got to watch this guy". I set up the Mecham Watchdog Committee in December, before he was inaugurated. By about March I decided that enough had happened to form the Mecham Recall Committee, and later the Mecham Recall Committee, Inc.

C. When did the Watchdog lead to the Recall? I mean there had to be some point in time when you actually decided you wanted to recall?

B. I think the momentum was building - Ted Humes was placed in RUCO, Susan Williams had been sacked; we had seen some of the appointments; we had seen Bill Heisler threaten to break a chair over Larry Lopez's head. I mean, the events were getting more and more bizarre. It became a public embarrassment. Conventions were cancelling. Now we're clearly going to have a huge financial loss. The worst thing of all is Arizona's reputation has suffered, and a reputation is something that takes years to establish and mere days to destroy. Evan Mecham is working at destroying our reputation - it is time to act.

C. I know the feedback we get from people signing petitions. People come from visiting different states and say people tell them, "Yeah, you're from that state that's got that idiot for governor," and that's the terms they use. "He is an embarrassment to us all, we've got to sign the petition." Did you feel that this was going to be a success or feel that we've got to do this regardless?

B. Well, I've always said that we've got to do this regardless, and today I say we have to do it regardless. When I hear people say "Hey, we've got to worry about who we're going to run before we can go on with this recall." Absolutely not! We have to do the recall to make a strong statement that says we're not racist here. We're not bigots. We're not Neanderthals from the 1940s. We are the most progressive, fastest growing state in the nation. We need to assert ourselves and get these people involved in the political process so that they can take back the future. This state has to move forward as the fastest growing state and it needs to promote a progressive image that'll be appealing.

You know, you say that throughout the country people are talking about how bad the reputation of Arizona has become. The fact of the matter is Arizona's reputation not only suffers all over the nation but all over the world. We get people coming in from Australia. Gov. Mecham had a very unfavorable article on the front page of the London Times. I got an article from Germany. It was from the Stars and Stripes, the local military newspaper, unfavorable on Arizona. Unfortunately when the article is unfavorable on Evan Mecham, it becomes unfavorable on Arizona because he's our governor, and right now he is out there representing Arizona in a very unfavorable light.

C. You talk about people being embarrassed. One of the things I find is that Republicans are signing with great regularity because they feel that he doesn't represent their Republican interests - he doesn't think like a Republican, and yet we get people who say, "Well, you've got to support him because he's a Republican and Republican's are supposed to support him." And I find it refreshing that members of the Republican party are signing the petitions about as regularly as the Democrats are because they feel that he doesn't represent their interests. What do you feel about that?

B. The issue of Evan Mecham has crossed party lines. It's crossed racial lines. It's crossed religious lines. This is not a political event. This is a historic event that with more social impact. It is getting people more

Papal tour to focus on sex and marriage

VATICAN CITY (AP) - Under Pope John Paul II, the Vatican has closely scrutinized an American church it sees as short on discipline and long on dissent.

Birth control, divorce, homosexuality, the role of women in the church and dissidence among U.S. Roman Catholic clergy are among the themes expected to be raised by the pope during his 10-day American tour, which begins this week. The pope will be in Phoenix on Monday, Sept. 14, for a full day of activities.

"I think the pope cannot avoid saying something on these specific issues," Vatican spokesman Joaquin Navarro said. "...He is representing the moral approach of the church to those problems."

Vatican officials and U.S. prelates stress the vitality of 52-million-member American church, noting that attendance rates at Mass are among the highest in the Western world. They also openly concede that genuine differences exist.

"If you are referring to some problems between the American church and the Holy See, nobody can deny that. It's obvious," Navarro said in an interview with The Associated Press.

Focusing on the differences, he added, would mean "ignoring the majority of American Catholics."

Recent conflict between Rome and the U.S. church involved the Vatican's disciplinary action last year against Archbishop Raymond Hunthausen of Seattle and the Rev. Charles Curran, a theology professor at Catholic University of America in Washington, DC.


Hunthausen was forced to give up some authority to a Vatican-appointed auxiliary bishop after being found too liberal in such areas as ministry to homosexuals and the dispensation of absolution for sin to large groups. The Vatican restored his powers this May.

Curran was stripped of his right to teach theology because he had taken issue with the church's opposition to artificial birth control, abortion, divorce and homosexual acts. He had also argued that masturbation, premarital sex, euthanasia and sterilization were justified under some circumstances.

Several U.S. bishops publicly criticized both actions, charging that the Vatican was rigidly


COCPLS/ARIZONA TO HOST "A BLAST FROM THE PAST"





involved in the political process than any single event in Arizona history. More people are registering to vote. More people are becoming organized, and I think what's happening is that sleeping giant, that large group of people who traditionally don't even register to vote are waking up and saying, "Oh, if we don't get involved, we pay the price. It's time for us to wake up." So the significant thing we see happening here, beside the recall of Evan Mecham, is all these people waking up to the reality of what happens when they don't get involved.

C. You know, the nice part of it is, I would say here in Tucson, 99% of the people that are carrying petitions have never done that before. And one of the things I like about this whole thing is that we are creating a whole new bunch of concerned citizens. Now, personally I feel, and I know you do, that we are going to win this. And we've created a whole bunch of people that are activists, and this is a force to be reckoned with in the future of Arizona. These people will become winners. Everybody who signed a petition, everyone who has carried a petition is going to be a winner. And when we win this thing, they're gonna say, "Look at me, I'm a winner! I'm gonna do this again!" And what does this say to the rest of the state?

B. I think you bring up a very good and important point, and that is that people are now getting involved in the political process and instead of feeling impotent, like they have no real effect, they know that they're going to be a winner, they're going to sign that petition and they're going to part of the greatest political movement this state has ever seen. They know that when Ev Mecham is removed from office, it's because of their signature, they're a part of it. And that is going to encourage people, like you say, to continue to be involved - very important.

C. We had a big purge last year, which has been a major problem. We have had to re-register a lot of people to vote, and I will say we have probably reached the very vast majority that was purged. They are now back on the rolls. It was probably not intended in the political system to begin with. But because of this movement, I do have to say that we found a lot of these people and they are re-registering. They have told me personally that they are not going to let this happen again. They are going to vote and they are going to get more politically involved. Again, this has got a lot to say for the future of the state. How do you see this affecting the state politically?

B. Well, I think, unfortunately, there has been an attitude among some elected officials, Evan Mecham is a very good example, and that is, you can only be involved in the political process if you fit certain criteria. I personally stand as a very good example of an individual who did not fit that criteria. As a Gay man I was told by Evan Mecham and other people who supported him that I had no right to be involved in the political process. Absolutely wrong! Every man and woman out there have every right to be involved in the political process, regardless of their views, regardless of whether they're conservative or liberal, regardless of the fact that the majority of people don't agree with them. That is what makes democracy great - everyone should be involved in the political process, everyone should express themselves, and everyone has the right, not only to express their selves politically, but to run for office, as Evan Mecham has proven. Certainly someone that far out of the political mainstream who runs and wins

C. We have been doing a lot of work on the campuses recently since school is back in session and I've seen a lot more interest and a lot more people getting involved on campus than ever before. People know what's going on and they're more alert to the problems in this state. They've heard about Evan Mecham. I am really impressed with young people in particular, deciding that they're going to get more active. Again, what does that say for our fast-growing state and most of the concerns are for the increased population?

B. The good news here again, is the involvement of the people. That the people are waking up. The people are feeling that they can be a part of the system.

C. Mecham tries to point out or blame things on certain groups of people, and the people I see coming in and signing petitions come from all walks of life. I've done a lot of initiative and I've never seen anything like this. I've seen senior citizens, young people, Gays and women and everyone come together. When Evan Mecham says publicly that "I'm the best thing that ever happened to Arizona!"

B. That's the one thing that I have to agree with Evan Mecham about, in a very left-handed way. He doesn't realize how good the effect. I think the ultimate statement about how good he has been for Arizona when he has finally been recalled. It will make everyone feel really quite good. Really!

You know the other thing about it is there are basically two types of people who don't have an opinion. What amazed me from the beginning of this campaign until now is that in the beginning the percentage of people expressing no opinion was somewhere around 34%. A large portion supported the recall, a large portion did not. 34% said "No Opinion". In the latest poll, that number shrank down to an amazing 5%! Which leads me to believe that there are basically two types of people who don't have an opinion: Those who have had a frontal lobotomy, and those who are simply incognizant or are somewhere in a coma and don't know what's going on.

Everyone in the state knows what's going on, and practically everyone has an opinion. And that is also a very good sign.

C. We have people who come up to our tables and ask, "Why should I sign this petition?" I usually tell them that I can't tell them why. I tell them that I have certain reasons and everyone has different reasons. Can you give us some of the reasons why people are signing the petitions in record numbers?

B. As I said, the polls show that approximately 66% perhaps of the people in Arizona support Mecham being recalled from office. That amounts to over 2 million people! Among those 2 million people there are also 2 million reasons why they want Mecham recalled. It's like he is so good at generating reasons for his removal that now 2 million people each have their own reason that they don't have to share with anyone. That's what is amazing about the man.

Overall, there seems to be a feeling that he doesn't represent me, he embarrasses me. They all cite different issues, they all cite education being cut, they all cite, especially the senior citizens, the NUCO issue, the anti-consumer stance he has taken, the environmentalists are incredibly upset over Mount Graham, the nuclear waste dump. A lot of reasons but they all boil down to "He doesn't represent me, he embarrasses me."

C. About the most flack we get are from people from the far right or from the Young Republicans on campus who say, "How many people do you have signing? And we tell them we have this many people and probably almost half of them are Republicans. And they say, "Well, those people aren't our type of Republicans!"

B. You have to wonder just how rigid can they be. And when are they going to reach the point where they are going to say "Hey, this man is not serving our interests!" It always amazes me who talk about their support for Evan Mecham being so unwavering and remaining so unwavering because Evan Mecham is a good, honest and righteous and holy man. Do these people not realize that Evan Mecham is a convicted liar! That the state Supreme Court twice upheld that Evan Mecham is guilty personally of fraud and misrepresentation. Don't they see that he's a blatant liar in the handling of the Fred Craft lobbying effort? Don't they see the political cronyism going on here? The highly unethical handling of the land sale in north Scottsdale? Costing the state of Arizona between 63 and 96 million dollars!

We cannot allow our children to believe that Evan Mecham is an ethical man, that he's an honest man, because what we then do is set up a role model that has Evan Mecham as the Honest man. Our children will see that this is not an honest man and they will think that they also can commit these acts and they will be in the framework of honesty.

C. What do you seem happening with the Recall between now and November 3rd?

B. What we need is people to get rid of the attitude that they may have that "the Recall is so successful therefore I don't need to help". We do need your help! We need your volunteer support and we need your dollars. We need donations to make this thing work. There's a large job of verifying signatures that is going to rather expensive - \$30,000! Our average contribution is \$15.57. We need each and every individual who feels strongly about the recall to express how they feel. Come on in and volunteer some time, take a petition and circulate it among their friends, among new friends and certainly to donate whatever

amount they can. The reality of it is that it is going to take money to make it work.

C. I know that you agree with me that this is such a historical event, a campaign such as this has never happened before, that I've ever seen in this country. The number of people we have signing petitions - and turning out a man in a recall election in a state of this size or any size - it's never happened. Think of the historical element. It's a fantastic feeling to be a part of such a movement.

B. I am the proverbial political neophyte. I haven't really been involved in politics to any great extent until this recall came up. I understand that some say the Mecham Recall Committee is not a political party and we are not political, but we are called by some as the third political party. And the reason is that we have more active membership than the combined Republican and Democratic Party precinct committeemen.


We are probably more pervasive at this point that either political party or both political parties combined. And that also says something for the strength of this movement. It is truly a grassroots movement. I think we will go down in history and I think the way people are talking about this all over the country; the way the press is receiving this all over this country and other parts of the world. And Arizonans who are maybe not aware of this, you can go to most any state in the union or a lot of countries all over the world and they know who Evan Mecham is, probably more so that some people in this state. They know what he has done and hasn't done. So people are reading about this. So we are in the news all over the country. And if you are participating in this in any way, you can be assured that this is a historical event that will be written up in the history of this country for a long time to come. And again, nothing of this dimension has ever taken place anywhere in this country. So when you participate in this, and this is going to be a success, I mean this is going to be written up in history for a long time. I don't want to say the we are going to determine what say happen in other places in the country in the future, but people seem to be taking more charge of their government than ever before.

S.F. Supervisors 'sell out' to Navy

SAN FRANCISCO, CA (GCN) - The Board of Supervisors moved one step closer to allowing the homeporting of the U.S. Navy's nuclear Battleship, The Missouri, angering the Lesbian and Gay community and complicating this city's race for mayor. Critics claim the Board of Supervisors has sold out protections for Gay men and Lesbians by passing an agreement with the Navy that will not insure enforcement of the city's anti-discrimination laws.

The issue of whether the Navy will comply with San Francisco's laws was raised by State Assemblyman Art Agnos in a recent mayoral candidate's debate. Agnos pointed out that he debate with City Supervisor John Molinari that the latest Department of Defense regulations prohibit enlistment of those who engage in "perverted or deviant sexual behavior," which includes transsexualism, transvestism, exhibitionism, incest, child molestation, voyeurism, bestiality or sodomy.

Molinari, in response to Agnos' charge, co-sponsored an amendment to the city's agreement with the Navy that would refer discrimination cases to the San Francisco Human Rights Commission for arbitration. But Norm Nickens, director of the Commission, told GCN that the amendment "amounts to nothing... We have no control over enlistees, or over federal employees. This is not a legally binding document."

The amendment states, "It is the policy of the Navy, pursuant to federal law and regulation, and [of] the city not to discriminate against any civilian employee applicant for civilian employment or contractor because of sexual orientation." The amendment refers to Title Seven of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 and the Age Discrimination Act of 1967. None of these acts includes sexual orientation as a protected category.

Agnos and Gay city supervisor Harry Britt opposed the amendment and were particularly angered by the statement, "the Navy does not discriminate against Lesbians and Gay men. Britt, at an August 3 meeting of the Board of Supervisors, shouted, "That is a lie. Don't put that language in.... Nothing is better than this hypocrisy. Harvey Milk would not have allowed that lie to pass and neither will I."

The Board of Supervisors passed the amendment on August 21 by a 6-5 vote.

Molinari and San Francisco Mayor Dianne Feinstein claim that the agreement is strong and that it is a "historic first for the Gay community." Dennis Collins, Molinari's liaison to the Gay community, said "This may not be as strong as Britt would have liked, but it is still very good. As far as I know this is the first time a city has ever forced the Navy into respecting the rights of its citizens." Collins pointed out that Britt is still supporting Molinari's campaign for mayor and accused Agnos of "political demagoguery." "Art Agnos had plenty of military contracts come across his desk while he served in the legislature and not once did he raise the issue," he said.

Cathy Gilbert of the Lawyer's Guild in San Diego said that even if the Navy abides by the anti-discrimination clause, only civilian employees are protected. Uniformed personnel are still bound by "homophobic and sexist regulations."

Director of the National Lawyers Guild in San Francisco, Regina Sneed, said the city of San Francisco has no legal means of enforcing the agreement with the Navy. According to legal experts,

federal law supersedes local law in this case. Since Title Seven of the Federal Code prohibits discrimination on race, sex and age, but does not mention sexual preference, Sneed said that Congress would have to amend Title Seven in order to force the military to comply with the city's law.

Feinstein, who threatened to withdraw her endorsement of Molinari for mayor if he voted against the Navy, has lobbied extensively for the porting. She argues that it would create as many as 2,000 new jobs for the depressed Hunters Point shipyard area of the city. She claims the city has been economically damaged by the recent loss of several major corporate headquarters. Last fall, in a city-wide referendum, strict limits were imposed on new construction.

Opponents of homeporting cite several problems in addition to the Navy's history of homophobia. Sneed told GCN that The Missouri should not be ported regardless of the discrimination issue. She said the ecological damage to the San Francisco Bay could be considerable. More importantly, taxpayer money used for the port should not be spent on "a war machine - this is a peace-loving city," she said. The Missouri patrols international waters off Nicaragua and the straits of Hormuz near Iran.

DOUBLE JEOPARDY
A friend once described a formative experience in his life to me, "I remember vividly; the excitement building at first slowly, surely. The sensations overwhelmed me... Then before I knew it, it was over. When I awoke, I wanted to do it again. Over and over again..." He could easily have been describing a sexual experience, but he happened to be talking about taking cocaine intravenously. Both sex and drugs can have a compulsive grip upon one. And compulsion can lead to addiction, whether it be looking for sex or looking for a fix.

Unfortunately these days one may acquire more than ecstasy while trying to fulfill compulsions. Many Gay men who have AIDS in this country also have used intravenous drugs. Because the virus that causes AIDS is carried in the blood, sharing a needle with a friend or a lover when shooting drugs is a much more efficient way of spreading the AIDS virus than having sex. And if one has acquired the virus through drug use, one can spread the virus sexually (and of course, the reverse is also true).

So, if you choose to indulge in intravenous drugs, you might wish to take some precautions. The best solution is not to share needles. A less safe alternative is to soak the disassembled needle and 'works' in a 10% bleach solution for 15 minutes. Or, a recent study has shown that vodka, dish detergent, rubbing alcohol or wine will also kill the virus (although beer and cola didn't seem to be up to the task). If you're in a rush, at least reduce your risk by rinsing the needle twice with full strength bleach, and then twice more with water.

So, the next time you feel a compulsion, why don't you temper it with a bit of precaution. If you want to have sex, use a condom. If you're going to do drugs, don't share needles. Won't you feel better if you learn to play safely all the time?


