Festival of Trees A Beautiful Success

TUCSON - The Second annual Festival of Trees, which is the major fundraising event for the People with AIDS Coalition of Tucson (PACT for Life), was held last Sunday, Dec. 2 at the Westin La Paloma Resort. Nearly 500 people were in attendance for the Sunday evening affair, bringing the total number of people who attended the affair, over the three days of display, to nearly 1,500. The total raised at the auction at presstime was well over \$6,000. This plus the donations of the trees and decorations swelled that to a total of over \$10,000. There were eleven fully decorated Christmas trees in this year's event plus nearly 25 decorated wreaths.

Three of the trees were picked for awards by a panel of judges. These

trees were auctioned off 'live' on Sunday. From Friday morning until Sunday evening, a silent auction was held for the remaining trees. Each bidder was assigned a number at the registration table. Each tree had a bidding sheet next to it, and the bidder placed his or her number and amount of the bid on the bidding sheet. Bidders could increase their bid at any time prior to the 7:00 p.m. auction. The highest bid, naturally, won the tree. The wreaths were auctioned off from scratch and brought in an amazing amount of money also.

Alan McLaughlin, of radio Cloud 95 was delightful as auctioneer for the evening and it was through his humor

Tucsonan Receives Top Award From Arizona Dept. of Health

PHOENIX - Christopher Brown, Program Coordinator for the Pima County Health Department's (PCHD) AIDS program, was recently named recipient of the 1990 "Director's AIDS Service Award", sponsored by the Arizona Department of Health Services (ADHS). Brown won the top honor in the "AIDS Educator/Counselor" category.

The Director's AIDS Service Awards were created to recognize individuals throughout Arizona for their contributions in AIDS education, prevention, health care, or other AIDS services. This is the first year for the annual awards, which were presented at the ADHS annual AIDS Health Education Conference.

Brown began working at the PCHD in 1983 as a Communicable Disease Investigator in the Sexually Transmitted Disease Program. He later became an HIV counselor with the AIDS Program and, in 1987, was promoted to AIDS Program Coordinator, where he supervises the health education and risk reduction, counseling and testing, and surveillance programs.

He is credited with developing the PCHD HIV Counseling and Testing system, which in 1990 will see an estimated 5,000 clients. Under Brown's direction, the PCHD AIDS Program developed the Physician Outreach Project, which provides local physicians with information regarding HIV/AIDS reporting requirements, surveillance activities, community AIDS resources and other information.

Chris has served as a member of the Governor's Task Force on AIDS, a citizen's group created in 1988 to develop a comprehensive, long-range AIDS strategy for Arizona. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the People With AIDS Coalition of Tucson (PACT for Life), and works with the Tucson Minority Consortium on AIDS, the Community AIDS Advisory Council, and the Think Positive Project.

Brown has also been instrumental in the development of the PCHD's AIDS education media campaigns, which have received recognition in the annual "ADDY" advertising competition sponsored by Tucson Advertising Club. In 1989, the first place Award of Excellence was given to the health department's campaign titled, "Talk First: Straight People Get AIDS Too" for its radio public service announcements.

And, in 1990, the PCHD won a bronze ADDY for its "Good News About Man-to-Man Sex" posters targeting AIDS education in the Gay community.

Other categories for the Director's AIDS Service Awards were Medical Professional and Volunteer. Recipients in these categories for 1990 were respectively: Dr. Ken Fisher, a Phoenix private practice physician, and Anita Yazzie, an employee of the Indian Health Services who develops and coordinates AIDS programs in the Navajo Nation.

Soviet Gay Activist Visits Tucson



TUCSON - Russian Gay activist, Roman Kalinin, spoke to 125 people on Monday evening, Nov. 26, on the University of Arizona Campus. He was sponsored by the Bisexuals, Lesbians & Gays United of the University of Arizona. Kalinin was on an eight-city American tour sponsored by the International Gay and Lesbian Human Rights Commission.

Kalinin spoke from the heart as he told of his experiences as the editor of "Tena", the only Gay newspaper in the Soviet Union, where homosexual activity between men carries a penalty of up to five years in labor camps. "The KGB called my parents and told them I was Gay," said the Gay activist. His parents reaction was "very negative". Kalinin is one of very few Soviets who has publicly stated his sexual orientation. Although arrests for homosexual activity is rarely enforced in big cities such as Moscow and Leningrad, hundreds of Gay men from rural areas are sent to prison camps every year, said Kalinin.

He has had several brushes with the Soviet Secret Police (KGB) including the "outing" to his parents. They have called him in for interrogation, and robbed his apartment which doubles as the office of "Tena". "There are no bars where you can go and sit quietly and talk," Kalinin said. "There are no dancing places. A young man who lives with his parents, if he is not home at night must lie and say he was with girls. How's a person supposed to feel when he can only find a partner in the streets?"

"It is very difficult for young Gays to find friends in such a society, and my task is to help them," said Kalinin, adding that the only known spot for Gay cruising in Moscow has been overtaken by "sex workers, Gay bashers and seedy, criminal types." Gay men and women live in fear of exposure and are targets of blackmail.

Kalinin said, "My visit to America has been very helpful to the future of my work in the Soviet Union. The Gay and Lesbian movement here is a model for us. Attitudes towards homosexuality in our country are similar to what they were in the United States in the 1930s and 1940s. There is very little in the way of visible sub-culture, and as a result, many people who have homosexual feelings have no way of understanding that they are not the

only one. The isolation this creates causes desperation, terrible loneliness, and in some cases suicide. Our newspaper is giving great hope to many people."

According to Jim Toevs, Co-Chair of the International Gay & Lesbian Human Rights Commission, Kalinin's visit has far exceed expectations. "Gays and Lesbians can play a key role in bringing peace to the planet because we are literally 'everywhere'", Toevs said.

"Gay rights have not been a part of the human rights agenda internationally," said Julie Dorf, a co-founder of the commission. "That's why we started the commission. The group is working on a full length documentary video on the lives of Soviet men and women, which may be ready for distribution early next year.

Kalinin founded "Tena" about one year ago. (OBSERVER, Aug. 29). "Tena" which means "theme" and is slang for Gay, is not an underground publication. It is registered with the Moscow city council and is mailed to people around the country.

The cities visited by Kalinin during his stay in the United States included New York City, Minneapolis, Seattle, San Francisco, Tucson, Chicago, Boston and Washington, DC. During a tour of the San Francisco Castro District, Kalinin was shown a T-shirt imprinted, "San Francisco: where the women are strong and the men are beautiful." He shook his head. The Soviet Union, he said, is not quite ready for such a shirt.



POLITICS '90

Last week, the Pima County Democratic and Republican Parties held re-organization meetings for their respective District Clubs. On the Democratic side, the message was "keep the status quo, at least until February 26th."

In Legislative District 9, Cyvia Wohlman was elected for a third time as Chair. In District 10, Betty Liggins was re-elected unanimously. In District 11, Robert Longoni was given the nod to lead. In District 12, Abby Snowwhite was elected for a full term as District Chair. In District 13, Winston Smith was re-elected Chair by acclamation and in District 14, John Soltero won re-election as Chair.

For the rest of the District offices and for the State Committee slots, a pro-choice liberal faction of the party was victorious. The Lambda Democratic Caucus scored modest gains. The Caucus tripled the number of members elected as State Committeepersons. In this reporter's opinion, the Pima County Democrats are a solid, unified party that will be a force in Arizona politics in the 90s.

On the other hand, the Pima County Republican Party is a troubled organization. Long a bastion of "moderate" control, now is the party controlled by the ultra-conservative, anti-choice Mechanites. Three Legislative District Clubs held their re-organization meetings. The results were far from good for the "moderates".

In Legislative District 12, the "moderates" barely elected their candidate, Wendy Marcus, as Chair. Most (about 54) of the state committee slots went to the moderates. In Legislative District 13, anti-choice Mechanite, Chuck Josephson, was elected District Chair over the "moderate" incumbent, Robert Bayne. Of the 44 state committee slots, 41 went to the Mechanites. In legislative District 14, a Mechanite and twice-defeated legislative candidate, Ed Kahn, was elected District Chair defeating the incumbent, "moderate" Paul Spaeth. The Mechanites won 33 out of the 55 state committee slots.

Recently, in a speech to the Pima County Trunk and Tusk Club, Arizona Republican Party Chair, Burton Kruglick, blamed the loss of the State Senate on the rift between the Mechan-

ites and the "moderates".

In this reporter's opinion, the Pima County Republican District elections signify the final victory by the ultra-conservative, anti-Gay & Lesbian, anti-Choice Mechanites. Any possible hope within the G.O.P. in Arizona has been dashed! To those who believe that we have a future with the Republicans, I ask you this: "How can you expect change with a political organization that does not even recognize us as human beings?"

END NOTES

The events of last week show that the world's ideological pendulum is still to the right. In Britain, a "Thatcherite", Treasury Secretary John Major replaced Margaret Thatcher as Prime Minister. In Germany, the conservative CDU Party, led by Helmut Kohl, was elected in the first united national election since 1933. His CDU-CSU-FDP coalition won 55 percent of the vote, and will have a majority in the Bundestag (Parliament).

And so it goes for the week.

New Colleague Doesn't Hide Dislike for Helms

WASHINGTON, DC (AP) - Paul Wellstone's first meeting with Sen. Jesse Helms is likely to be a little tense.



But he has made it clear in media interviews that he does not like Helms, the arch-conservative North Carolina Republican who last week defeated Gantt to win a fourth term. Gantt, the former mayor of Charlotte, is black.

New Mexico Perception About Safe Sex Worries AIDS Professionals

SANTA FE, NM - Health professionals are concerned over what the next few years might hold because of a misperception among some Gay men in New Mexico that practicing safe sex isn't important since the state has a relatively low number of AIDS cases.

"If there continues to be a lot of unsafe sex in New Mexico, that will continue to push [AIDS] rates up in the future," says Ron Voorhees, an epidemiologist for the state Health and Environment Department in Santa Fe.

Voorhees, who's in charge of tracking AIDS cases in the state, says he's talked with sexually active Gay men who believed taking precautions in New Mexico cities was not as important as it would be in bigger cities where AIDS appears as more of a threat.

"One of the points we've tried to get across is that we've had interviews with men who are sexually active who said they'd practice safe sex if they were in Los Angeles," says Voorhees, who works as a part-time clinician in an AIDS clinic. "They have as high a risk of an HIV infection in Santa Fe as they do in Los Angeles. It's every bit as important for people to practice safe sex here as it is anywhere else."

Dr. James Waltner, who heads up the state's Medicaid waiver program for people with AIDS, says the belief that New Mexico is "safer" when it comes to contracting the deadly acquired immune deficiency syndrome virus is a serious falsehood.

"We've heard that people may be moving to rural areas because they hear it's safer," Waltner says. "If they continue to practice high risk behavior, it doesn't matter if it's here or in Los Angeles. The relative risk may be a little lower in New Mexico, but high risk behavior still puts you at risk, and ultimately you're not any safer here or anywhere else."

Voorhees says a somewhat careless attitude about practicing safe sex is changing as more and more people become educated and aware that a problem does exist in New Mexico. The state per capita rate of AIDS cases is 6.3 per 100,000 people, substantially lower than the national rate of 16.2 cases per 100,000.

But Santa Fe's per capita rate is 33.2 cases per 100,000 more than double the national rate and nearly triple Albuquerque's average of 11.3. Pilo Bueno, director of the Gay men's Health Project in Santa Fe, says the city's high per capita AIDS rate likely can be traced to its large population of Gays and Lesbians.

"A lot of people move to Santa Fe," Bueno says. "It's a fairly tolerant place to live, especially if someone does have AIDS. The country here is beautiful and the services are

excellent. I think that also it's very easy to be Gay in a city like Santa Fe as long as you're really not out with it, as long as you don't rock the boat," he said. "It's recognized and tolerated, but as soon as they see two Gay men holding hands on the plaza, I think things start to change a little. What I'm saying is that things could be more progressive here." Bueno, too, notices a lack of concern over practicing safe sex.

New Mexico has had 330 known cases of AIDS since 1981, a figure that reflects the number of people who were state residents when they were diagnosed. An additional 100 people from out-of-state have received AIDS services in New Mexico, Voorhees says. That number includes people who came back home to New Mexico after being diagnosed elsewhere, as well as people who were on vacation or otherwise staying in the state temporarily.

Some 70 new AIDS cases have been reported so far this year, Voorhees says, and the projected number of 1990 new AIDS cases is 125. Voorhees won't know how close his projection comes to actual numbers for several months when cases diagnosed around New Mexico are reported to his state office. His projections target 165 new AIDS cases in 1991 and 210 in 1992.

"Those are big jumps, but that's the direction of the epidemic," Voorhees says. "Most causes of death haven't changed significantly over the last several years, but AIDS is growing dramatically. It is an epidemic and it is going to get worse before it gets better."

Marilyn Remembered by Clark

We continue with these exclusive photos of Marilyn Monroe's Korean U.S.O. tour. 1954 turned out to be the year that made her a cinematic icon. On January 14, 1954, San Francisco Judge Charles Perry performed the marriage ceremony of Joe DiMaggio and Marilyn Monroe. What started out as a quiet affair, quickly turned out to be a noisy scenario, only because of Marilyn's numerous delays to the powder room to telephone her vast collection of publicity correspondents.

The honeymoon consisted of ten days in Japan. Then it was off to Korea for the girl with something extra where these photos were shot. During her U.S.O. stage shows, she did a series of Gershwin tunes one being "Do It Again," but the top brass claimed it was too suggestive and decided to change it to "Kiss Me Again". However, Marilyn proved that even though censored she could still excite her audience. Photos and films show a Marilyn Monroe high on her own gyrations. Marilyn later told a friend, "I never felt like a star before, in my heart. It was so wonderful to look down and see a fellow smiling at you."

But really the most memorable moment for her, and all of us, was on September 14, 1954, when, outside the Trans-Lux Theater on the corner of 52nd Street and Lexington Avenue, in New York City, Marilyn Monroe stepped on that subway grating and made cinematic history.

The End Of An Era

Many of you know what an Anglo-ophile I am. I love England: its history, peoples and culture. After all, most of what is American began with (or still is) England. The history of both countries is so intertwined as to be almost inseparable.

Thanksgiving morning, I went downstairs, got the paper (The Phoenix Gazette), which lay face down. I flipped the paper to see the front page and received a stun: the headline boldly pronounced the resignation of Margaret Thatcher, England's Prime Minister for more than a decade. (I had always seen that played out in the movies. You know, flipping the paper over and seeing some startling headline. I had always wanted to do that).

Of course, news of her resignation, while a surprise, was not totally unexpected. Britain's "Iron Lady" had been meeting stiff resistance to many of her policies and stands for the majority of this year. Many felt --and I had to agree with them-- her time in office was limited.

With her resignation came the end of an era. The end of Maggie jokes, the end of characterizations of her with a 12-inch nose and rabbit-like buck teeth. Gone will be her feisty spirit during Question Time, her twice-a-week visit to Parliament to answer questions directly from the representatives of the peoples. (C-SPAN, the cable station, quite nicely broadcast replays of Question Time every Sunday).

But with her also goes the pig-headed adherence by she -- and America's last two presidents -- for a conservative attitude about government. Both countries increase in inflation, higher taxes and lower productivity have gone hand in hand during the last decade. Unemployment, while maintaining fairly stable numbers in both coun-

tries, is not getting better. With the crisis in the Persian Gulf, fueling higher prices and lower income, things are only going to get worse before they get better.

In fact, President's Bush's fall in popularity lagged only a few months behind similar drops for Thatcher. Perhaps her correct action of resigning should lead another trend; that of the replacement of a Republican president in America with a Democrat.

The world is changing. No longer is the Republican Party's policy of peace through military superiority as readily accepted. Events in Europe in the past two years have shown that peace, democracy and equality can be achieved through actions of the people governed --not only through fears of who will drop bombs on whom.

Perhaps now is the time for more level-headed thinkers to take over; for peace through understanding and communication. We have more important issues which need our attention: the growing threat of environmental disaster, the growing number of middle-class homeless, more people with little or no health insurance (or, in the case of England with nationalized health care, major increases in premiums), lack of jobs and growth in business.

These problems plague both countries; solutions for them are far more important than military posturing.

It is a tearful good-bye to a good and strong leader; but it is a welcome opportunity to set the western world --and by extension, the entire planet-- on a course of mutual peace and understanding.

GUEST EDITORIAL

Senator Jesse Helms may have won, but the 1990 elections produced significant victories for the cause of equal rights for Lesbian and Gay Americans.

With victories in scores of contested races -- including the come-from-behind Senate victory of Paul Wellstone in Minnesota, incumbent Ben Jones' re-election to the House from Georgia, and Republican supporter David Hobson's big House win in Ohio -- those who oppose Jesse Helms and William Dannemeyer will have increased strength when Congress reconvenes in January.

The Lesbian and Gay community's largest political organization, HRCF, the Human Rights Campaign Fund, contributed over \$500,000 to candidates throughout the country and helped elect supporters of fairness for Lesbian and Gays in every area of the United States.

The Campaign Fund's political action committee (PAC) contributed a total of \$525,000 during the last election. GOP candidates received over \$70,000, establishing a new record. The Campaign contributed to 121 House campaigns, winning all but 16; and 12 Senate campaigns, winning all but 2. All told, Election 1990 has produced more members of Congress who will be supportive of Lesbian and Gay Americans and our issues than any other election in American History.

Alexandria, Virginia Mayor Jim Moran defeated Congressman Stan Parris (R-VA), one of the most virulent anti-Gay legislators in the country. The Campaign Fund PAC contributed \$10,000 to Moran, and 100 volunteers mobilized by HRCF worked for the Moran campaign in its closing days.

Campaign Fund staff and members were active in several other critical races. In Illinois, Democratic incumbent Senator Paul Simon handily defeated his Republican challenger, Congresswoman Lynn Martin. Maria Jordan of the Campaign Fund's Lesbian Outreach staff and Midwest Regional Coordinator Laurie Dittman mobilized HRCF members in Illinois to retain Simon, the leading Senate supporter of the Hate Crimes Statistics Bill. Rep. Martin, on the other hand, had supported measures such as the Helms-Chapman "food-handlers" amendment to the Americans with Disabilities Act, an amendment that would have emasculated the protections against discrimination that were at the heart of that legislation.

Washington Democrat Jolene Unsoeld fought back a tough challenge from her

Republican opponent in one of the country's most closely watched Congressional races. Across the country in Maine, Campaign Fund lobbyist Karen Friedman and National Canvass Manager Kathy Nelson campaigned for Democrat Tom Andrews in his successful bid for the House of Representatives.


Oregon's Mike Kopetski, on his second try, unseated anti-Gay Republican Congressman Denny Smith by a lopsided 10 percent margin. Kopetski received the maximum legal amount from the Campaign Fund. The Campaign Fund's National Field Manager Tacie Dejanikus and Receptionist Kevin Moriarty spent several weeks in Oregon, organizing Campaign Fund members to volunteer for the victorious Kopetski campaign.

The active involvement of the Human Rights Campaign Fund staff in elections, along with the contributions from community members, will produce tangible results in the next Congress. Lobbyist for HRCF anticipate that sixteen newly elected members of the House and Senate will co-sponsor the Federal Gay and Lesbian Civil Rights Bill when it is reintroduced in January. An additional 8 new members can be described as supportive of our communities goals. These additional supportive votes will make an enormous difference on vital issues of concern to Lesbian and Gay Americans, including issues such as AIDS research and care funding, programs for Lesbian and Gay youth and civil rights.

Thank you. Once again, it is my pleasure to report to you on the disposition of recent "Sharing Weekend" gifts.

As has been our policy from the inception of the "Sharing Weekend", we have restricted all money distributed to TAP solely for use for emergency financial grants and rent payments to Gay and Bisexual clients living with HIV disease.

In September, the Tucson AIDS Project received \$158.36 in "Sharing

Weekend" gifts and provided \$490 in grants for rent and utilities to Gay and Bisexual men living with HIV. In October, we received \$208.17 and provided \$580.90 in grants.

The Gay and Lesbian community has been tremendously supportive of the "Sharing Weekend", and I'd like to extend the most heartfelt thanks of the staff, volunteers and clients of the Tucson AIDS Project to the members of the community and to the managers and owners of Tucson's Gay bars. There have been large congregations and there have been small congregations attending worship services. MCC/Tucson has had good pastors, great pastors, some not so great and even no pastor at all during these past twenty years. There have been times when the congregation

has been affluent, and there have been times when the congregation had to struggle to meet their monetary obligations. But through all of the adversity, MCC/Tucson has been here to give help to anyone who needed it, whether it was physically or spiritually.

This coming Saturday and Sunday, Dec. 8 and 9, MCC/Tucson will celebrate its 20th Anniversary. On Saturday, Dec. 8, from 6 to 9 p.m., there will be a Christmas/Anniversary Open House at 560 S. Stone Ave. On Sunday, Dec. 9, at our 10:45 a.m. Morning Worship Service, Rev. Don Pedersen, UFRCC Southwest District Coordinator, will be our guest speaker. There will be a reception immediately following worship service to meet Rev. Pedersen in an informal atmosphere. There will be an Evening Worship Service starting at 5:30 p.m. to complete the weekend of celebration. Everyone is invited to any of these services or events to help usher in our next 20 years.

A View From The Rock*A Commentary From Cornerstone Fellowship*

Regardless of your views on our involvement in the Middle East crisis, one thing is certain: everything is falling into place rather nicely.


The voting for this year's CAT Awards is drawing closer, so if you haven't registered as of yet, you had better do so or you will not be allowed to vote this year. There is a proposed

Former UPI Reporter Files \$12.75 Million Federal Lawsuit

WASHINGTON, DC - Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund, along with the District of Columbia law firm of Bernabei & Katz last week filed a \$12.75 lawsuit on behalf of a reporter for United Press International (UPI) who was fired after a right-wing Christian broadcaster brought pressure on the news company to get rid of her because of her sexual orientation.

The suit filed on behalf of Julie Brienza in the federal district court of the District of Columbia, charges UPI, Milwaukee religious broadcaster Vic Eliason, and the Voice of Christian Youth, Inc., with unlawful employment discrimination based on sexual orientation, intentional interference with her contract of employment, invasion of privacy, and violations of Wisconsin's "hate crime" law, where the Voice of Christian Youth is based.

Brienza worked for UPI for four and one half years, most recently as a U.S. Supreme Court reporter in UPI's Washington bureau. In March, after ensuring that freelancing work was authorized, Brienza agreed to write an article about the influence of the religious right on broadcasting for the "Washington Blade", a D.C. Lesbian and Gay news weekly.

In researching the story, Brienza learned of Eliason's efforts to defeat a proposed Wisconsin civil rights law extending protections to Lesbians and Gay men by urging his radio listeners to block the telephone lines to their state legislators. Eliason is the Vice President and Executive Director of Wisconsin Voice of Christian Youth. Brienza contacted Eliason to interview him for her story. Upon returning her call and learning that Brienza worked for UPI, Eliason began a campaign to have Brienza terminated.

Eliason contacted a number of UPI officials to complain about Brienza's writing for a Lesbian and Gay paper. He then asked radio listeners of his show, as well as a nationally syndicated show on which he was a guest, to jam UPI phone lines demanding Brienza's termination because she is a Lesbian and was freelancing for a Les-

bian and Gay newspaper. In April of this year, despite its initial support for Brienza, UPI fired her for alleged violations of freelancing rules.

"I was absolutely stunned that UPI would bow to the pressure of a religious broadcaster known for his hatred of Lesbians and Gay men," stated Brienza. "It is ironic, however, that UPI fired me because of Eliason's campaign against me, when I was writing about Eliason's First Amendment right to use the airwaves to propagate his campaigns." Brienza seeks reinstatement to her position at UPI, back pay, compensatory damages, and punitive damages against Eliason.

"This case illustrates the vulnerability all Lesbians and Gay men feel in our jobs and the need for strong civil rights laws," said Paula Ettelbrick, legal director for Lambda Legal Defense and Education fund, the New York-based group which is co-counsel for Brienza. "The fact that one man with a radio license can wage a personal attack on Julie, announcing to the world on national radio that she is a Lesbian, potentially ruining her career and causing her incalculable personal anguish, means none of us is safe from homophobic hatred."

According to Washington, D.C. civil rights attorney Lynne Bernabei who is lead counsel in the case, "The suit will send a signal to Eliason and other hate-mongers that the casualties of their orchestrated hate campaigns will not be silenced, and that they will seek redress in the courts for the damages intentionally inflicted by bigots."
