

Tucson ASOs Get Approval For \$25,000 In Contingency Funds From City Council

TUCSON - The Tucson mayor and council approved by voice vote, a directive instructing its human services budget administrator, to look seriously at the request from the AIDS Service Organizations (ASOs), Tucson AIDS Project, Shanti Foundation and the People With AIDS Coalition-Tucson (PACT for Life), and that \$25,000 of the \$40,000 City emergency fund at the United Way be allocated to the ASO'S.

The item was originally sponsored by Council member Bruce Wheeler (D-Ward 1), and came from a request from the three ASOs, who had requested \$55,500 for funding so that they could ensure the maintenance of basic services for Tucsonans living with HIV/AIDS.

According to a memorandum from City manager Mike Brown, "The agencies have stated they cannot continue to provide the level of service of two years ago in 1995-96 with the aggregate CDBG allocations of \$70,000 recently determined by the Mayor and Council.

"A total request of \$125,500 in CDBG public services funds for Fiscal Year 1995-96 were directly related to increasing the cost of doing business at the same level, increasing numbers of persons needing services, and increasing complexity of need among their clients."

Brown added in the memo, "Aggregate caseloads at these agencies have more than doubled in the last three years. Increases in community fund raising dollars have not kept pace, and government dollars have actually been decreasing. The services these agencies have provided in the past cannot continue at the same level without additional funding. Because these agencies are highly dependent upon community fund raising and competitive contracts that must be reapplied for annually, failure to receive funding will require that services be cut."

Highlights of the council discussion are as follows:

Council member Janet Marcus (D-Ward 2) reminded the council that they recently approved a motion calling for social service agencies to go through Tucson City SAC for funding.

Marcus went on stating their request is more than in the contingency fund. "I feel we should get a report from City SAC/United Way to get a better perspective and analysis. Marcus then made a motion, with Council member Molly McKasson (D-Ward 6) seconding.

The sponsor of the proposal, Council member Bruce Wheeler (D-Ward 1) said that this "is a worth while issue.

It is unrealistic for the agencies to go to the United Way, since they won't help." Wheeler reminded the council that they did not follow through on the ASOs request for CDBG funds. "The council let them down and the ASO's can't provide services they did two years ago."

Wheeler went on, "Most of the council were at the AIDS Vigil at El Presidio Park. Some members of the Council spoke about the importance of doing everything we can for Tucsonans with HIV/AIDS. We criticized the Republican Congress for slashing funds for services.

"We have the perfect opportunity to do something. This is the second opportunity, we failed the first time through the CDBG funding, and now the council won't put action where their words are. It's misleading to hand it over to another agency knowing they won't fund it anyway. It's really very unfortunate, and devious way of washing out hands of an issue we should confront."

Wheeler then made the motion to fund the \$55,500 to the ASOs. The motion died due to lack of a second.

Council Roger Sedlmayr (D-Ward 4), tried to discuss Wheeler's motion, but was ruled out of order to the motion lacking a second. Sedlmayr called Tucson AIDS Project executive director, Craig Snow, to the podium.

Sedlmayr asked Snow if the three ASOs had gone to the county for funding?

Snow said, "The county allocated \$100,000 in county outside agency funding, not federal or CDBG funds."

Snow added, "The county has not ratified their budget. Once the county ratified their budget, the three ASOs will go to the county for contingency funds."

Sedlmayr then made a motion to give \$25,000 for three ASOs. Motion died to lack of second.

Council member Marcus then said, "The contingency fund can't fund the full request but could fund part of it." She added that "the City should get back into the habit of referring these request to City SAC."

Marcus asked Snow if the Tucson AIDS Project gets money from United Way. Snow responded that the United Way Work Place/City Dollars is around \$8,000 or a third what TAP receives in City Human Service money."

Council member Molly McKasson then made a substitute motion that the mayor and council's recommends the

Echo Magazine Burned Out In Arson Fire Hate Crime Angle Being Investigated

PHOENIX - At approximately 11:40 P.M. July 26, an arsonist set fire to the offices of Echo Magazine.

The two alarm blaze, which burned for more than 15 hours, completely destroyed the building at 313 East Thomas Road in Phoenix. Nothing could be salvaged.

Two days later, Phoenix Fire Department investigators ruled the blaze was definitely an arson. They said the lab results from debris collected at the site indicate an arsonist used a "petroleum-based accelerant" to start the fire in the building's South stairwell, the stairway closest to the Echo offices.

To date, investigators have said there is no clear evidence to indicate the arson was a hate crime. They have not ruled it out, however. The chief investigator told Echo publisher Bill Orovan, on July 29, that he believes the fire was started by kids in the neighborhood. He said for two nights before the Echo fire, several small unreported fires were started in the same neighborhood. Additionally, he said, on the night of the fire, a construction site next to the Echo building was vandalized and some items were stolen.

Four other businesses, two graphic design firms, an architectural firm and an engineering company, occupied the space in the Phoenix downtown business district.

Though ACE Publishing, Echo Magazine's parent company, was insured, several of the businesses lost in the blaze were not. One architect said he lost more than \$1 million dollars worth of plans. Another tenant, an illustrator, said his entire life's work went up in smoke along with his third floor loft suite.

"I hope this was not a hate crime directed toward us," said Echo's general manager Jeff Ofstedahl. "Because, there were other tenants in that building who lost everything, their entire life's work. If they thought they were putting us down, they were wrong. They've only made us stronger."

In the meantime, the Echo staff has set up a temporary office and purchased new equipment in order to get the publication back in operation as soon as possible. The Echo staff was able to pull things together in time to get the next regular issue out on time.

"It's the things that can't be replaced we miss most of all," said Orovan. Lost in the blaze were items such as six year's worth of community photo-

graphs, all the Echo archives, research file libraries, awards and trophies as well as personal art items.

"It's tough watching six years of hard work go up in smoke" said Ofstedahl and Orovan who arrived at the scene about 1 A.M. after being called by friends who saw the building burning. "We were in shock at first. We thought, 'This can't be happening.'" They hoped the fire department would be able to save something. But it wasn't in the cards that fateful morning.

About 4 A.M., the two left to discuss contingency plans for getting the magazine back in action. By 2 P.M., they already had looked at several properties before holding an emergency staff meeting at the Community Center to assure everyone the Echo was still in business. "Everyone has been great," said Ofstedahl. "It seems like the entire community has been there for us. That's the bright spot during this dark time. The outpouring of support is what puts the word 'community' in the Gay community and Lesbian community."

The Community Center lent the Echo several folding chairs, tables and some office supplies for its temporary office. Business people offered temporary office space. Additionally, about 40-50 calls an hour were ringing through the Echo's phone message system from people who "just wanted to help." One call came from as far away as Toronto, Canada. National organizations such as The Human Rights Campaign Fund and the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force helped to get the word out about the tragic fire.

To celebrate getting the first issue after the fire out on time, the Echo staff in conjunction with several Valley bars and business and the local Firefighter's Union held a "Disco Inferno" party at Metro Dance Factory. The community wide event was a fund raiser for the Firefighter's Family Fund, which is a non-profit organization to help the families of firefighters who have died in the line of duty.

Currently, the Echo is in need of back copies of the magazine that are in good condition in order to rebuild its archives. Also needed at this time are community photographs, especially of entertainers.

A reward of up to \$10,000 for information leading to the arrest and prosecution of the person(s) responsible for the arson is available through the association of Arizona counties. Another Phoenix Arson; Coincidence?

PHOENIX - Less than two weeks after arsonists set fire to and destroyed the office building which housed Echo Magazine, Metro Dance Factory narrowly escaped disaster in another blatant arson.

Sometime between 3 A.M. and 8 A.M., August 7, an unknown perpetrator poured gasoline along the outside of one of the bar's walls. Then, the arsonist wedged a gallon gas can against the wall and an upright support, allowing gas to pour down the side of the wooden structure, before lighting the fire bomb.

The blaze apparently burned itself out before doing anything more than cosmetic damage to the building.

Arson investigators said it is too early to tell if the fire was a hate crime or if it was connected to the Echo blaze. (See accompanying story). They said they were investigating a possible connection.

Pink Triangle Proven Link To Nazi Persecution Of Homosexuals

BOSTON, MA - A new discovery is expected to increase awareness of the persecution suffered by thousands of homosexuals in Nazi Germany. A prisoner armband, imprinted with a pink triangle and the prisoner number 1896, was discovered among the personal effects of concentration camp survivor Josef Kohout, a man arrested by the Nazis in 1939.

Though historians had been able to verify that the pink triangle was used by Nazis to mark homosexual prisoners, just as the Star of David was used to mark prisoners of Jewish descent, the were unable, until now, to match the symbol with a particular prisoner's story. Josef Kohout told his story to Heinz Heger anonymously in the book *The Men with the Pink Triangle*, which was reissued by Alyson Publishers in 1994. Kohout's book was the first account ever published of the Nazi persecution of homosexuals.

Dr. Klaus Muller, a historian and consultant for the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum in Washington, D.C., hopes that the publication of this funding in the *New York Times* will encourage more survivors, or their descendants, to come forward with their stories.

"The late recognition of Josef Kohout as an important witness to us is encouraging for other Gay survivors to step forward and share their story," Dr. Muller commented. "We cannot undo the injustice they suffered, but we can make sure that their history won't be silenced again. Testimonies and systematic archival research in Western Europe are deeply needed to answer those questions we finally are enabled to start asking." Muller wrote the introduction to the new edition of *The Men with the Pink Triangle*.

The U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum is now immersed in a \$1.5 million campaign to locate homosexual survivors of the Nazi concentration camps, and document their experiences.







Cope Community Center
Grand Opening Aug. 20
Director Responds To Critics

TUCSON - The COPE Community Center, serving those in the Old Pueblo who are HIV positive or living with AIDS will hold its grand opening on Sunday, August 20.

The center, located at 732 North Stone will hold a free show and dinner to commemorate the opening, according to the Center's director, Edgar Rivera.

Rivera said that the center has been open since July with referrals of clients from various agencies, and some of the planned programs have been implemented with the influx of clients.

About future plans, Edgar stated that there will be three fund raisers in the fall to raise monies for operation costs of the centers:

On October 7, the Center will be holding, "Lifting for Life" taking place at World Gym, 1240 North Stone. There will be body building demonstrations and nutritional counseling.

On October 21, "Desert Howl" a Halloween Party will take place at Udall Park. With musical acts ranging from

rock and roll to country/western. No admission charge, proceeds will be raised through raffles and the food booths.

And on a date at a site to be announced, the inaugural Mr. Gay Tucson contest will take place. Edgar stated that Miss Lucinda Holliday will be producing the pageant.

Any extra proceeds from these fund raisers will go to the Tucson AIDS Service Organizations (ASOs) for emergency services.

Some critics say that the center is hornning in on a limited supply of funds that should go to the ASOs. Rivera denies this.

He said, "During these times, its hard for agencies to finance their programs. But we are not competing for a slice of their pie. The center supports the 3 ASOs. The center is open because of the good will of COPE, and does not want to duplicate what the ASOs are presently doing."

Rivera went on to add that he wants to thank the community for their support so far, but stressed that more people should get involved so that more people can benefit.

Combining Drugs Helps Fight AIDS

WASHINGTON, D.C. - A two drug combination of AZT and 3TC blocks the ability of the AIDS virus to develop resistance to single drug therapy and appears to be the most effective way of treating the disease, researchers said.

Scientists at the Wellcome Research Laboratories in Kent, England, said that when AZT is taken with 3TC, the combination overcome the problem of viral resistance that reduces the effectiveness of either drug taken alone.

In 24 week tests on patients infected with the AIDS virus, the combination caused a drop in the amount of viral infection and a rise in the number of lymphocytes, called CD4 cells, that are the target of the virus.

CD4 cells protect the boy from infection and it is their loss that causes AIDS patients to contract infection so easily.

The combination of AZT and 3TC is the most efficacious pair of drugs tried to date with the respect to the magnitude and duration of changes in CD4 cell number and viral load," researchers report this in Science, the journal of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

The study was co-written by Brendan A. Larder, Sharon D. Kemp and P. Richard Harrigan of the Wellcome laboratories.

"This is a very important finding," said Dr. Jeffrey Laurence, an AIDS doctor at New York Hospital and the senior science consultant for the American Foundation for AIDS Research. "We've been trying an alphabet soup of drug combinations, but this is the first time to get some really good news."

Rules Against Security Clearances For Gays Ended By Clinton

WASHINGTON, D.C. (AP) - President Clinton officially ended the government assumption that homosexuals can't be trusted with national secrets by ordering an end to discrimination based on sexual orientation in granting security clearances.

Homosexual rights groups praised the order. Elizabeth Birch, executive director of the Human Rights Campaign Fund, called it "an important step toward ending governmentally sanctioned job discrimination against Gay and Lesbian people."

But Rep. Bob Dornan, a long shot candidate for the GOP presidential nomination, called Clinton's action "something else he didn't have to do that's gotten in our face."

The 13 page order adds the words

"sexual orientation" to the non-discrimination clause covering access to classified material. It also states, "No inference concerning the standards in this section may be raised solely on the basis of the sexual orientation of the employee."

The order establishes the first uniform standards for U.S. agencies in granting security clearances and it requires each other's security clearances.

An executive order has the force of law, but it can be overturned by Congress.

Rep. Barney Frank, D-MA, one of three openly Gay members of Congress, welcomed the order. He worked with the Bush and Clinton administrations in an effort to change the policy on homosexuals.

"We all know that innumerable Lesbians and Gay men have served their country loyally and well throughout its history without betraying its trust or giving away its secrets," Frank said in a statement. "But, shamefully, until now, the federal government was unwilling to acknowledge this fact."

A memo from Marsha Scott, deputy assistant to the president for political affairs, said the order would be effective immediately upon its publication in the Federal Register. The memo was released by the Human Rights Campaign Fund.

Federal agencies for years denied security clearances to homosexuals on the assumption that all Gay people are at risk of being blackmailed or otherwise compro-

vised. A requirement for federal employees who handle classified information to be trustworthy grew out of a loyalty program established by President Harry Truman in 1947, a time of growing concern over communism. Executive Order 10450 modified the loyalty program in 1953 and, for the first time, included "sexual perversion" as a basis for removal from the federal service.

REVIEW OF "SELF TAUGHT" MIXED MEDIA ARTWORKS OF JERRY SAMPSON

If the heat's getting to you, cool off in front of Jerry Sampson's mysterious works.

Take the abstracts, or are they abstracts? Against the dark magenta, blue and earth horizontal of 'Untitled' is a vertical slash of white. Is this just color? It looks more like the misty hooded figures that show up in old spirit photographs. 'Women' is a severe diamond shape woven of multi-colored paper strips. It could well be a quilt worked on by many female friends.

'I'm Ready To Show You My Heart' is fascinating. The heart bulges out of the paint spattered background, as if trying to escape the border of nails that holds it in place. Its colors seem to be

clearing, revealing a deep, black window, into what?

Sampson's painted and collaged plates will not remind you of mail order collectibles. One does look to be finger painted by a child. But the childish printing, says 'Rage Against God.' And the black 'Skyline 94' plates red skyscrapers prove to be bloody hypodermics.

'Crucifixion' is a great sheet of dark splashed card board, staple gunned to a wood frame. Wild white streaks surround the photo collage in the center, a naked figure...figures? Has this passive nude man been fragmented? Or is he many men? Many feet, arms, genitals hang on the cross. It's not hard for any Gay person to see meanings in this.

NEWS FROM P.A.C.T.

As more information is made available concerning HIV/AIDS, numerous "new" words, terms, medical nomenclature, continually appear that are, at times, difficult to pronounce and/or understand.

The following is a brief list with abbreviated definitions that should help better understanding:

Candidiasis-fungus, also called thrush; CD4 cells-fewer than 200 CD4 cells; Cervical neoplasia-cancer of the cervix; Coccidioidomycosis-fungus in the lungs; Cryptococcal meningitis-fungal brain infection; Cryptosporidiosis-parasite causing diarrhea; Cytomegalovirus (CMV) virus, can affect eyes.

Herpes simplex virus-virus causing blisters; Histoplasmosis-fungus from environment; HIV dementia-mental deterioration; Human herpes virus 6-represents many viruses; Human papilloma virus-genital warts; Idiopathic thrombocytopenic purpura-low platelets; Isosporiasis-protozoa causing diarrhea; Kaposi's sarcoma (KS)-cancer of skin or tissue; Lymphoid interstitial pneumonia (LIP)-a rare condition; Lymphoma-cancer of the lymph system; Microsporidiosis-protozoa causing diarrhea.

Mycobacterium avium complex (MAC)-bacteria; Oral hairy leukoplakia-virus affecting mouth; Pelvic inflammatory disease-gyno complications; Persistent lymphadenopathy-swollen lymph nodes; Pneumonococcal infection-bacteria, usually causing pneumonia; pneumocystis carinii pneumonia (PCP)-protozoa in lungs; Pro-

gressive multifocal leukoencephalopathy (PKL)-brain disorder; Salmonellosis-food borne bacterial infection; Seborrheic dermatitis-disease of the skin; Taxoplasmosis- protozoa; Tuberculosis-bacteria in lungs; varicella zoster virus, called shingles.

SURPRISE! As reported this month there is going to be a debate between the two candidates for the Democratic nomination for the mayor of Tucson.

The players are the incumbent, George "Mayor Moneybags" Miller and Ward 1 Council member Bruce "You look fab" Wheeler.

This debate was to be sponsored by the Nucleus Club of Pima County, the fund raising arm of the local Democratic party. The debate was to take place at the Viscount Suites Hotel.

Right? Wrong!

The Executive Board of the Nucleus Club voted this past week not to hold a mayoral debate. This decision follows the two recent Nucleus sponsored debates for the two contested primary races for the council seats in Ward 1 and Ward 4.

Here's what make this so delicious:

As mentioned, the Nucleus Club meets at the Viscount Suites Hotel, which is owned by Joseph Cesare, a major supporter of George Miller's, \$200.00 according to the financial reports.

Miller stated he would not show to any scheduled debate, so why not send a representative as Ward 4 Council candidate Jean Wilkins did for her debate with Shirley Scott. (The representative was political guru Carol Zimmerman)

The board split five to five on the proposed debate, leading the no's was Pima County Assessor Rick Lyons, \$30.00 to Miller's campaign, Katherine Jacobsen a \$130.00 contributor to Miller, Rep. George Cunningham an \$80.00 Miller contributor (wife gave \$50), and Sharon Wolf a \$10.00 contributor (all according to campaign reports), and Democratic National Committeeman Martin Bacal.

For the debate was County Chair Carmen Prezelski, former County Chair Winston Smith, Laura Penny and Judy Nagle voting for the debate. After rancorous discussion, Prezelski switched her vote and thus the change to no.

[Just maybe Miller wants to ride on his laurels and his record as mayor. But, what about a Domestic Partners Ordinance? What about reading a Gay Pride Week Proclamation at the Pride Picnic's. What about CAP? What about the crime problem? What about the proposed tax on apartments? Guess we will not find out!]

Remember, the Democrats don't get involved in contested primary elections!

BUT! The Wheeler campaign, after getting such treatment has proposed three debates scheduled for August 28, September 12 and 13, to be sponsored by Neighborhood Associations, Political Action Committees, and professional business organizations. So far no response from Miller. [What a surprise!]

PAY RAISE: The Tucson mayor and council have put on the November

general election ballot a proposed pay raise.

The proposition would raise a council members salary from \$12,000 to \$18,000 and the Mayor's salary from \$24,000 to \$36,000. The last pay raise adopted by voters was in 1981.

HE'S BACK!...WELL?: Last week, former Pima County Elections Director, Larry Bahill, was offered his old job back.

The search committee, headed by interim director, Jim Shumway, had selected Bahill for the vacated post. County administrator Chuck Huckleberry offered the post to Bahill this past week.

Bahill part of a lawsuit against the Pima County Board of Supervisors for wrongful firing has not accepted the post, according to his attorney. The attorney added that this was not a "settlement offer" to drop his part of the suit.

The decision subject to Board ratification is expected to be approved. Supervisor Paul Marsh said, "We have questions about [Bahill's] past actions as director."

[And we don't of the Board?!]

ALL IN THE FAMILY!: As reported (Observer 574), Republican City Council candidate Ray Fontaine has forked over \$100 to the re-election campaign of Democratic incumbent, Tucson Mayor George Miller, and that at least Ray's wife did the right thing by giving \$20 to Re-

publican mayoral candidate, Sharon Collins.

Well its been revealed that on June 28, Bruce Wheeler, Ward 1 Council member and Democratic challenger for mayor received a \$50 check from none other than Ray's wife, Kareal!

Tucson politics, gotta love it!

Women's Risk Factors For AIDS Vary By Race

TALLAHASSEE, FL - How do you steer a woman clear of the deadly path of AIDS?

There may be as many different answers as there are women at risk for the disease. That's one conclusion of a new study directed by Florida State University's David Sly.

Sly, a professor at FSU's Center for the Study of Population, is about three years into a five year, \$1 million study that examines the lifestyles of poor Miami area women considered at risk for contracting AIDS.

The more you know about their habits, the reasoning behind the National Institutes of Health sponsored study goes, the better you're able to change the dangerous ones.

And there's a lot to know, said Sly, who recently completed the first phase of the project: in-depth interviews comparing the behaviors of black, white and Hispanic women of varying ages that reveal strikingly different behaviors. The pictures painted by those statistic, Sly hopes, could help health care workers halt the onslaught of AIDS, a disease claiming increasing numbers of women.

The HIV infection rate is rising at a much faster for women than for men. In 1994, 18 percent of the reported AIDS cases in the United States were women, nearly three times the proportion of women who had the disease 10 years earlier, according to statistics from the Centers for Disease Control. In the South, the proportion of women with AIDS is twice the national average.

Breaking down the study's 719 subjects into ethnic and age categories, the investigators came up with the following findings:

*Black and white women reported much higher levels of risk taking, defined as having sex with three or more partners, trading sex for drugs or money, or injecting drugs, than Hispanic women.

*Risk taking white women tend to expose themselves to AIDS more by injecting drugs and having sex with men who inject drugs. Black women take more direct sexual risks, like having multiple sex partners or trading sex for money or drugs.

*Older women in general are at least as likely to put themselves at risk for AIDS than younger women.


*At risk women who also are substance abusers tend to use different types of drugs, depending on their ethnicity. Black and white women say they use more marijuana and alcohol, whereas Hispanics tend to use pills, such as uppers and downers.

*A woman who uses drugs or alcohol is five times more likely to put herself at risk for contracting AIDS. For black women, the likelihood is higher.

*Women who put themselves at risk for AIDS generally do so in more than one way, say multiple sex partners and injecting drugs.

*Poor women are more likely to put themselves at risk for AIDS than women from other socio-economic groups.

The information revealed in the study should help health care workers and counselors better tailor the way they work with different at-risk groups.




