### Marc Christian deserved every dime

On Friday, Feb. 17, a jury awarded an additional \$7.25 million in additional damages to Rock Hudson's lover Marc Christian, who had already received an award of \$14.5 million because the movie star failed to reveal he had AIDS.

The jury's decision on punitive and exemplary damages found that Hudson's secretary and confidant, Mark Miller, acted "with malice" and intended to cause injury to Christian when he failed to tell him that Hudson had the deadly disease.

The jury answered three questions in its verdict, all of them "yes". The questions asked whether they found that Miller intended to injure Christian; whether he acted with a "willful and conscious" disregard for Christian's safety; and whether Miller's fraudulent conduct deprived Christian of a legal right or any other injury.

The Jury had decided on Wednesday, Feb. 15, that Hudson and Miller were guilty of "outrageous conduct" by deliberately hiding Hudson's AIDS diagnosis from Christian while Hudson and Christian continued to have unprotected sex.

Christian has not been diagnosed with the deadly disease. He had lived with Hudson during the last two years of the actor's life and has said they engaged in sex three to five times a week. Christian, 35, said he didn't find out about Hudson's disease until it was announced to the world in July 1985. Hudson died three months later at age 58.

Christian sued the Hudson estate and Miller for \$11 million, claiming intentional infliction of emotional distress and an "enhanced fear" that he, too, will die of AIDS.

Some legal experts and Gay activists have denounced the jury's award as excessive. And, in last week's OBSERVER, staffer Curt Stubbs outlined his reasons why the jury award was incorrect. Because of the controversy this jury award has stirred, OBSERVER herewith presents an opposing view.

In an article printed in the San Francisco Sentinel, writer Charles Linebarger agreed with the jury. Here is Linebarger's column giving the reasons for his opinion:

"Rock Hudson's lover was awarded \$21.75 million by a jury of his peers in Los Angeles last week. They apparently believed his testimony that the famed actor and Hudson's personal secretary kept the aging film star's young

blond lover in the dark for eight months after Hudson was diagnosed with AIDS. The jury also believed Christian's testimony that during those months Hudson engaged in frequent bouts of unsafe sex with his young lover.

"Defense attorneys pointed out that Christian has tested negative to the AIDS antibody test, but Christians attorney apparently persuaded the jury that Hudson and his secretary recklessly endangered the life of the young man during those eight months.

"Some in the Gay community were quick to attack the award in the local and national media. National Gay Rights Advocates Ben Schatz told the Sentinel: 'I think that the case is troubling because it sends people a message that if they contract AIDS through unprotected sex, its someone else's fault and not their own.'

"I don't approve of the award," Schatz told the Sentinel. "There are several things troubling about the case. One was the conspiracy point against Hudson's secretary. If a secretary can be held liable for not telling the boss's lover that the boss has AIDS, then are friends liable too?"

"The case also ignores the point that no one should be participating in unsafe sex. And Marc Christian isn't even infected with AIDS. Besides, this is a media circus diverting attention from the real issue. The real issue is why didn't Rock Hudson and Marc Christian know how to take the measures they should have taken, and the reason is that our government was silent. If anyone is to be blamed for putting people at risk, it is the Reagan administration.'

#### SPECIAL RECOGNITION

"Schatz is right about the feds, but he is wrong in the area of letting Rock off the hook. If Christian is telling the truth, then Hudson and his secretary consciously decided to endanger another man's life. Christian is correct in placing a high value on his life, most human beings do. While the feds deserve special recognition for allowing the epidemic to spread, any infected individual who consciously engages in unsafe sex knowing he may endanger an innocent and uninfected man also deserves public recognition.

"The Gay community should not besmirch itself by trying to defend people who endanger the lives of other men and other men's lovers. The preservation of life must take legal precedence over the need for confidentiality when it can be proven in a court of law that one man has made the decision to endanger the life of another man. To try, as Schatz and others have, to argue otherwise is to at-

### New Lesbian & Gay mailgram campaign announced

WASHINGTON, DC - There's nothing more persuasive to a politician than an avalanche of mail from voters back home dumped on his or her desk. Now, thanks to the new Human Rights Campaign Fund (HRCF) mailgram "Action Hotlines", Lesbians and Gays can increase the volume of mail to Congress and influence vital AIDS and civil rights legislation.

The two new toll-free mailgram hotlines, now in operation let Gay and Lesbian constituents and their supporters to send

Both hotlines have the same 800 number, but different operator numbers. To send a mailgram, callers dial, without charge, 1-800-257-4900 (day or night) and ask for either Operator 9184 for AIDS messages or Operator 9188 for Lesbian and Gay rights messages. The operator will read three 50-word messages on Congressional issues identified by HRCF as targets for grassroots pressure.

The mailgrams cost \$4.50 each (additional mailgrams are \$4.00) and are charged to the cal-

hard-hitting messages on important issues, instantaneously, to their senators and representatives. One hotline is for AIDS, the other is for civil rights and fairness issues.

The Action Hotline is the first step in a new HRCF campaign called the "Speak Out" program. "Speak Out" is designed to dramatically increase pressure on Capitol Hill using hotlines and other strategies to be announced in the near future.

"The hotlines are weapons we'll use to combat and offset the radical right's extremely effective grassroots mail machine," said Steve Endean, HRCF Field Division director. "We will lose too often because members of Congress are flooded by mail from our opponents, Congress doesn't hear from the majority on our side. The hotlines are designed to help change that."

ler's telephone bill. The prepared mailgrams can be changed by HRCF on a regular basis to coordinate with legislative priorities and strategy.

The hotlines were originally used during the Robert Bork nomination fight and during initial battles with Jesse Helms over anti-Gay amendments to AIDS bills. However, increased reliance on pre-authorized mailgrams overshadowed the hotlines. But, says Endean, hotline-generated mailgrams and pre-authorized Speak Out mail are now needed for the most effective pressure program.

To kick off the hotline, public service advertisements have been distributed to Gay media to create visibility for the hotlines and help generate large volumes of mail. One of these advertisements appears with this story and others will appear regularly in future issues of OBSERVER.

### Tucson Lesbian & Gay Community Center Expands

TUCSON - Wingspan, Tucson's Lesbian and Gay Community Center is moving into its new offices at 420 N. Court in the historic Presidio neighborhood in downtown Tucson.

With the support of nearly 200 members and a substantial grant from the Chicago Resource Center, Wingspan will begin its second phase of operations. One year ago, the group organized to survey the needs of the community, raise funds, start support groups and offer speakers to local agencies and classrooms. This year the Center will focus on establishing a Lesbian/Gay Hotline to provide a referral service and peer counseling, a community library and meeting spaces for local groups.

In many ways, Tucson's Lesbian and Gay Community Center is unique. Unlike many "Lesbian and Gay" organizations which are primarily oriented and run by Gay men, Wingspan has managed to bridge the gap between the women's and men's communities. The group has borrowed much from the feminist process - decisions are reached by consensus rather than by vote. Currently 70% of the Center's members are women.

Wingspan has as special commitment to serve the traditionally underrepresented groups in our community - Lesbian and Gay teens, older adults, people of color and individuals who are disabled or "differently abled".

At this moment the Center sponsors a Lesbian and Gay Youth Group, a "40's or Better" Lesbian support group, a coming out support group and four separate classes for our members in American sign language. The group will be

providing sign interpreters for all major meetings and events this year.

The official opening of the Community Center will be on Saturday, March 25. More details will appear next week. In the meantime, Wingspan is looking for energetic people to volunteer in the areas of support services (hotline), information services (library, resource lists, newsletter), public relations, fund-raising and finance. # A REMARKABLE PEOPLE

I recently recognized a face on the evening news as a passing acquaintance who runs in the same circles I do, and whose path occasionally crosses mine. He had been arrested by Phoenix police for the probable abduction, molestation and murder of a twelve-year-old boy who vanished from their mutual Phoenix neighborhood eight years ago. To say I was shocked is an understatement.

Then a series of other reactions set in. I prayed that it wasn't so, he had always seemed such a sweetheart, not at all capable of those things of which he had been accused. Then I became quite angry when I heard that he had been a suspect from the beginning, back when it was mandatory that every newscast, newspaper and casual conversation be devoted to the boys disappearance and all the sordid rumors to which the human mind is susceptible to explain his disappearance.

My friend was a suspect because he was on the boy's paper route, he was openly Gay, and he had a lot of parties. I don't know why this lack of even originality on the part of the Phoenix police should bother me, but it did. I know that compared to Tucson police, Phoenix cops are closer to the thugs they're supposed to protect against. And I know that they give a new dimension to ignorant, but again, the specious reasoning got to me, as it has so often done in the past.

I don't know, perhaps my friend is guilty. I wonder sometimes if his incredibly heavy drug and alcohol use eight years ago and his subsequent sobering/cleaning up three years ago would make a difference in court leniency. Hell, I wonder if it would make a difference in my own attitude if I truly believed him guilty. But in the end, all these questions are meaningless because I really don't see how he can get a fair trial.

There are entirely too many people who react un-thinkingly to a stranger's sexual assault on a strange child. I call these people family nazis; they care more about what happens to a family from one person without than to what is done to their own family by themselves within. They would rather hang a suspected child molester than have an open discussion with their own child about his/her awakening sexuality. It's always easier to condemn another than to do something about your own flaws.

These family nazis are always the first line against homosexuals. We are held to be anti-family, whatever that means. We are said to be unable to form loving spousal relationships, I guess because we don't make them with a member of the opposite sex. The better versed of them use words like "objective disorder", "arrested development", and the like, but the end result is the same. Because we use different materials, methods and shapes to build our families, we are obviously anti-family.

There are always going to be some whose sexual tastes are for children. They will prefer both young boys and young girls. They will be both Gay and non-Gay. Unfortunately, the homosexual ones will be the ones used to justify the family nazi position.

I am so afraid that my friend has been caught in a no-win situation, as have we all. If he's innocent I don't think the family nazis can afford to let him be found such. They need an enemy from without whom they can try, sentence, perhaps execute so they can "save" the family. That is always the way with any kind of nazi, there has to be an enemy to react against.

If my friend is indeed guilty, then the agenda of the family nazis calls for as much publicity, self-pity, and dirty laundry as possible so they can use his crime, and his sexuality against all who are perceived as being anti-family. And the fact that my friend's roommate at the time of the abduction is one of Phoenix's top drag queens now will most certainly be dragged out, dragged under, and spat upon.

"WE THE LIVING": A SCREEN CLASSIC REBORN

Ayn Rand --perhaps this country's most preeminent philosopher and espouser of the Free Enterprise system-- boldly went where no other writer had gone with her 1936 novel "We The Living" in which the inherent flaws and evils of communism were exposed for all the world to see.

Now, after being thought lost more than forty years, the Italian-made film of her first novel has re-surfaced and opened last Friday at the Harkins' Camelview Theatre in Scottsdale.

Ayn Rand (whose first name rhymes with "mine") was born and raised in Russia, and is perhaps most famous for her two novels "The Fountainhead" (1943) and "Atlas Shrugged" (1957). She escaped to America when she was twenty-one, and began writing. She worked in Hollywood writing scripts, and published her first novel "We The Living" in 1936. (A film version of "Fountainhead" was made in 1949 starring mis-casts Patricia Neal and Gary Cooper.)

Her novels (and nearly a dozen other books) have sold more than 20,000,000 copies worldwide, and her philosophy still stirs controversy and debate whenever it is mentioned.

In "We The Living", her heroine, Kira, realizes what no other person realizes; sees what no other sees: that the individual is too important to be relegated to the mere position of server-of-the-state. She desires to live life, to be an engineer, to build and to accomplish. However, her dreams are quickly crushed under the weight of communist rule in post-revolutionary Russia of the 1920s.

Kira, as other Rand heroines, knows no other ideal than to live her life for herself. This individualistic trait is immediately recognizable --if through no more than her name. (Other Rand heroines have been named Dominique and Dagny--hardly common in name or character).

The film, made in fascist Italy in 1942, and starring Alida Valli as the courageous Kira; Rossano Brazzi as her lover Leo, and Fosco Giachetti as Kira's other lover Andrei, ran successfully for five months. When government officials caught on that this story was anti-fascist as well as anti-communist, however, they confiscated the prints and negatives --relegating the film to obscurity in a vault.

Rand knew of the existence of the film --and also knew it had been made without her legal permission or knowledge-- and encouraged her attorneys to try to locate it for re-issue.

When it was located in 1968, Rand immediately fell in love with the faithful translation of her story to screen and began re-editing it from its original four-hour length to the present three-hour length. Rand died in 1982, before the restoration had been completed. Her attorneys oversaw the completion of the film and premiered it in 1986 at the Telluride Film Festival where it was greeted by enthusiastic acclaim.

The radiant Alida Valli (who came to American attention in Hitchcock's classic "The Paradine Case") captures Rand's idealistic individual, Kira. Brazzi, equally famous in America for such films as "South Pacific", breathes life into the contemptible Leo --who sells out to the party-first mentality of the communists.

This film captures the essence of Rand's initial foray into individualist philosophy --more completely captured in each of her subsequent novels. It is the film "The Fountainhead" should have been.

Director Goffredo Alessandrini deserves credit for sidestepping fascist censorship and sticking to the spirit of the novel --which, it can fairly be stated, would never have been made in America. The beautifully designed sets, costumes and lighting capture the rancid horror of the communist-dominated life in Russia, and the wistful idealism of Kira and her desires to live life.

The film has been correctly compared with the American epic "Gone With The Wind," and the American-made Russian epic "Dr. Zhivago". It is also like to many of Akira Kurosawa's epics in that it embodies the sweeping sense of grandeur and the importance of life. Few films have been made (with the notable exceptions of the 1962 epic "Lawrence of Arabia" and 1987's "The Last Emperor" that can be held as comparable to the size and scope of "We The Living".






