20,000 Gays march on Texas Capitol

AUSTIN, TX (GON) - On Sunday, April 30, 20,000 Gay and Lesbian Texans filled the streets of Austin in what was only the second march for Lesbian/Gay rights on a state capitol since the 1987 March on Washington. It was also the largest march on the capitol in Texas history.

The perfect, cloudless day began with speeches at the assembly area, and the marchers stepped off promptly at noon. The 1.5 mile route stretched across the Colorado River and up a slight incline to the capitol, providing a spectacular view as marchers in front arrived almost 30 minutes before those in the back.

"The experience in Austin was amazing," said Robert Bray, director of communications for the Human Rights Campaign Fund. "We turned the corner and looked back over the bridge. I couldn't believe it, there were queers as far as the eye could see."

The March on Austin for Lesbian and Gay Equal Rights was part of five full days of events, including a lobby day, a Gay and Lesbian festival, several protests, and a viewing of the NAMES Project Quilt. The week's actions were significant on both state-wide and national levels.

At the rally which followed the march, several national Gay rights leaders commented that the visibility and voices of Texas Gay men and Lesbians is crucial to making an impact upon powerful Texas Senator (and former Democratic vice-presidential nominee) Lloyd Bentsen.

"We targeted Texas because Bentsen is so influential. He's the leader of the Southern Democrats. Now Bentsen will get a huge flow of mailgrams from Texas

when the hate crimes bill comes up [in the U.S. Congress]," said HRCF's Bray, who was in Austin with his constituent mobilization crew to sign up Gay men and Lesbians and their supporters in a nation-wide mailgram campaign, the first of its kind.

"The response [here] in Texas was phenomenal. People were jostling and reaching for the forms, saying 'me next, me next.' We've been following the Quilt around the country, and our goal for Texas was 600, but we ended up with 1650. This is the most we have ever signed up in one stop," Bray commented enthusiastically.

The march, along with the other actions, had an even more dramatic effect on the state level, with some saying that the relationship between the state of Texas and its Gay voters has been forever altered.

Lobby Day on May 1, was especially successful and inspiring. "The Gay/Lesbian movement in Texas came of age this weekend," said lobbyist Glen Maxey of the Lesbian/Gay Rights Lobby of Texas. As Lesbians and Gay men packed into the visitors' area of the House Chambers, the Speaker took it upon himself to announce that, "The House of Representatives welcomes the Lesbians and Gay men who are here for Lesbian and Gay Rights Lobby Day."

"People were shocked," said Maxey, "because he's not the kind of man to say things like that. The entire state, especially the leaders of the state, saw us in a very positive light. Lobby Day was successful beyond my wildest dreams, not that we suddenly got all the votes, but that everybody was talking about how they couldn't turn around without seeing some one with a Pink LGRL name tag."

While the march far exceeded organizers expectations for capturing the attention of state lawmakers, the real story for the thousands who participated was much more personal.

For many, the march was their first public appearance as openly Gay and Lesbian people, but even those who had marched in Washington in 1987 were moved and inspired by the overwhelming sense of liberation which began building early at the assembly area and mounted throughout the day.

"People are coming out all over the place at the Capitol," said Maxey. "It was wonderful to get on the elevator at the Capitol and have someone who works for a Republican say to me, 'thank you for a wonderful weekend.' That legislative aide will probably never speak openly to me again, but I know we made a difference. This weekend changed people's lives."

California serial killer convicted in 16 slayings

SANTA ANA, CA - Randy Steven Kraft, a soft-spoken computer consultant depicted by prosecutors as perhaps the worst serial killer in U.S. history, was convicted of 16 murders, most of the victims were young men who were sexually mutilated and dumped along freeways over more than a decade.

Kraft, 44, appeared stunned on Friday, May 12, when the clerk in Orange County Superior Court read the first guilty verdict, shaking his head as they continued. Families of the victims broke into tears as they heard verdicts involving their loved ones.

The jurors, who had been sequestered for 11 days, convicted Kraft on every murder count, and on one count of mayhem and one of sodomy.

The verdicts came six years to the very week after Kraft's May 14, 1983 arrest by two California Highway Patrol officers who found a dead Marine in the front seat of his car.

The verdicts ended the first phase of a gruesome, nine-month-long trial that subjected the jury of 10 men and two women to day upon day of pictures and evidence about 16 bruised and battered young men. Courtroom proceedings centered on the jargon and details of human pathology, of Kraft's meanderings in the world of California's Gay bars and of his driving - impulsive, nighttime excursions up and down the freeways.

"I like to drink and drive," Kraft told Long Beach police in 1975, saying that he "really got into one of my driving fits" on the night he was last seen with one of his alleged victims.

Members of Kraft's jury will not be available for comment until after their next task: deciding whether he should be sentenced to die. In the penalty phase, which began yesterday, May 16, prosecutors will be allowed to introduce evidence that Kraft also killed up to 29 other men in Southern California, Oregon and Michigan.

Kraft has been charged with killings in Oregon and Michigan that took place when he was in those states, but those charges were not part of the Orange County trial.

Described as a quiet, well-liked businessman who enjoyed walking his dog, Kraft, by some accounts, lived a normal existence in a small bungalow he shared with another man in Long Beach, a city south of Los Angeles.

Kraft, who did not testify at his trial, has denied killing anyone.

The massive effort put together by Kraft's three lawyers to defend him against so many murders is likely to make the \$10 million case the most expensive criminal proceedings in California history.

Kraft's case is also unprec-

HEALTHY MAN SUES FOR AIDS REPORT
LANSING, MI (AP) - A man who planned his death for two years because he thought he was infected with the AIDS virus is suing the state and Ingham County health departments for giving him the wrong test results.

"For over two years he believed he was going to die, and that would take a tremendous toll on anyone," said lawyer Michael Larkin, who represents David Bannow, 26, of East Lansing. Larkin said there is only one other such case pending nationally, involving a private testing firm in California.

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

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Appeals Court orders reinstatement of Gay soldier

SEATTLE, WA - The U.S. Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit ordered the reinstatement of Sgt. Perry Watkins, an openly Gay soldier with an exemplary service record, in a case brought by the American Civil Liberties Union nine years ago to challenge the military's policy of excluding Gay and Lesbian persons.

The decision of the full court sidestepped the question of the constitutionality of the policy but ruled that the Army could not enforce the policy against Sgt. Watkins, since it had allowed him to re-enlist three times over

a 14-year period despite knowledge of his homosexuality.

"We are extremely pleased by this decision," said Nan D. Hunter Director of ACLU's Lesbian and Gay Rights Project. "It is not only a complete victory for Perry Watkins - it is also a total repudiation of the rationale for the Army's exclusionary policy."

Hunter explained that in ruling to force the Army to re-enlist Watkins, the court found that he was a highly "respected and trusted" soldier, and ruled that his military service "greatly benefited the Army and therefore the country."

"This finding shatters the stereotype that Gay soldiers cannot work effectively with other soldiers, or that simply having them in the armed services will have a harmful effect on morale and discipline," said Hunter.

"Although the court did not reach the broader issue, it did specifically rule that reinstating this openly Gay soldier would have no harmful effect on the military mission, and that ruling completely undercuts the Pentagon's position that homosexuality is incompatible with military service," added Hunter.

Watkins has been represented throughout the lawsuit by ACLU cooperating attorney James Loberenz of Seattle.

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

A RETURN TO PARENTAL ACCOUNTABILITY

A 17-year-old Los Angeles gang member was recently arrested on charges he participated in the four-day-long abduction and gang rape of a 12-year-old girl. Shortly after, his mother, Gloria Williams, 37, was arrested under a newly amended California law on charges she had contributed to a minor's delinquency by failing to exert "reasonable" supervision over her son's activities.

And there is ample proof that Williams had full knowledge of her son's gang activities: gang-related graffiti spray-painted on the bedroom walls of her house; photographs of her son posing with other black teens, flashing gang hand-signs; and a birthday party at her house which a number of alleged gang-members attended. It does not appear she ever attempted to stop her son's illegal activities. (It is now a criminal offense in California just to associate with people you know to be gang members).

Williams is free on \$20,000 bail. If convicted in what is believed the first test of this law, she could face a maximum 12-month jail term and a \$2,500 fine. (A similar law, enacted in 1981 in Toledo, Ohio, has resulted in jail time for about 100 parents).

Sadly, this is but the most recent example of the growing failure of parental supervision:

America's Education Secretary recently unveiled the falling scholastic scores of America's youth — while parental involvement in Parents Teachers Association is dwindling.

Girls as young as 13 and 14 years old are giving birth to babies — while a national uproar has delayed implementation of sex education in America's schools;

Children as young as 12 years old are being arrested not only for possession of but SELLING hard drugs like crack, cocaine and crank (crystal).

It is painfully obvious many parents in America are not upholding their part of the bargain; there is more to being a parent than giving birth.

Why aren't these delinquent parents being held responsible for their egregious conduct? America is showing the battle scars from drug gangs, children who kill, one of the highest school dropout rates in a developed country (and worse than many developing countries), a growing number of teenage mothers, and growing welfare rolls. Where are the parents?

Jailing the parents of child criminals may not be the full an-

swer. It is, however, a big step in the right direction; one which, I hope, brings an end to the laissez faire-like attitude of parents.

CAPSULE COLUMN #1: American justice has spoken and OLIVER NORTH — the closest thing to an American traitor this country has seen this century — gets off with a hand slap and a "Don't do it again" from a jury of his peers. As if that weren't bad enough, the fanatic right-wingers are crying for a presidential pardon. Won't the people of this country ever wake up?

CAPSULE COLUMN #2: The recent issue of the monthly Shanti Foundation/Tucson publication contained an interesting tid-bit about the higher risk of AIDS for "closeted" Gays.

Based on a report from Oslo, Norway, the article said, "Men who have the loosest ties to their environment are the poorest at practicing safe sex". The study found these men "often drink before sex, are not active in the community, have short and less structured relationships and practice unsafe sex because they feel they have the most to lose by changing their sexual activities because they have so little else." Kind of frightening, isn't it?

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Inside The Washington Lobby

A Homosexual Conspiracy

It is an unfortunate fact of life in Washington these days that whenever Congress or the federal government tries to do something about AIDS, such efforts often face distortion by members of Congress who are homophobic or have puritanical sexual attitudes. Even when other public health issues, such as unwanted pregnancy or fertility, are brought up, conservatives try to transform these health issues into political issues.

This is happening with the current debate over a survey on sexual practices that the federal government wants to undertake. Our responsibility is to bring the debate back to the real issues — public health and scientific knowledge — and not let the right-wing conservatives change the agenda.

The information that researchers use in developing projections for the level of HIV infection in this country, and in developing strategies to halt the

AIDS epidemic, is at least 40 years old — data derived from the original Kinsey sex studies. The need for updated information on the sexual behavior and practices of the American people has been consistently recognized by all organizations working to fight the AIDS epidemic. All AIDS reports, even the one issued by President Reagan's Commission, have called for such studies.

The National Institute of Child Health and Development (NICHD) — part of the National Institutes of Health — routinely conducts social science surveys, and it proposed developing a survey that would ask a random sampling of the American public about their sex lives. NICHD contracts with a respected group of researchers at the University of Chicago to develop survey questions on all aspects of sexuality, including such "taboo" topics as orgasm, masturbation, oral sex and anal sex.

Again, you have my personal thanks and appreciation for helping to make the predicament of Gay prisoners at the Louisiana State Prison known to the Gay community at large. There is nothing worse than a "conspiracy of silence" on issues of Gay abuse — even if the abused happen to be Gay prisoners.

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
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POLITICS '89

Gartrell is on the Executive Committee of the Southern Arizona Young Republicans and was an unsuccessful candidate for the Dist. 10 state senate seat, he ran as a write-in candidate.

Lambda files domestic partner benefit challenge in Minneapolis

NEW YORK, NY - Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund has announced the filing of a potentially precedent-setting challenge to the refusal by Minneapolis Library Board to extend health care benefits to the domestic partners of three lesbian employees. The complaints were filed with the Minneapolis Department of Civil Rights after extensive negotiations with the Library Board failed.

Lambda represents three lesbian librarians who claim that the denial of health insurance to their domestic partners violates the city ordinance banning discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation and marital status. Like most employment policies, the Minneapolis Library Board extends health care coverage to the spouses of its heterosexual employees, but not to unmarried partners.

One of the complainants, Jane Anglin, has also filed a union grievance that will go to arbitration within the next few months. Her partner, Amy Goetz, is a law student who was required by her law school to have a health insurance policy as a precondition for admission. Jane and Amy, who have been together for eight years were forced to buy the policy outright since the Library refused to add Amy to Jane's policy.

Of the other two complainants, Marie Hanson's partner is a part-time city employee who has no health insurance coverage. They have been together for nearly 11 years. Judith Bagan's partner, though currently employed full-time, would like to leave her job for personal reasons, but is afraid to lose her health insurance benefits. Their relationship has existed for eight years.

"These cases really highlight the outrageous injustices cast upon lesbian and gay relationships that are not recognized by the law, by employers, or by society in general," stated Paula L. Ettelbrick, Lambda's Legal Director and lead attorney on the case.

The Minneapolis case follows the filing of a landmark challenge against the New York City Board of Education last year. In that case, Lambda has sued the Board of Education on behalf of two women and one man who were denied insurance coverage for their partners. That case is still pending.

"In a society where one-third of an employee's compensation consists of benefits, most of which is insurance, every lesbian, gay and unmarried employee in the country is essentially paid less than their married heterosexual counterpart who get these benefits for their partners. It is unjust and inhumane to value some individual's health care more than others," Ettelbrick further stated.

Founded in 1973, Lambda is the nation's oldest and largest legal organization dedicated to the rights of lesbians and gay men, and to educating others about the gay and lesbian community.

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INSIDE THE WASHINGTON LOBBY A HOMOSEXUAL CONSPIRACY CONTINUED FROM PAGE FIVE

The survey came under fire from the right-wing member of Congress William Dannemeyer (D-CA), who wrote to his colleagues in the House of Representatives: "The NICHD study, from its inception, was never about child health, AIDS or sex. This study has always been about politics, power politics. Imagine the political landscape if any one demographic group were to increase their ranks from 10 percent of the population to 15 percent or 20 percent."

"This is the exact reason why the purveyors of laissez-faire sexual attitudes want to use tax dollars and the federal cloak of scientific legitimacy to produce this work. AIDS has nothing to do with it, except as a thinly-veiled excuse. This study represents the politics of sex and the politics of the homosexual movement," Dannemeyer said.

He explained that the survey was really a design of the "homosexual lobby," which wanted to show that there are more Gays and Lesbians in the country than anyone ever thought. They could do this, asserted Dannemeyer and his friends, because no straight person would ever want to answer the type of questions the survey was asking, so a disproportionate number of people responding to the survey would be homosexuals.

Dannemeyer was not the only person agitating against the sex survey. Other conservatives joined the chorus and soon letters began pouring in to the government agencies that would be reviewing the survey.

One of the government agencies that received the letters was the Office of Management and

Budget (OMB). Any time an agency of the government creates a form to send out to the public, that form has to go through the Office of Management and Budget for approval under the Paperwork Reduction Act. That act is supposed to ensure that the government is not generating unnecessary paperwork, such as one agency repeating what another agency has done. NICHD, therefore, had to send over its survey to the OMB for approval.

Usually OMB approval on a form like the sex survey would be taken for granted. But because of the furor already raised by the survey, informal concerns from OMB were relayed back to NICHD about the survey's questions. In response, NICHD revised the survey even before officially submitting it and dropped some of the controversial questions, including ones about oral sex, masturbation and female orgasms. Apparently, questions about female orgasms fell victim to concern that they could not be tied in directly gathering information that would aid in dealing with the AIDS epidemic.

In February 1989, NICHD re-submitted its survey for OMB approval. But the conservatives' letter writing campaign to OMB and pressure from some members of Congress urging OMB not to approve the "homosexual" survey, had done its work in creating suspicion about the survey.

To counter some of this pressure, 43 member organizations of the National Organizations Responding to AIDS (NORA) coalition — including AIDS Action Council, the ACLU, the American Psychological Association, the American Public Health Association, the American Red Cross and numerous other "mainstream" organizations — sent a letter urging OMB to approve the survey. Senator Paul Simon (D-IL) also organized a

letter to OMB, signed by six members of Congress, stressing the importance of the survey.

Richard Darman, Director of OMB, responded to these various concerns by giving his personal attention to the survey. Darman apparently talked directly to Dr. Louis Sullivan, Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services (the parent agency of NIH) about the survey and sent him a follow-up letter on April 6. Darman told Sullivan that OMB had concluded that it did not have authority under the Paperwork Reduction Act to stop the survey completely. But Darman noted that he had serious problems with the survey and he recommended that Sullivan personally review the questions before approving the survey.

That threw the ball back into Secretary Sullivan's court. The next day, Sullivan issued a short press statement in which he said that he would direct NIH to conduct "a thorough review and revision of the proposed study". He affirmed his stand to do what was needed to contain the spread of HIV infection but noted that his initial review of the survey indicated "potential problems with the tone and content of the questions". So far, however, Sullivan has not done anything about the

survey, and NIH does not know what modifications, if any, it will be forced to make on the survey.

Sullivan is still something of an unknown quantity to AIDS lobbyists. He had been in an academic position, as president of Moorehouse College of Medicine, before his appointment, so he may be sympathetic to preserving the scientific integrity of the survey. A letter to Sullivan from the NORA coalition has gone out calling Sullivan's attention to the real agenda at hand: "Political and personal ideology should never be permitted to impair the scientific rigor of a data collection process. . . . There is no value to ignorance in any field of science, including human sexuality". Hopefully, Sullivan will get the message that NORA's considerable influence will be behind him if he chooses to stand against the political pressure being mounted by the conservative lobby.
