



Names Quilt nominated for Nobel Peace Prize

SAN FRANCISCO, CA - The Names Project has become one of 77 individuals and 20 groups nominated for a Nobel Peace Prize. Michael Smith, general manager of the Names Project, said it is the first time an effort of the Gay community has been so honored. The San Francisco-based organization was officially nominated for the award by Congresswomen Nancy Pelosi and Barbara Boxer. Nominations for the prestigious award closed February 1.

Reports from Norway indicate that former President Ronald Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev, who have been jointly nominated, appear to be the front runners. Reagan and Gorbachev had been expected to win the 1988 award for their efforts in bringing about the 1987 Intermediate Nuclear Force Treaty.

Other people nominated this year are Brazil's Joao Havelange of the international soccer association, FIFA; Philippine President Corazon Aquino; exiled Tibetan leader the Dalai Lama; Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi of India; and imprisoned anti-apartheid leader Nelson Mandela of South Africa.

It has been reported that the World Health Organization, the International Olympic Committee and the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestinian Refugees in the Near East are among the 20 organizations nominated.

In their letter to the Norwegian Committee, the Congresswomen wrote, "Remembering those who have died of AIDS inspires action to fight the epidemic and to respond with compassion to those now living with AIDS."

"The Names Project has made very significant progress in showing the human side of the pervasive global tragedy of AIDS," said Pelosi. "I am proud to nominate the Names Project for the Nobel Peace Prize and I hope the Nobel Committee will look favorably on our recommendation."

"The AIDS epidemic does indeed threaten peace," said Rep. Barbara Boxer. "Not between nations, of course, but in society which must struggle not only with the ravages of this disease but against fear and discrimination which threatens jobs and the very freedom to go unharassed in one's own neighborhood or school."

Boxer continued, The AIDS quilt blankets the world of prejudice and fear with a sign of hope and sews a collective human face on this disease to heal the bitterness between people."

Both Boxer and Pelosi pointed out the World Health Organization recognized the universal message of the quilt by awarding funding to continue its presentations of the quilt in foreign countries, as well as assistance for the creation of similar

projects around the world. The Names Project has chapters in West Germany, Great Britain, Canada, Australia and Brazil.

The nomination is the very first time in the history of the awards that a project or organization based in the Gay community has ever been nominated for a Nobel Peace Prize. As news of the nomination is being spread around the world, the Names Project has made a purposeful effort to emphasize the roots of the organization in the Gay community.

According to Michael Smith, a nomination for the Nobel Peace Prize can only be made by a former winner, the highest executive of a country or a member of a country's highest legislative body.

The winner of the Nobel Peace Prize receives a medallion which is awarded every December 10th, the anniversary of Alfred Nobel's death in 1896. There is also a cash prize worth \$390,000. The winner is decided by the Norwegian Nobel Committee in early October.

The Names Project quilt, which now numbers well over 9,000 panels, is set to begin its second national tour on March 17 in Salt Lake City. It will criss-cross the United States and then move through Canada. The last city on the 1989 tour is Anchorage, Alaska in August.

Arizona Gay PAC Forming

PHOENIX - A group of political activists in Phoenix have revived a formerly disbanded political action committee (PAC) in hopes of exerting greater influence on local and statewide elections in 1990 and beyond.

As an official PAC, the group plans to contribute to political campaigns, using Lesbian/Gay community issues as its yardstick.

The new organization was registered with the Secretary of State's office on February 17 under the name Arizona Committee for Progress. Members are currently holding weekly meetings to devise a mission statement and decision-making structure for the committee.

An immediate goal of the group is to solicit involvement from anyone interested in promoting Lesbian/Gay rights in Arizona. This involvement is especially welcome during the PAC's early planning stage, organizers say. Prospective members do not necessarily have to be Lesbians or Gay men.

By the end of 1989, the Arizona Committee for Progress hopes to acquire at least 500 registered members -- a number that would qualify it as a so-called "Super-Pac", of which there are only a dozen in Arizona. According to state law, Super-PACs may contribute as much as \$1,100 to legislative campaigns. This contrasts with the \$220 contribution limit that "normal" PACs must observe. These limits were set by Proposition 200, which was approved by Arizona voters on the November 1986 general-election ballot.

To increase participation, the committee is working with several members of the Lesbian/Gay community in Tucson with the intent of forming a Southern Arizona branch of the PAC. As it is now envisioned, the Tucson branch would control the funds it raises, while its members would be counted toward the statewide membership goal of 500.

One source of funds, the committee hopes, will be a series of political parties, such as the one held last month that featured an appearance by U.S. Congressman Barney Frank (D-Mass.). According to the newly appointed committee chairperson Charles Jordan, that first fund-raiser netted the group more than \$1,300.

Plans call for another party to be held in late April or early May. The committee is investigating possible locations for the event, as well as contacting possible speakers.

Another current project is the compilation of a reliable mailing list to be used for informing interested persons of upcoming events. Mailings will be discreet, according to the PAC's organizers, in deference to those who may not want to be publicly identified.

A REMARKABLE PEOPLE

When I was a kid my little sister, a diminutive three years younger than I, used to terrorize me. She'd knock me down to her size with a baseball bat, then beat the garbanzo beans out of me with her fists. When I'd run screaming to my father, he'd say the same thing every time, "It takes two to tango."

God, I hated that line. I'd, of course, insist that I wasn't fighting, that all I was doing was getting beat up, but I lied. I'd participate in the fight by precipitating the fight, picking away at her until she lost her temper and decked me. It takes maturity to admit that even now.

Much as I detested that phrase then, it certainly springs quickly to mind whenever I think of the 21+ million dollars awarded to Mark Christian from the estate of Rock Hudson. Talk about two to tango! It's far less likely that both participants in a fight are there willingly than both participants in unsafe sex are. Especially when said sex occurs three to five times a week.

This jury-awarded sum is not only your standard gross miscarriage of justice, but it further fuels the fires of AIDS hysteria and ignorance. The relationship between Hudson and Christian lasted from 1983 to 1985. It had been

established by that time fairly well how the virus was spread, and what definitely constituted unsafe sex. It was also fairly well known then, and for many years before that Rock Hudson had his fair share of male to male sexual escapades. Hell, as sheltered as my life in Phoenix and then here was, I knew he was Gay and that he was acting on his sexuality with a lot of men. Even before I came out, his sex life was one of my central fantasies.

When it was announced that he had collapsed in Paris, I told my co-workers that it was probably AIDS. They laughed. I laughed last. So, Christian, who lived with Hudson for two years, didn't know what I knew from 600 miles away? Then, the 21+ million dollars was awarded out of pity for his lack of brains, right? If I act stupid can I get some money too?

It takes two to tango whether they are Rock Hudson and Mark Christian, or, John Q. Public and Ima Strette Hooker. No matter how much juries and legislators try, they cannot make the responsibility for consensual sex one-sided. If this were some other disease, would the jury have awarded half as much? Anything at all? I think not. There is so much ignorance and hysteria around AIDS compounded by the homosexual aspect

of it, and by its being sexually transmitted, that an awful lot of people, good, well-meaning people, have lost the ability to think rationally.

If Mark Christian wants to challenge Rock Hudson's will on the grounds that he was left completely out, I'll support him. I'll march, I'll carry signs. I'll write letters encouraging spousal rights for Gays. Our lives must be recognized even in our deaths. But this business of awarding millions of dollars to someone for being too stupid to protect himself, well, it bothers me. And it scares me.

Every time I think we've turned a corner, that AIDS hysteria is behind us, something like this comes up. In the beginning we ought to let people know this was not some kind of punishment. Then we fought the idea that so-called "innocent" victims could get it from shaking hands. Now, we have to fight the idea that the "innocent" victims are straight men who have unsafe sex with hookers in spite of all the information out there, or young men who have unsafe sex with rich older men who have a reputation for a trip or two around the block.

I have said it before, there are no "innocent" victims of AIDS, nor anyone being punished by God. There are only people, with a capital 'P', with AIDS. The closest to the victims or those being punished are those ignorant enough to reward another's ignorance with millions of dollars. It may take two to tango, but it only takes one to be ignorant.

News from MCC Tucson

As we continue the Season of Lent, we should reflect not only the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, but contemplate on the second coming of Jesus Christ. Some passages in the Bible speak of "the revealing", others refer to His "appearing", while others His "coming". Most striking of all the terms is the Greek word "parousia" translated "coming" in RSV, Matt. 23:3, 1 Cor. 24:31 and James 5:7.

In a secular, everyday sense this word meant "arrival" or "presence". It was used in New Testament times as a special term to refer to the presence of a hidden deity or the visit to a province of a king, an emperor or some other official. People were asked to get ready for the "presence" of the king. The word therefore, was especially appropriate for Jesus' future manifestation as King. The New Testament does not speak of Jesus' "second coming", though Heb. 9:28 comes close to it. The term "second coming" goes back to the second century A.D. and is attributed to translations by Justin Martyr.

The second coming of Christ is set forth in the New Testament in symbolic or picture language. Some scholars, therefore, think that Jesus' concept of His coming was a coming upward into His sovereignty, an exaltation, and that the church understood it was a coming back to earth. Whatever Jesus' concept, the church clearly believes in both Jesus' exaltation and His return.

Easter will be on March 26th this year. There will be special services during Holy Week, with time and schedule to be announced as the time approaches. Meanwhile, our regular services are at 10:45 a.m. and 5:30 p.m. on Sundays and 6:45 p.m. on Wednesday.

CIRCUMVENTING DEMOCRACY

Former President Reagan campaigned against him; President Bush campaigned against him. In fact every prominent member of the National Republican Party rallied against him, yet he won.

Of course I refer to recently elected Louisiana State Representative David Duke. Ex-Ku Klux Klan member; ex-racist; ex-bigot; ex-regular citizen.

I can understand the opposition. Duke spent years as a leader in the KKK and is still head of the NAAWP - The National Association for the Advancement of White People - an ironic twist to the now famous NAACP, the irony in which is not lost on anyone. He once stood for (and may yet stand for) so many things repulsive to most people in America. What surprises me however, is the uproar over his election.

True, Duke won by a thin end of the wedge 224 votes in an election which saw an unprecedented 82% turnout. But he did win, did he not?

feelings of frustration when considering the Duke victory.

The National Republican Party tried to prevent Duke from assuming office (unsuccessfully) and is now trying to prevent him from receiving any money from the party. I don't understand.

To paraphrase, a state gets the elected officials it deserves. If Louisiana voters wanted an ex-racist in office, do they not deserve one? For all we know, he might be a reformed racist. It could happen. He professes to stand for equality for all people. Maybe he does, maybe he doesn't. I don't think it is anyone's business but his and the voters of Louisiana.

If the 8,232 people who voted against Duke want him out badly enough (and are willing to fight the 8,456 people who voted him in) let them go at it the way we ousted Mecham. Does the word recall mean nothing to these people? Whatever Duke's political or personal leanings are, I find it distasteful and contrary to the spirit of a true republic to allow someone who won office to be ha-

On Saturday, March 4, booths will open at 6:00 p.m. The live music from the 'La Bamba' band will be playing for dancing and listening beginning at 6 also.



It will be a festive weekend at J/T this weekend and everyone is urged to attend and support this very worthwhile fundraising event.



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
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

NATIONAL NEWS

The big news on the national scene was the Senate Armed Services Committee rejection of former Texas Senator John Tower. By a vote of 9 in favor and 11 against, the Armed Services Committee sent a negative recommendation to the full Senate. President Bush, in Tokyo attending Emperor Hirohito's funeral, stated that he is sticking by Tower. A full vote of the Senate should come this week.

In Louisiana last week, the former leader of the Ku Klux Klan was elected to the Louisiana state House of Representatives in a special election. David Duke, the former head of the KKK defeated John Treen, the brother of the former governor, by a slim margin of 227 votes. Treen tried to declare the results invalid due to the question about Duke's residency in the district. In Louisiana, the statute states that to be able to run, you must have lived in a district one year prior to the election. The National Republican Party quickly took action against Duke, who ran as a Republican. The party voted to censure Duke, and to deny him funds and assistance.

GRAND CANYON STATE NEWS

The University of Arizona got itself in the headlines recently because of their "A". The University recently spent \$30,000 to get their logo changed. A university spokesperson stated that the old "A" was too athletic, and that the new "A" was academic, which the university was trying to project as it's new image. The big flap was over the fact that the university paid this money out to one out-of-state graphic artist, also that \$8,000 went to travel expenses.

The most popular bill going through the State House and Senate is the Gun Concealment Bill. This bill, if passed, would allow average citizens to carry concealed guns. This bill has 60 sponsors and co-sponsors, and will probably pass. The question is, will Governor Mofford sign this piece of legislation?

The news is still about Pima Community College's Governing Board. Recently the NCA, the main Junior College Governing Board, sent a committee to investigate the PCC Board. So far, it looks like PCC will be placed on probation because of the Board's activities. Superintendent Anita Lohr has received over 40 names to replace Ed Wagner, who has resigned from the board, but will not leave until someone has been named to replace him.

Oracle Road news is that businesses are still holding on, due to the fact that the construction is delayed again. The Pima County Transportation Department has stated that the Oracle Road Project will be finished by fall. Hopefully the businesses can hold out and also not be finished by fall.

The Tucson Unified School District last week set an election date of May 16th for a budget override election. So study up on the facts and do vote on this issue.

The political rumor mills about the upcoming City Council races are running wild. One of the biggest was that John Harman, the progressive Democrat who had run for the House in Dist. 12, was going to challenge George Miller for his City Council seat. All eyes are turned on Marcario Saldate, regarding the burning question, "Is he or is he not a candidate for the City Council to run against Roy Laos?" Hopefully soon he will make a decision, if he does, he could be an asset to the council, if not, I hope he runs again for the State Senate from Dist. 10, he would be a treasure in the Senate.

The last rumor involves another person who may challenge Roy for his seat. That person is Luis Gonzales, the former State Senator, and former county supervisor candidate, has expressed an interest in running.
