Paniccia Sues Military In Federal Court



PHOENIX - Former Staff Sergeant Tom Paniccia has filed suit in federal court here on Nov. 17, seeking to overturn the ban on Gays and Lesbians in the military and to seek reinstatement in the Air Force.

Paniccia was honorably discharged in early October after he announced on the ABC-TV show "Good Morning America" that he was homosexual. Paniccia's lawyers believe that his case is strengthened because of a California judge's decision to reinstate a 14 year veteran Navy petty officer who also announced he was Gay on a national television show.

Even though President-Elect Bill Clinton has vowed to overturn the military's discriminatory policy by Executive Order, Paniccia's lawyers say they cannot wait. "We don't know when he will act and we don't know the nature of the action he will take - whether it will be retroactive to Tom or not," said attorney Karen Peters.

"He (Clinton) is one man signing an executive order," said Paniccia. "There are lots who are encouraging the president to go slow."

Mark Freeze, Paniccia's other attorney, said that the ban is not based on conduct, but rather on professional military judgment and a person's status as a homosexual.

It is possible that the Phoenix hearing could be scheduled very shortly and if that is the case, it is possible that Paniccia could be re-instated as early as a month.

Tucson activists with Paniccia present held a rally on the University of Arizona Mall as crowds of people were gathering for the ASU/UofA football game last Saturday. Pictures inside this issue.

1 In 5 Gay Or Bisexual Men In Tucson Are HIV+ California Study Says

TUCSON - The results of a survey held in Tucson by the University of California Center for AIDS Studies are coming in and they are not good. The study, held last Spring, surveyed more than 1,000 men and the conclusion is that up to 22 percent are still engaging in high risk anal intercourse despite all of the educational programs to the contrary. Ron Stall, of the AIDS Prevention Center at UC/San Francisco, who headed the Tucson Survey, said that "there is plenty of room for the spread of HIV infection in Gay men in Tucson."

The survey conducted in conjunction with the Tucson AIDS Project, included 754 men interviewed in local Gay bars and 283 Gay men by telephone. A simultaneous survey was held in Portland, Oregon, both under Stall's direction. The two cities are similar in terms of AIDS demographics. These surveys provided the nation's first large-scale study of Gay and Bisexual men outside of the large cities where AIDS is prevalent.

Bruce Porter, head of prevention programs for TAP, said the results presented a mixed message, but "the flip side of this is that there has been substantial change" - that 80 percent of Tucson's Gay and Bisexual men are not infected and are practicing safer sex, he said.

Some of the other results the

survey of Gay and Bisexual men uncovered included:

- * 22.2 percent of bar-going patrons surveyed said they had unprotected sex with a non-primary partner in the last year.
- * 13.4 percent contacted randomly by telephone reported having unprotected sex with a non-primary partner over the last year.
- * Tucson has about 15,000 Gay and Bisexual men, and Pima County has about 25,000. About one in five is believed to be HIV positive.
- * 61.1 percent of both samples (those at bars and by telephone) knew their current HIV status.
- * Of that 61.1 percent, 18.1 percent of the bar samples and 16.9 percent of the telephone sample knew they were HIV positive and had refrained from unprotected sex.
- * 36.2 percent agreed with the statement "I'm not at risk of exposure to HIV".
- * 37.8 percent agreed with the statement, "I've maintained my health, so an HIV test isn't needed."

Stall said that the behavior changes in the San Francisco Gay community

have been eroded by some men who could not maintain the safer lifestyle over the long term, and by a younger generation once again involved in high-risk behavior."

"Initiating behavior change and not sustaining it is worthless," Stall said. "We need to continue working so that the initial behavioral changes that have been made (in Tucson) can be maintained."

Stall praised the AIDS prevention services in Tucson as among the best in the western United States for a city of this size. The men interviewed in the study will be tracked for five years to find out if AIDS prevention programs are effective.

The November 1st report from the Arizona Department of Health Services indicates that there are 372 persons presently infected with AIDS and that there have been 229 deaths reported since March 1983; Pima County has currently 64 persons infected with ARC - with an additional 10 deaths reported since 1983; and there are currently 587 cases of HIV in Pima County with 35 deaths reported since 1983. The complete report of the Arizona Department of Health Services will be found elsewhere in this issue. Nationally there are more than one quarter million people who have been diagnosed with AIDS since March 1983.

"I Want Women" Candle Light Vigil Dec. 6

TUCSON - "I Want Women" - these words were spoken by the gunman who murdered 14 women and wounded 12 others at the University of Montreal on Dec. 6, 1989.

Marc Lepine entered the School of Engineering and singled out women for his targets. Witnesses said the man divided the students by sex before opening fire on the women. Before firing, he shouted, "You're a bunch of feminists!"

Many believe this was the act of one sick and demented man who felt threatened by women. Lepine cannot offer us anymore of his sick opinions or actions, because after his rampage, he turned the gun on himself.

But what most women know is this was not just a single act of hatred toward women - this was just an extreme act of misogyny and femicide that some women experience every day of their lives.

- * One in three women will be battered in her lifetime.
- * Four women a day die of domestic violence.
- * A woman is battered every 15 seconds.
- * One in 8 Hollywood movies depicts a rape theme.
- * Domestic violence is the single largest cause of injury to women in the United States.

The list goes on and on. This violence - against our mothers, daughters, sisters, lovers, friends - has to cease. It becomes more and more apparent every day that women themselves must be the voice for those who cannot speak for themselves - and the spirit for those who are no longer with us.



active means of expression for those whose lives have been touched by the pandemic; and to raise vital funds and encourage support for people living with AIDS and HIV and their loved ones.

A Gentle Suggestion

Newly out Lesbians and Gay men may be 60-ish widows or 60 year old marines who used to beat up faggots or 20-ish born again Christian wives who love their best friends or 15 year old boys who fear their bodies will betray their desires in the locker room. With lives rooted in homophobia, it is not surprising that newly out people sometimes choose to protect themselves with, "If anyone wants to know if I'm Gay, they can ask me."

I heard that sentence recently from a woman who isn't out to her kids, although she suspects they know she is Gay. Proud of her Lesbian relationship, she just doesn't see the need to talk about it. In her tailored skirt and blouse, with silver hair, this elegant woman must find the world of open pride a peculiar place. I'm sure when her husband was alive she never discussed their sex life with friends; she seems the type to keep to herself. Yes, she has broken the rules enough to love a woman, but not enough to tell her kids. And since they have not brought up the subject, her love relationship remains hidden in plain sight.

Not everyone was born to shout from the rooftops, particularly not people whose silence is based on a natural sense of privacy rather than internalized homophobia. But I say to that woman (and all Lesbians and gay men like her), please reconsider your approach. Crack open your closet door a little and let in some air.

No, it doesn't matter what you do in bed, but, yes, it does matter what you do with your heart. I don't care if you have orgasmic sex all the time or never lay a hand on each other; if you are in a loving relationship, that relationship matters. It matters whether Christmas cards or party invitations are addressed to one or both of you. It matters whether your lover is included in family pictures. It all matters. If you don't believe that, how can you believe that you matter?

Same sex relationships also deserve respect when there is a break up or one partner dies. I know a woman whose lover of many years died after a long and painful illness. Since no one knew about their relationship, the survivor was de-

prived of all emotional survivor rights. No one sent her a sympathy card or called to see how she was. No one offered a shoulder for her to cry on. With her lover gone, no one could even provide witness that the most important relationship of her life had existed. She was profoundly alone. When she finally broke down and told someone, "I loved her so much," the friend patted her on the hand uncomprehendingly and said, "of course. We all did."

Even if you don't consider yourself an activist, there are also great political benefits to coming out. As of this writing, Oregon's virulently anti-Gay proposition 9 looks as though it might pass. Why? Because ignorant people could be convinced that all gays are NAMBLA members, S/M queers, shirtless Dykes on Bikes, and drag queens, and that those people are by definition evil. If Oregonians all knew a wide variety of Lesbians and Gay men, including people they love, including people like you, they'd wouldn't be so easily scared. Remember: while quiet people stay in the closet, waiting for their friends to knock on the door, homophobes strive to deny Lesbians and Gay men the right even to exist.

In accepted rules of etiquette, it is always up to the person with the private information to speak first. It's okay to mention your salary but commonly considered rude to ask others how much they make. You probably wouldn't ask someone about her sex life, but you have the right to talk about your own. And the reason for your visit to the doctor is yours to divulge, not someone else's to ask. Why should your sexual orientation suddenly follow different conventions?

And what if your loved ones suspect you're Gay but they're not 100% sure? They may fear asking in the case they're wrong; if you're not Gay, you may be furious. That's real life.

I have heard dozens of stories of people finally coming out to their families, after years of agony, only to have the relatives say, sometimes with great hurt in their voices, sometimes with humor, "We were wondering when you'd tell us!" But the lost years can't be regained.

There's no guarantee that your loved ones will be glad to hear the news. But your relationships with those who cannot accept you were never real in the first place, while your relationships with those who truly love you will flourish in your new honesty and closeness. And that's a gift to all of you.

Oregon Measure 9 Leaves Bitterness In It's Wake

SALEM, OR - An anti-Gay rights proposal rejected by Oregon voters did some good by raising awareness about homosexuality, an opponent of the measure says.

But Measure 9 and its language of ostracism also opened up hostility toward homosexuals, said Peggy Norman, manager of the No on 9 campaign.

Her office in Portland continues to receive hate mail, even after the election. The proposed constitutional amendment declaring homosexuality abnormal and perverse was turned down statewide 57 percent to 43 percent. But it passed in 20 of Oregon's 36 counties.

"The subject needed to be talked about, but it never should have happened this way," Norman said. "Measure 9 put a whole community under siege, and made the state a laughing stock."

Besides putting Oregon on record against homosexuality, the measure would have required public schools to teach that homosexuality is wrong.

The group that sponsored Measure 9 already has said it might try again, with a modified version.

"This debate is going to go on," said Lou Mabon of the Oregon's Citizens Alliance.

Measure 9 galvanized the homosexual community. Many disclosed their sexual orientation for the first time as they took up the fight against the measure.

"Suddenly, people understood that they were not talking about strangers, they were talking about their friends and family members," said David Stocks, a member of Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays Salem chapter.

Stocks, who is heterosexual, has a child who is homosexual. He said he hopes people eventually come to accept Gay men and women.

"The forces of reaction and ignorance eventually get worn down by the education process," said Stocks, a management consultant.

Backers of Measure 9 said Gay rights activists were working to get homosexuality presented in the classroom as a normal lifestyle.

State School Superintendent Norma Paulus denied this and said parents should check out for themselves what youngsters are taught.

"We've been urging parents to become more involved in their children's education," said Paulus, who opposed Measure 9, "maybe this is a way to get the parents into the classroom."

Norman, meanwhile said that while it's good that Measure 9 brought the issue of homosexuality into the open, the cost was high.

"It didn't create prejudice, it unleashed prejudice that was already there," Norman said. "It gave people permission to say hateful, hurtful things about a certain segment of society."

Activists on both sides said they were victims of intimidation, harassment, and vandalism in the weeks leading up to the election.

Gay rights activists have promised another all out fight if the Oregon Citizens Alliance tries again to have the state officially condemn homosexuality.

But Norman said she is not anxious to see the state go through another debate about homosexuality like the one just ended over Measure 9.

"Nobody should ever have to go through a political campaign in which somebody else is proposing a constitutional amendment that would take away their rights," Norman said.

"Surely there must be a more decent way to have a public debate than that," she said.

Gerald Davis, Chairman of the Arizona Republican Party stated last week that he will not be seeking a second term as chair. With his leaving, a fight between the moderate and conservative wings of the state party is now expected at their January state convention. The only announced candidate for the post is Dodie Londen, who stated she is a right-to-life, conservative, Christian. On the Democratic side, Bill Minette stated two months ago he was not seeking a second term, expected to succeed Minette is Phoenix attorney, Steve Owens.

COUNTY NEWS

Both parties are expected to look for persons to lead their respective parties. On the Democratic side, Winston Smith, is looking to run for an office at the State level, thus leaving the post of Chair open with nobody lining up as a candidate yet. On the Republican side, Linda Barber has stated that she will not seek a third term as Chair of the Pima County GOP. Former State Senator, Jeff Hill, has announced his candidacy. Hill is a part of the parties right wing branch.

CITY NEWS

The Mayor and Council are going through the process of redrawing the city's Ward Boundaries. So far the process between the Mayor and Councilmembers has been tranquil. But, that was shattered last week when a prominent Democratic party official was gerrymandered into another Ward so that a Councilmember, seen as having trouble getting re-elected, can run in a safe "district".

END NOTES

As you know, there is a recall attempt of two Councilmembers going on at this moment. The two Councilmembers are Bruce Wheeler and Janet Marcus, two friends and strong supporters of the Gay community. This recall is being led by the Tucson Business Corporation, (TBC). The TBC can also be referred to as The Biggest Crybaby's. They simply cannot accept the results of a democratic election which was held November of 1991. So they drum up excuses to try to oust to duly elected officials by the people. This bunch has until the end of December to gather 17,700 signatures for each Councilmember to force a recall election. This is a group that believes that the government should spend less, yet wants the City to shell out hundreds of thousands of dollars for a special election. Plain and simple, if they want to change government, they should run quality candidates for office, not throwing a tantrum and forcing an election that we do not need, nor can afford to waste money on.

Stop the recall: Don't sign a petition!

A Commentary From Cornerstone Fellowship

We read in I Thessalonians 5:18, "give thanks in all circumstances, for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus." That is really difficult to do, but I can assure that it can be done. In the past year I have experienced many situations which were not ones which would cause a person to be thankful, and yet God has allowed me to be able to thank him in spite of the circumstances. While the situations themselves were not pleasant, God has taught me many valuable lessons through them. When I had difficulties with my spouse, God showed me that even though people may disappoint and hurt me, I can always depend upon him. When our finances were almost depleted, God reminded me of his promise to supply all our needs, and even though we still have no money, he is helping me learn to trust him for the needs of each day. With my spouse out of work and no job in sight, God tells me that "...it is he (God) who gives you the ability to produce wealth..." (Deuteronomy 8:18), so I am convinced that in God's time my spouse will find the job God has prepared.

I don't know your particular circumstances, but if you are a Christian you can say with me, "Thanks be to God! He gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ." (I Corinthians 15:57) Whatever the problem, you should be thankful because the victory is already yours! And if you are not a Christian, you can accept today the victory over sin which Jesus Christ has won for you, so that this will be your best Thanksgiving ever!




