



Wisconsin Supreme Court Refuses To Hear Case Regarding Gay Classified Ads

NEW YORK, NY - In a decision that could have the effect of severely diminishing major civil rights protections in Wisconsin, that state's Supreme Court has refused to hear the appeal of a Gay man and two Lesbians who claim they encountered discrimination by the Green Bay 'Press Gazette' which refused to accept their classified advertisements because their announcements contained the words "Lesbian" and "Gay". The Press Gazette is owned by the Gannett Co., the largest media conglomerate in the country.

The Wisconsin statute at issue prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, sex, sexual orientation and other categories by businesses and places of public accommodation. Though the statute specifically designates approximately 15 businesses (including theaters, restaurants, hotels and hair salons) as places that may not discriminate, the law clearly provides that it should be interpreted broadly by the courts to prohibit discrimination by "any place where accommodations, amusements, goods or services are available."

By refusing to review the case, the Supreme Court has approved a very narrow construction of the law made by a lower court which could result in more wide-spread discrimination throughout the state.

Lambda Legal Defense, who represented the plaintiffs along with Madison, Wisconsin lawyer, Mark Borns, argued that newspapers provide a service to individuals are businesses who wish to advertise. In providing such an essential service to the community, newspapers, by law, are businesses that should be prohibited from engaging in discriminatory acts. In the case, Hatheway v. Gannett Co., a mid-level appellate court took a very narrow view of the law, refusing to prohibit a

newspaper from discriminating against any individual who wishes to advertise their business, goods or services in the classified section. (OBSERVER, Aug. 29).

"It is an outrage that the Wisconsin Supreme Court would implicitly approve an interpretation of the state's major civil rights law which would now allow discrimination not only by newspapers but by department stores, travel agents, banks and thousands of other businesses not explicitly noted in the statute," stated Paula Ettelbrick, Lambda's Legal Director and attorney handling this case. "This is an intolerable result in a state that made the bold first move to ensure that Lesbians and Gay men are protected by law."

In 1982, Wisconsin became the first state to pass a state-wide Gay rights law. The Hatheway case is the first Gay rights case litigated under the state's public accommodations law.

Ettelbrick noted further that the court's ruling would allow and encourage rampant discrimination not only against the Gay community, but against women, racial minorities, people with disabilities and others who assumed they were protected by Wisconsin law. In light of the retrenchment of civil rights by the federal courts in the past decade, this is a particularly onerous result for people in Wisconsin.

The case arose when Jay Hatheway attempted to place a classified advertisement in the Green Bay Press Gazette for his group, "Among Friends". The ad stated, "Gay/Lesbian referrals for medical, legal and professional assistance for rural Wisconsin. Write Among Friends." At around the same time, a Lesbian couple, Peggy and Tracey Van-

TAP Responds With Financial Statement

TO THE EDITOR:

Past reports to this newspaper have discussed a number of different aspects of the Tucson AIDS Project. Craig Snow reviewed the over-all outlook of TAP in the first such report and Christina Rossetti and Amy DeGross discussed TAP's Client Services and Prevention Services activities. This week's letter will discuss TAP's finances.

TAP's fiscal year runs from July 1 through June 30, so we have only recently completed the 1989-90 fiscal year. It usually takes until the end of September for all contract payments and grants close outs to take place. Our audit usually is completed six months later and shortly thereafter we file our federal tax return, IRS Form 990. The numbers in this letter, therefore, are generally accurate but not yet audited and may be subject to some correction. Incidentally, as a matter of policy, TAP maintains copies of our tax returns, financial statements and other documents for public inspection at our offices. They can't be removed from the office, but anyone who wishes may review them during regular business hours (9 to 5, Monday through Friday).

During the fiscal year just completed, TAP expenses totaled \$484,905 and our income totaled \$474,069.

Out of all income, \$367,525 (78%) came from grants and contracts funding specific programs. \$106,544 (22%) came from fund-raising activities and could be used, for the most part, for any purpose within the agency.

The Tucson AIDS Project is organized into three operating areas, Prevention Services, Client Services and Central Administration. Out of all expenses, \$166,736 (34%) were in Client Services; \$271,195 (56%) were in Prevention Services; and, \$46,974 (10%) were in administrative expenses.

The largest single expense item in 1989-90 was personnel related costs, which came to \$325,363 (67% of total expenses); contracted labor accounted for an additional \$13,801. Of the total of \$339,164, only 17% or \$57,002, was not specifically mandated by the terms of grants and contracts.

At the end of the last fiscal year, TAP had 15 staff positions. Virtually every position in the agency is covered, to some degree, by grants or contracts. Many positions, particularly in Prevention Services, are totally funded by such grants; other position, particularly in Client Services and Administration are only partially covered. The net result, however, is that only about 17% of all

personnel costs are not covered by grants and contracts.

Personnel costs for the 1989-90 fiscal year break-out as follows:

Prevention Services is virtually fully covered by grants and contracts, which also provide some money for indirect support. There are 9.25 Full Time Equivalent (FTE) staff members whose sole area of concentration is Prevention Services; additionally, many central administration staff members dedicate some of their time to Prevention Services.

Client Services is only partially funded with sporadic support from local government through contracts which also provide relatively little money for indirect support. The balance of the Client Service budget is raised through community fund-raising. There are 2 FTE staff members whose sole area of concentration is Client Services; additionally, many central administration staff members dedicate some of their time to Client Services.

Central Administration, with 4.5 FTE staff members, is, as is pointed out above, partially covered by indirect support from existing grants and contracts, and portions of their salaries are ascribed to program areas in proportion to the amount of time they work in those areas. With a current volunteer force of more than 250 people and a projected volunteer force of nearly 300 people by the end of next fiscal year, it is crucial that stable, permanent management is in place. Similarly, as TAP's client load continues to climb, and as AIDS is increasingly recognized within the private and public funding structures, it is crucial that central management is in place to effect entry into local health systems and develop a long-term, focussed fund development program.

Historically, prevention and education activities have been most actively supported by government grants and contracts. Indeed, to date, neither the federal nor the state government has made a single dollar directly available for client services. The city and county governments, on the other hand, have made funds available to assist with client services, but such funding accounts for only about one-half the cost of the program.

All of these contracts and grants have very specific limitations on how the money can be used. However, these contracts can provide some indirect support for the agency as a whole. That indirect support might pay a portion of administrative salaries, office

3rd Annual National Coming Out Day Oct. 11

SANTA FE, NM - Thousands of Lesbians and Gay men will be taking their next step out of the closet on Oct. 11 by participating in coming out events from coast to coast. As individuals, many will be affirming their Gay or Lesbian identities by coming out to a family member, friend, co-worker, employer or legislator.

"Telling the truth about who we are is the most positive thing we can do as individuals and as a community," said Lynn Shepodd, Executive Director of National Coming Out Day. "There are over 25 million Gay and Lesbian Americans and most folks don't think they know any of us. Isn't that absurd?"

"Here at National Coming Out Day headquarters in Santa Fe, one of our functions is to compile and update a list of HOOD events. The task is enormous as groups, large and small, are celebrating Coming Out day in some way," Shepodd continued. "We in the Lesbian and Gay community are understanding and demonstrating the fact that there is no reason in this world for us to be ashamed of who we are. It's exhilarating!"

"Polls indicate to us that the vast majority of people who report knowing someone Gay overwhelmingly support our rights. Conversely, the vast majority of people who don't think they know anyone Gay or Lesbian oppose us on every one of the issues important

to our rights and our survival," added Jean O'Leary, co-founder of National Coming Out Day.

"If the AIDS epidemic has taught us anything, it has made it clear that we will only achieve equality under the law if we are out and visible. This cannot be done from the closet," said Rob Echberg, Ph.D. co-founder of National Coming Out Day and author of "Coming Out: An Act Of Love".

National Coming Out Day is a yearly campaign that encourages and supports Gay and Lesbian individuals and organizations to commit to the coming out process.

On the national level, there will be a full page National Coming Out Day advertisement in Newsweek magazine and on the day, Oct. 11, The Oprah Winfrey Show will be dedicated to persons coming out of the closet, and will host author Rob Echberg. This is the third year for Winfrey to devote her entire show to Gays and Lesbians coming out stories and actually interviewing Gays and Lesbians coming to terms with their homosexuality "on the air".

Kowalski Denied Right To Attend 1st National Disability Pride Day

WASHINGTON, DC - Judge Robert Campbell has denied permission for Sharon Kowalski to attend and be recognized by the first National Disability Pride Day to be held on Oct. 6 in Boston, Mass. According to the court-appointed social worker, Judge Campbell felt it was "not in Sharon's best interest right now" to be allowed to attend the event.

"This is yet another clear example of why I need to be Sharon's guardian", said Karen Thompson. "I asked Sharon if she wanted to go to this event, she said yes. I am the only one who has taken Sharon's wishes into account and has listened to Sharon."

National Organization for Women President Rosemary Dempsey stated it is outrageous that Sharon Kowalski should be denied the right to attend the National Disability Day. Judge Campbell's decision is arbitrary and insensitive. Sharon should be deciding what she wants to attend. Karen Thompson is clearly the best qualified guardian because she will represent what Sharon wants."


Thompson, who has been fighting for Kowalski's rights for over six years, filed a petition last year to be appointed Sharon Kowalski's guardian. A hearing on the request was scheduled for Aug. 2 at which time Thompson had hoped for a decision. Judge Campbell cancelled the hearing because the press had demanded, and was granted by the appellate court, the right to be present in the hearing. It was decided that the arguments of counsel would be submitted to the court in writing and the Judge would rule by the end of August whether to award guardianship to Karen Thompson or to order an evidentiary hearing. ON August 30, Judge Campbell issued an order calling for

the evidentiary hearing stating that significant issues were raised requiring additional testimony.

Thompson's reaction to the Judge's ruling was, "I am very disappointed. I had hoped this would be over and we could get back to living a more normal life. The Judge's ruling could certainly be viewed as a set back but I am optimistic of what the final outcome will be. It's very frustrating this is being unnecessarily dragged out because once again, Sharon loses. The legal procedures could realistically cost over \$20,000. Every one of these dollars is a dollar taken directly away from Sharon's rehabilitative needs.

Fred Friedman, Kowalski's court appointed attorney, stated in his brief on the guardianship request that "If the ability to turn commitment into hard work, loyalty and energy is the test, nobody could meet the test of the guardianship statute better than Karen Thompson.... Karen Thompson meets the statutory test but lacks the approval of the Kowalski's. If the Court finds this is essential, she should not be appointed guardian. If it is not, then she is the best qualified."

Despite this temporary setback, Thompson is confident that the professional testimony of the hearings will support her petition for guardianship. "This hearing should validate what I have been saying is best for Sharon all along," said Thompson.

rent, or supplies, for example:

One grant may serve as an example of how those limitations affect the agency and how the agency has used restricted money to its best advantage. TAP is a participant, with other agencies, targeting educational efforts for substance abusers. In 1989-90 that grant provided \$162,142 for TAP. It's important to note the restrictions on this grant: this money is available only for use with substance abusers and may not be used for any other purpose, education or service-oriented. While in Tucson, at least, there is far

greater need of educational activities for gay and bisexual men, the NIDA money is not available for that purpose. However, the grant does provide approximately 10% of its money as indirect support for the agency. Therefore, with this grant TAP has been able to increase the level of awareness of HIV disease among at least some of the targeted population and has obtained some revenue for the agency as a whole which has helped indirectly support other activities, including client services.

Public Politics

Not since 1987 have the American people had the almost singularly rare opportunity to see politics in action. I refer, of course, to the confirmation hearings for Supreme Court nominee David H. Souter.

Souter, who has been chosen by President Bush to fill the vacancy left by the recent retirement of Justice William J. Brennan Jr., emerged as a virtual unknown when his selection was announced earlier this summer.

Frantically, the press, and groups on the right and left of center began digging, asking questions, probing and hunting for some clue as to how Souter would vote on matters brought before the country's highest court.

To the surprise of many, little was found to indicate the leanings on civil rights, abortion, the rights of privacy, or other issues. Unlike Judge Robert Bork, who was President Reagan's unsuccessful Supreme Court nominee in 1987 (see this column, Oct. 21, 1987), Souter had published very little about his views on legal matters. Few, if any cases regarding topics of interest had ever before been heard in his courtroom. He was, in essence, a man who did not exist before his nomination.

At first, groups like ACT-UP and the National Organization for Women came out against him in fear he might be too right-wing. Now, in a supreme irony, ultra-conservative groups are coming out against Souter fearing he might not be right-wing enough. How sweet the exercise!

Souter, to his credit, has handled the entire affair with grace, refusing --unlike Bork-- to engage in hypothetical "what ifs" regarding his decision should he get an abortion case, or a right to privacy case. He has, essentially, taken control of the confirmation hearings, not allowing the Senate's Judiciary Committee to commit him to any action he --or they-- could not reasonably foresee.

Like others, I know little about Souter. I do not, however, fear his decisions should he become a Supreme Court Justice. He strikes me as being reasonable, rational, and willing at all times to allow the merits of each case dictate his decisions --not coming to each case with preconceived ideas of how things should go.

Souter appears to have a healthy respect for precedent (willing to allow previous Supreme Court decisions to stand regardless of his personal views), and for the rights not only spelled out in the Constitution, but those implied by the Founding Fathers as well.

I don't know, if ten years hence, we will be any better off or worse than now should Souter be confirmed. I do, however, feel much more secure with a man like Souter on the bench than raving madmen like some of the previously nominated --and, thankfully, rejected-- nominees.

deveer, were hoping to start a business selling sweatshirts and submitted an ad to the Press Gazette stating, "Unique, screen-painted sweatshirts with Gay/Lesbian slogans".

The Press Gazette, the only major daily newspaper in the four-county area surrounding Green Bay, rejected both ads because of the inclusion of the words "Gay" and Lesbian", and informed the Vandeviers that "we just don't print those kinds of ads." There is no broadly-circulated Gay and Lesbian paper in northern Wisconsin which would otherwise allow Hatheway and the Vandeviers to let the community know of their services.

"The court has turned its back on an important means of communication an business transaction for Lesbian and Gay people," commented Mark Borns. "In Hatheway's case, the Among Friends newsletter may have been the only way the Gay community could learn of sup-

portive medical professionals and services for life-threatening illnesses such as AIDS.

The Press Gazette's lawyer, David Lucey of Milwaukee, argued that the paper assumed Hatheway's ads were nothing more than sex solicitation ads and were thus inappropriate for a "family newspaper". Despite clarification that the ads were not for sex, the paper has still refused to accept the announcements.

Ettelbrick stated, "Lesbians and Gay men will now have an even more difficult time getting access to mainstream forms of advertising, particularly in less urban areas of the country where Lesbian and Gay papers aren't as plentiful. We can only hope now that the Wisconsin legislature will once again take up the mantle for civil rights and overturn the damage done by the courts."

Gallery Obscenity Trial Gets Underway

CINCINNATI, OH (AP) - A judge has ruled that an art gallery and its director must stand trial later this month on obscenity charges for displaying five sexually graphic photographs by Robert Mapplethorpe.

Dennis Barrie and the Contemporary Arts Center already were scheduled to go on trial Sept. 24 each on one misdemeanor charge of using children in material involving nudity. The obscenity case will be heard the same day.

In his ruling, Hamilton County Municipal Judge David Albanese rejected a defense request to dismiss the obscenity charge. Defense lawyers had contended that the pictures were a legitimate art exhibition and immune from Ohio's obscenity law.

"That is contrary to the ... law," Albanese said. "The affirmative defenses and issues of credibility are for the trier of the case to decide.

Albanese also granted a prosecution request to limit the obscenity case to five photographs described in the indictment against Barrie and the center.

He rejected defense claims that the jury had to consider all of the photos in the exhibition - including shots of flowers and sculpture - because the show was a survey of Mapplethorpe's life.

"A photograph makes an immediate impression," Albanese said. "The court finds that each photograph has a separ-

ate identity." He said prosecutors only have to prove that one of the photographs is obscene to win a conviction.

Among photographs at issue in the case are separate shots of a boy and a girl with their genitals exposed.

The maximum penalty for each charge is a \$1,000 fine and six months in jail for Barrie and \$5,000 fine for the Contemporary Arts Center. The charges were filed April 7, the day the six-week exhibition opened to the public. The exhibition closed May 26, after 81,000 people had visited the gallery.

The Mapplethorpe exhibition opened Aug. 1 at the Institute for Contemporary Art in Boston. A court clerk in that city has refused a request to file obscenity charges.

Theatre Company to Present 'Last Summer at Blue Fish Cove'






