## 'Hate Crimes' bill passes, Stump, Kyle vote no

WASHINGTON, DC - A 'hate crimes' bill requiring the government to keep figures on violence motivated by prejudice is on its way to the Senate, complete with a provision to tabulate crimes against homosexuals.

The House passed the Hate Crimes Statistics Act 383-29 after overwhelmingly rejecting an attempt to remove attacks on homosexuals from the hate crimes list.

A nearly six-year campaign by the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF) to obtain a federal response to anti-Gay/Lesbian violence led to passage of the bill on May 18 in the U.S. House of Representatives.

The bill marks the first time either Congressional body has passed a bill favorably addressing a Gay and Lesbian issue. The bill requires the federal collection of statistics on crimes motivated by prejudice based on "race, religion, homosexuality or heterosexuality, and ethnicity." A companion bill, S.2000, awaits further action in the Senate.

"This overwhelming victory is not only exciting but historic," said NGLTF Anti-Violence Project Director Kevin Berrill. "While Congress continues to permit discrimination against Gay and Lesbian people in employment, housing and other areas, this vote at least acknowledges that the federal government does have a duty to protect Lesbian and Gay

people from the violence and the threat of violence, which are the most fundamental violations of our human and civil rights."

"For the first time in history the U.S. House has demonstrated a concern for oppression that Gay men and women face every day," said Carlton Lee, lobbyist for the Human Rights Campaign Fund (HRCF).

NGLTF Lobbyist Peri Jude Radevic credited the large margin of the vote in part to the grassroots organizing and support given the bill by the Gay and Lesbian community nationwide. Berrill cited in particular letters of support written by hundreds of individuals, local constituent lobbying, and widespread coalition support garnered by NGLTF.

The Hate Crimes bill directs the Justice department to compile and publish annual, confidential data on crimes of bias, including homicide, assault, robbery, burglary, theft, arson, vandalism, trespass, threat and other crimes.

During the floor debate, an amendment to remove the sexual orientation clause was initiated by Rep. George Gekas (R-PA). In a compromise arranged by supporters of the bill, a substitute amendment defining sexual orientation as "homosexuality or heterosexuality" was proposed by Rep. John Miller (R-WA). Miller's amendment also notes the bill does not create a right for an individual to bring action complaining of discrimination based on homosexual-

ity. However, supporters still accepted the substitute amendment given the irrelevance of the discrimination clause to the original purpose of the bill. The substitute amendment stated that "Nothing in this act creates a right for an individual to bring action complaining of discrimination based on homosexuality." The substitute amendment passed by a vote of 383-30.

"We were prepared for attempts to remove Gay and Lesbian victims of violence from the bill's coverage," said Radevic. "The extensive constituent lobbying we did, the lobbying by our broad coalition of 53 organizations, and the floor leadership of our House supporters, like Rep. John Miller (R-WA), Rep. Connie Morella (R-MD) and Rep. Barney Frank (D-MA) was instrumental to our success."

Statistics gathered as a result of the bill are needed to enable authorities to know the extent and frequency of hate crimes. A recent report sponsored by the National Institute of Justice indicated widespread violence against blacks, Hispanics, Southeast Asians, Jews and Gays and Lesbians. "Homosexuals are probably the most frequent victims," the report stated.

NGLTF reported almost 5,000 incidents of hate crimes motivated by sexual orientation in 1986, up from 2,000 in 1985.

"It's obvious the bill needed to include Gays and Lesbians," said Stephen Smith, HRCF lobbyist. "That was made clear by the support of a broad coalition of civil rights, religious and law enforcement organizations. With the exception of the Dirty Thirty who voted against the substitute amendment, all Representatives should be thanked for their support. Among the 'Dirty Thirty' who voted against the amendment were Arizona Republican Representatives Bob Stump (Dist. 3) and Jon Kyle (Dist. 4).

The bill was introduced by Rep. John Conyers (D-MI) in the fall of 1987. NGLTF, HRCF, ACLU, NOW, were among 53 organizations called Organizations for Hate Crime Prevention who lobbied undecided representatives and pushed for acceptance of the Miller substitute amendment. The group also included the American Jewish Council, the American Psychological Association, and People for the American Way.

NGLTF took the lead in securing 109 co-sponsors of the bill, the largest number to ever co-sponsor a measure containing a sexual orientation clause. HRCF's grassroots mobilization group, the Fairness Fund, generated more than 3,000 pro-Gay mailgrams from congressional districts around the nation.

The Senate version of the bill, S 2000 by Senator Alan Cranston (D-CA) is currently pending in Judiciary Committee.

## Gay Dems act on Olympics

WASHINGTON, DC - The National Association of Gay and Lesbian Democratic Clubs today released a copy of a letter sent to the U.S. Olympic Committee in response to their request for NAGLDC support for a U.S. Olympic bid. The letter explained NAGLDC's refusal by saying, "We would like very much to participate in this effort - as Olympic supporters and as American citizens, we view the prospect of the Winter games in Anchorage as an exciting one. But we simply cannot support this effort because of the Olympic Committee's blatant homophobia."

The letter was sent to members of Alaska's Congressional delegation as well as 1988 U.S. Gold Medal winners, demanding that the committee take action to reverse its position proscribing the use of the word olympics by organizers of the Gay Games. It noted that, "the committee has forced Gay and Lesbian athletes, through costly court action, to refrain from using the word Olympics in describing the Gay Games. This action has not been taken against others, like the Special Olympics, and thus shows all too clearly the prejudice of Olympic organizers."

NAGLDC has not yet received a response to the letter which is reprinted below in its entirety:

Dear Senator Stevens,  
"We are writing in response to your letter of February 6, 1988 inviting the National Association

of Gay and Lesbian Democratic Clubs to contribute to the effort to bring the Olympics to America in 1994.

"We would like very much to participate in this effort - as Olympic supporters and as American citizens, we view the prospect of the Winter games in Anchorage as an exciting one. But we simply cannot support this effort because of the Olympic Committee's blatant homophobia.

"As you are well aware, the Committee has forced Gay and Lesbian athletes, through costly court action, to refrain from using the word Olympics in describing the Gay Games. This action has not been taken against others, like the Special Olympics and thus shows all too clearly the prejudice of Olympic organizers.

"Such discrimination is contrary both to our American principles of respect for the individual and protection of the rights of all, and to the Olympic tradition of fair play.

"Only action from the Olympic Committee can change our stance. Unless the position of the Committee is reversed, we will be forced to take further action with the International Olympic Committee.

"We want the Olympics in Anchorage - we want to show the world what America really stands for - liberty and justice for all."

## Saliva can block AIDS virus?

CHICAGO, IL (AP) - Human saliva contains a factor that blocks the AIDS virus from infecting cells, so the body might have a natural defense against the deadly disease, preliminary studies have indicated.

The results might lead to discovery of a natural immunization against AIDS, said one researcher, Irwin Mandel, director of Columbia University's Center for Clinical Research in Dentistry.

"Fears about kissing, contact with eating implements and so on could be dispelled by this kind of evidence," said Enid Neidle, assistant director of the Chicago-based American Dental Association.

Isolating and understanding the inhibitory element in saliva may help researchers learn how to naturally prevent the transmission of the virus, said Philip Fox, head of clinical studies at the National Institute of Dental Research. "This shows a natural defense that people have against the AIDS virus," Fox said.

The research also provides a biological explanation of why the mouth isn't a transmission route for the disease, Fox said. That's good news for dentists and others concerned about catching AIDS through contact with the saliva of infected people.

"This supports biologically what we have been seeing epidemiologically," Mandel said. "There is essentially no chance of transmission of the virus through saliva."

Fox and four co-workers collected saliva samples from the mouths of three healthy men and secretions directly from the major salivary glands.

None of the three was at risk for acquired immune deficiency syndrome, which destroys the body's defenses against disease.

The samples were mixed with human immunodeficiency virus-1 (HIV), the virus that causes AIDS and with lymphocytes - immune system cells that are the major targets for the virus. The virus wasn't able to infect the lymphocytes in the saliva or the secretions from the submandibular and sublingual glands at the bottom of the mouth, the researchers found. Fox said the inhibitory element might interfere with the receptors through which white blood cells are infected by the AIDS virus.

Researchers now must isolate the HIV-neutralizing element in saliva, find out how it works and then learn how to activate it in the body as a defense against AIDS, Mandel said.

**HOLLYWOOD:**  
**AIDS NOT JUST ITS PROBLEM**  
UNIVERSAL CITY, CA (AP) - Four Hollywood unions spent \$6.8 million on treatment for 138 AIDS patients by early this year, but a representative of producers and studios says the problem is no worse than in other industries.

Nicholas Counter III, president of the Alliance of Motion Picture and Television Producers, said he was sure that the figures from union health insurance funds were "understated" because some AIDS insurance claims may be reported as related diseases rather than AIDS.

Counter's remarks represent the first time anyone has attempted to compile statistics on the number of AIDS patients whose care is being paid by health insurance funds serving the entertainment industry's five major unions.

But he dismissed fears that AIDS can be spread by casual contact, including on movie and television filming sets, and said he was convinced the deadly disease, which cripples the body's immune system, cannot be spread by so-called "deep kissing" by actors and actresses.

"I don't see that this problem is any worse or any less in our industry than in all industries," Counter said at a conference titled "Managing AIDS at Work."

He urged entertainment unions and companies to "wage war on this disease on four fronts" - education, prevention, research and care.

The insurer providing coverage for one of the industry's five funds - the American Federation of Television and Radio Artists Health and Retirement Funds - refused to provide statistics on the number of its 22,000 members who have AIDS or the cost of their care.

**DEFECTIVE CONDOMS DECLINE**  
MIAMI BEACH, FL (AP) - Fewer defective condoms are showing up on the U.S. market, although more than 33 million condoms were recalled or rejected in the last year, a federal study says.

Only about four of every 1,000 domestic condoms were deemed defective, an improvement from a 4.8 defective rate last year, said Dr. Doyle C. Smith of the Food and Drug Administration, which tested 115,000 condoms for such problems as pinholes and tears.

Imported condoms proved more risky, with a defective rate of 6.5 per 1,000, which was still a drop from last year's rate of 7.3.

The FDA testing that ended last month resulted in more than 30 million imported condoms being kept from distribution and 3 million domestic condoms taken off the shelves in 19 recalls, according to the study.

"Although the level of defects in condoms has dropped, there is a need to continually improve the defective rate," Smith said.





# A REMARKABLE PEOPLE

I keep reading in the paper and seeing on TV about "AIDS victims" but they're always referring to people with AIDS, not the real victims of this plague, those so afraid that they are willing to deny their God, their jobs and responsibilities, their humanity.

Now, my dictionary defines victims as a "living creature sacrificed in performance of religious ceremony; person or thing destroyed or sacrificed; dupe or prey." None of these definitions fit any person with AIDS that I've ever met. Sure, they're sick, often suffering a great deal, but like those with cancer, those disabled, those maimed, they are usually able to find the inner strength they need to keep going in as human a means as possible.

However there is one woman at Tucson Medical Center who has been duped at the very least, sacrificed at the most. I recently met a FWA who'd had an accident and ended up at TMC for what was supposed to be a three week stay. He checked out against his doctor's wishes after a few days because he was literally starving. This woman, this health care professional, wouldn't even take him his food because she was afraid for her children.

To me, this poor, scared woman, willing to deny her responsibilities and her own humanity is a sacrificial lamb offered up at the altar of ignorance where so many of our religious and secular leaders would have us pray. She is a true victim of AIDS.

As angry as I am at people like this woman, at those doctors and nurses who refuse to treat FWA's, those morticians who refuse to embalm them and those poor pathetic parents who keep their children home from school because another student has AIDS, I can't hate them, only pity them. It must be horrible to live like that, to be that afraid, that ignorant, and that unaware of a common humanity with those afflicted.

Since my involvement on several different levels with the


AIDS crisis I've had two very dear friends ask me not to bring any of my new friends to their homes. Both of these women cited the three percent cases where the means of transmission is unknown as the basis for their fears. These women are two of the most incredibly intelligent and caring people I have ever met. And these two women who are sisters should be very well aware of how strong denial can be. One's husband has denied his own sexual escapades for years, even to me. He will admit to being "mildly" bisexual, but his wife, his wife's sister and I all know that he frequently stops at bookstores on his way home from work, and that he has even brought tricks home when his wife's not there. And I know some of the men he's been with.

He is neither discriminating nor cautious. Yet he will flat out deny having sex with men to all except those he's having sex with and a couple others to whom he will downplay both the frequency and the meaning of his encounters. Now surely, when the two primary routes of transmission, male to male sex, and drug use are so socially unacceptable, and denial so powerful, that little three percent becomes even more insignificant.

I shudder to admit it, but I partially agree with Jerry Falwell Jesse Helms and those other ideologues of Hate who claim that AIDS was sent by God to punish homosexuals. Yes, I believe that AIDS was indeed sent by God but not to punish. I think instead it was sent to test humanity, to find out who truly cares about their fellow man, to find out which christians are actually lip-service christians, and to find the limits that each individual will set for caring about someone they didn't even know. If I'm right, then right now there are few homosexuals going to hell, but an awful lot of non-Gays are, including many of our highest ranking religious and temporal leaders. At least they won't be alone, in between televised religious services they can hold presidential elections, and recall elections.



## ACLU AIDS policy papers defend civil liberties

NEW YORK, NY - A series of twelve AIDS policy papers issued last week by the AIDS and Civil Liberties Project of the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) explain why a sound public health response to AIDS includes strong protections for civil liberties.

The ACLU's twelve new AIDS policy papers discuss restrictions on educational materials; quarantine of HIV-infected persons; mandatory name reporting; contact tracing; premarital testing; criminalizing transmission of the HIV virus; insurance issues; testing health care workers; hospital patients; prostitutes; intravenous drug use and AIDS; and mandatory prenatal testing.

Each paper summarizes an issue, presents the best arguments for the ACLU's response to it, and includes supporting documentation.

These twelve memoranda are the first series of documents to be aimed specifically at state-level issues discussions, where many of the crucial AIDS policy decisions are being made.

The papers are also the first and only set of civil rights memoranda on AIDS which include the full range of issues for the diverse communities hardest hit by AIDS — focusing on pre-natal testing and drug abuse policy issues, for example, as well as contact tracing and insurance issues.

"Our new policy papers artic-

ulate what public health experts have repeatedly stressed, the basic congruence of public health and civil liberties interests," said Nan D. Hunter, Director of the national ACLU's AIDS and Civil Liberties Project. "They refute the recent Justice Department memo urging the Reagan administration officials to 'polarize the debate' on issues such as AIDS. The disease 'is not a civil rights or privacy issue,' the memo said, 'but one of public health and safety' — thus setting up what the ACLU sees as a bogus conflict between public health and civil liberties.

"The political view reflected in that memo actually harms the public health it so hypocritically pretends to support," Hunter said.

"Because AIDS is so emotionally charged an issue," Hunter declared, "even those dedicated to the most rational and effective social response may disagree about the best response. We're therefore offering these policy papers as a way of clarifying and deepening discussion of the issues."

The ACLU's twelve AIDS Policy Papers are summarized here:

\* **Restrictions on Educational Materials.** Senator Jesse Helms' and others' proposals to ban educational materials on safer sex practices will actually increase the spread of AIDS. Public health officials universally oppose such restrictions on educational materials because education is now the only way to combat the transmission AIDS. Banning safer sex materials aimed specifically at homosexuals is discriminatory because it mandates less effective health information for one group of citizens. It is also highly suspect on First Amendment grounds.

\* **Isolation or Quarantine of HIV-Infected Persons.** Because AIDS is not casually transmitted, there is no public health rationale for the extreme and coercive policy of quarantine. Medical isolation could be justified only in the rare case of the infectious individual who, after intensive counseling, refuses to alter behavior. Stringent due process protections are essential. Any quarantine law, however, is apt to invite discrimination because the persons likely to be isolated are the poorest and least articulate (iv-drug users and prostitutes), or those traditionally subject to discrimination (gay men).

\* **Mandatory Name Reporting.** Proposals to collect the names and addresses of all persons who test positive for HIV antibodies or who have AIDS will undermine efforts to contain the spread of AIDS. The loss of confidentiality and fear of discrimination associated with name reporting are the greatest barriers to individuals voluntarily seeking HIV tests. In actual practice, mandatory name reporting has led to a decrease in testing. Name reporting does not help epidemiologists collect data on disease patterns, and is not necessary for partner notification. Name reporting is often advocated as a precursor to more repressive measures.

\* **Mandatory Contact Tracing.** Legally mandated contact tracing, in which the state requires infected individuals to name their sexual contacts, is counterproductive as a public health measure. The required naming of contacts discourages people from being tested. Mandatory contact tracing is unlikely to achieve the goal of notifying contacts because officials cannot force persons to accurately identify all their contacts. Voluntary partner notification programs, with counseling and assistance for those who want it, is more likely to elicit honest discussion of who needs to be notified and how.

\* **Mandatory Pre-Marital Testing:** Public health officials oppose premarital testing as ineffective and inefficient because (quoting the *Journal of the American Medical Association*) "universal pre-marital screening in the United States currently would detect fewer than one tenth of 1% of HIV-infected individuals." Premarital testing would divert time and money from "truly effective public health programs." Premarital testing programs in practice have had disastrous consequences, diverting attention from those most in need of care.

\* **Criminalizing Transmission of the Virus.** Laws making it a crime to knowingly transmit the HIV virus are unnecessary because the laws of every state already criminalize acts amounting to attempted homicide, and because such knowing transmission is extremely rare. New laws criminalizing transmission of the HIV virus will hurt public health: they will discourage people from seeking voluntary testing because only persons who had been tested could be charged

## 600 march for pride in Dubuque

DUBUQUE, IA - Nearly 600 Lesbian and Gay activists and their supporters marched in the Dubuque Second Annual Gay/Lesbian Pride March in what one organizer called "a dream come true." Marchers poured into Dubuque on April 30 from the upper Midwest, with busloads coming from Madison and Minneapolis, Minnesota. Other cities represented were Milwaukee, St. Louis, Chicago, Des Moines, Iowa City, Janesville, Atlanta, New York City, San Francisco, Miami and Washington, DC.

March organizer Stacey Neldaughter told the cheering crowd, "They said it couldn't be done. They said Dubuque can't be changed, but we will change Dubuque. This day is a dream come true for me."

Neldaughter reminded the crowd of the terrifying events at the first pride march, held on Sept. 19, 1987, in which 30 marchers were pelted with obscenities and eggs by about 300 angry counter demonstrators while local police watched. This year's marchers were heckled by a few observers, but Dubuque police officials adequately staffed the event and discouraged any outbreaks of violence.

Police reported that 16 eggs were confiscated during the day. One man was arrested and charged with disorderly conduct for an egg-throwing incident at last year's march and was also charged with carrying a concealed weapon at this year's event.

\*Rep. Tom Jochum (D-Dubuque)

addressed the rally, condemning acts of violence against Lesbians and Gay men. "I stand here before you today calling for an end to violence and an end to discrimination because I believe in justice. The Constitution is not negotiable."

NGLTF Privacy Project Director Sue Hyde told the crowd, "We gather in Dubuque today so that none of us, not one Lesbian and not one Gay man ever again feel afraid to walk this city's streets... We have come to Dubuque to challenge it to be the best city it can be and to recognize and welcome its Lesbian and Gay citizens. We will return to Dubuque every year until we no longer need to."

The Dubuque Human Rights Commission has agreed to consider amending the city ordinance to ban discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation. Commission chairperson Ken Hindman said in the Des Moines Register, "It's a tough problem all over Iowa. There's a real need for good workshops on homophobia."

with the crime. It is telling that already existing criminal laws have not stemmed the spread of other sexually transmitted diseases.

\* **Insurance Issues.** It is bad public policy for insurance companies to use HIV tests as a prerequisite for coverage. Arguing for such tests, insurers have overestimated their costs for insuring HIV-infected persons and ignore the costs to society of HIV-testing. If insurers are allowed to test, the cost saving will not be as great as they claim. The costs to society of mandatory HIV-screening for insurance are enormous. Forbidding HIV-screening would not be unique since, in some states, insurers are already prohibited from screening for other conditions, such as the sickle cell trait.

\* **Testing Health Care Workers.** It is illegal for a hospital to deny a job, fire, or reassign a health care worker with AIDS, ARC, or HIV infection unless the worker posed a significant risk of transmitting that condition. Mandatory testing of health care workers is not necessary because the risk of HIV transmission from workers to patients is extremely low.

\* **Testing Hospital Patients.** Testing all incoming hospital patients for the HIV virus is opposed by a great many public health experts. Health care workers can and should protect themselves from infection in all situations by following hospital guidelines. Testing all persons admitted to hospitals would be an extreme waste of resources because the cost effectiveness is so low. Denying treatment to a patient based on HIV infection would be illegal.

\* **Testing Prostitutes.** Mandatory HIV testing of all persons arrested for or convicted of prostitution is based on the false idea that female prostitutes are spreading the virus, a premise for which there is no epidemiological evidence. The acts of female prostitutes pose less risk of transmission than is often thought. Statutes which single out prostitutes, and do not penalize the same behavior by others, violate constitutional principles of equal application of the law.

\* **Mandatory Pre-Natal HIV Testing.** Compulsory HIV tests for pregnant women could deter low income women, especially, from seeking any prenatal care. Broadening access to HIV counseling and testing on a voluntary and anonymous basis will provide important information to pregnant women, without increasing the AIDS-related discrimination that women are already beginning to suffer. Counseling about AIDS and pregnancy must include the option of abortion, but not seek to coerce abortion.

\* **Intravenous Drug Use and AIDS.** It would be illegal under the federal law prohibiting discrimination based on handicap for access to drug treatment programs to be conditioned upon a negative HIV antibody test. Also vital to IV drug users are the availability of adequate health care and drug treatment programs, and adequate AIDS education information. Special confidentiality rules apply to medical records at drug treatment facilities.


