Ban On Same Sex Marriage Fails; State Hate Crimes Bill Alive And Kicking

PHOENIX - The Radical Right's homophobic attempt to circumvent legislative process to ban same-sex marriages failed this past Monday, over alleged violations of the Open Meetings Law.

The proposed ban, S.B. 1063, sponsored by Rep. Jeff Gruscost (R-Mesa). The measure would have listed same-sex marriages as one of three categories of "void and prohibited". Also the measure would have made the state of Arizona not recognize marriages that are "void and prohibited", under the section of the state statute dealing with validity and effect.

Gruscost, in an earlier interview, said, "We give certain benefits that follow marriage and the recognition of marriage. We give these benefits, by and large, because we look at it as a union that will be raising children."

Gruscost had surprised his fellow legislators by introducing the bill, a strike-off amendment, on Thursday, and scheduling the bill to be heard by the committee he chairs, the States Rights and Mandates, on Saturday, March 23. Members of the committee, had just learned about the meeting on Thursday, March 21.

Some lawmakers were angered by the lack of notice, and some said they had obligations to attend to.

Tucson State Representative, Andy Nichols (D), had a town-hall meeting which he holds in his District scheduled for March 23. Nichols said in an interview, "It would be terribly unfair to my constituents to not show up." He went on, "These are very substantive, and in some cases divisive, issues. I can't imagine a meaningful hearing, scheduled on a Saturday for each and every one of these issues."

Republicans on the committee were displeased as well. Prescott Representative Sue Lynch, said in an interview, "This is bad government. We're not supposed to things in a cave or in a shroud of secrecy." Lynch noted that the public had inadequate time to even hear of the meeting, let alone prepare for it.

So Rep. Gruscost could not get enough legislators for a quorum, so the meeting was re-scheduled for this past Monday, March 25. But when the panel met on March 25 to consider the nine quickly assembled bills, practically everybody claimed the process violated the Open Meetings Law.

The law requires notice of public meetings to be posted 24 hours before they

start. But the law also allows the State House and Senate to adopt their own rules. Arguments came from Representatives, like Flagstaff Republican John Verkamp, who said weekends can't be considered, thus the law had been broken. Arguments came from lobbyists, like Mike Evans of Common Cause, who stated the meeting violated the intent and spirit of the Open Meetings Law.

Some Democratic Representatives, Paul Newman of Bisbee, Andy Nichols of Tucson, and Kathi Foster of Phoenix took bold action and boycotted the meeting.

Rep. Gruscost went ahead and consider four bills, but later canceled the rest of the agenda, citing that he didn't think there would be a quorum if the committee re-convened. Gruscost also stated that House Speaker Mark Killian, (R-Mesa) preferred not to get into a "blood bath" in regards to the issue.

Gruscost stated that he may try again to bring up the issue of banning same-sex marriages, or the recognition of, before the Legislature adjourns, which is expected to by April 16.

The proposed statewide hate crimes ordinance, with full criminal penalties, looked all but dead this week. But a parliamentary maneuver by the bill's sponsor has greatly improved it's chances for passage.

S.B. 1078, sponsored by Tucson Senator Patti Noland (R), was a measure that included "sexual orientation" in the list of protected categories.

The bill had been approved by the: Senate Judiciary; Senate Rules; Senate Committee of the Whole; Senate-Third Reading, and the House Judiciary. The measure had made it further than any other previous attempt.

But S.B. 1078 ran into a road-block.

In an unprecedented move, House Speaker Mark Killian (R-Mesa) had assigned the bill to two committees for the measure's second reading. House Judiciary Committee and House States Rights and Mandates. Normally, a bill would receive three readings, but the unprecedented move would have made S.B. 1078 have four readings, seen by capitol insiders as an attempt to kill the bill.

S.B. 1078, as mentioned earlier, passed the House Judiciary Committee, but was stuck in States Rights, chaired by Mesa Rep. Jeff Gruscost (R).

Colorado Governor Vetoes Bill That Would Ban Same-Sex Marriages

DENVER, CO - Calling it "mean spirited and unnecessary," Gov. Roy Romer ended speculation and vetoed a bill banning recognition of same-sex marriages.

The decision came after thousands of phone calls, letters and electronic messages inundated his office. Most generated by Colorado Springs groups that supported anti-Gay rights Amendment 2 in 1992.

In vetoing the bill, Romer was quick to reassure everyone that it would change existing law that declares marriage is the union between man and woman.

"I want the people of Colorado to clearly understand that my veto does not mean that same-sex marriages will be legal in Colorado," Romer said. "Colorado law

is very clear that marriage is reserved for the union of a man and a woman."

But Romer insisted Colorado "can be pro-family, without being unfair to Gay and Lesbian people. We can reaffirm our commitment to marriage between a man and a woman without condemning those who have different relationships."

The bill, Romer said, was "simplistic and divisive, mean spirited and unnecessary."

He said he'd be willing to sign a bill that reaffirmed Colorado's existing law that marriage was between a man and a woman, provided that it set up a commission to study if legislation is needed to deal with same sex marriages. Capitol sources doubt the veto will be over-ridden.

San Francisco Hosts Wedding For G/L Couples

SAN FRANCISCO, CA - Pat and Karen Norman have been in love for 13 years. They're raising two children together and share a cozy home.

This past Monday, the church going couple finally got married, along with 175 other Lesbian and Gay couples who tied the knot at a historic mass wedding ceremony here.

A new San Francisco law, that took effect on Monday, grants Lesbian and Gay couples the right to have city-sanctioned weddings, complete with marriage certificates.

The gala wedding is the latest step in a growing effort to legalize same-sex marriages.

The weddings carry minimal legal weight since the state doesn't recognize same-sex marriages but, to the brides and grooms, the ceremony will have priceless symbolic value.

"This is a very incredible and important ritual," says Pat Norman, executive director of a health outreach program. "It shows that here in San Francisco, we have a place, and it gives hope for the future."

Hawaii's Supreme Court appears ready to legalize same-sex marriages in that state, a possibility that's prompted two dozen states to consider laws banning the practice. [See accompanying story.]

New York City and Madison, Wisconsin, already allow same-sex marriages similar to San Francisco. But nowhere has it been done with as much panache as in this liberal minded city.

There were bridesmaids and

wedding gowns, flowers and rings, and champagne and cakes. The weddings were performed at Herbst Theater in a grand French Renaissance style building near city hall.

A Gay marching band, orchestra and choral group provided the music. A Gay pride flag, stretching several blocks was on display outside.

Couples were announced one-by-one as they walked down the aisle. Mayor Willie Brown and Lesbian Supervisor Carole Migden read the vows to 18 couples at a time.

"As usual we are first," Brown told them, "and by virtue of your participating in this ceremony you are part of history."

The marriage vows weren't the traditional "till death do us." Instead, couples declared they've "chosen to share each other's lives in an intimate and committed relationship and mutual caring."

For many who have seen the AIDS epidemic ravage the Gay population, the phrase, "in sickness and in health" gained added meaning.

"It's not easy to turn your TV on when you've just buried a friend or you've stood by someone for years and then you're told that you have no values," said Randy Wendelin.

Each couple paid a \$35 marriage fee.

San Francisco Catholic Archbishop William Lewis condemned the ceremony. The Rev. Lou Sheldon of the Traditional Values Coalition, says same-sex

Senate Votes To Repeal Military AIDS Measure

WASHINGTON, D.C. (WS) - Handing a big concession to President Clinton on a politically sensitive issue, the Senate voted to repeal a controversial law requiring the Pentagon to discharge military personnel infected with the virus that causes AIDS.

The repeal was approved without debate and by voice vote as an amendment to an appropriations bill that would provide spending for the rest of this budget year to agencies that have been operating for months on temporary funding.

Before the bill can become law, House and Senate Republicans and the White House must resolve major differences over such issues as education, abortion, the environment, and the AIDS law.

The law requiring discharge of personnel found to be HIV positive was included in a defense bill that Clinton signed in February, despite his opposition to the requirement. In signing that bill, Clinton pledged to work for repeal of the discharge requirement and ordered the

Justice Department not to defend the legislation in court.

A provision to repeal the law was introduced by Sens. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., and William Cohen, R-Maine, and had gathered 54 co-sponsors in the Senate.

The repeal provision has much stiffer opposition in the House, where it could send the entire appropriations bill down to defeat.

Jimmy Carter Blasts Anti-Gay Statements Made On Campaign Trail

LOS ANGELES, CA - Former President Jimmy Carter, in a recent column in The Los Angeles Times, criticized leaders of what he called the "highly organized Christian right" for injecting anti-Gay rhetoric into the 1996 presidential campaign.

"In the early caucus contests, pressures from the more extreme religious activists have pushed almost every candidate to demagoguery, emphasizing vicious

attacks on Gay men and Lesbians ostensibly based on the teachings of Jesus Christ," Carter wrote.

Carter, noting he is a conservative Baptist, stated in his column that nearly all Protestants current condone divorce as an acceptable practice and rarely mention fornication or adultery, even though early church leaders treated homosexual acts the same as these and other biblical transgressions. He wrote that it is easier for het-

erosexual Christians "to focus on homosexuality," without acknowledging Jesus himself as a sin.

Referring to anti-Gay statements on the campaign trail, Carter wrote: "Other Christians and the general public must not condone, even by silence, these obnoxious attitudes...We must make it clear that a platform of 'I have Gay men and Lesbians,' is not a way to become president of the United States."

Troy Stephenson's Place

TUCSON - In August, Tucson will have a housing project designed especially for person with AIDS. This apartment complex will be named for Troy Stephenson who died of the disease in 1987. What sort of person was Troy? Was he an outstanding community leader?

One warm night in the spring of 1982, a bar called Joshua Tree was closing. JT's was the nucleus of Tucson's Gay activities and at 1:15 A.M., the back door of the place resembled a 747 with passengers deplaning. I stood outside against the building's brick wall and waited to see if anything interesting would happen.

As dozens of people exited the bar, my eye caught one guy in particular. He was unusually good looking and he appeared to have enjoyed one drink too many. As he walked past the crowds, he began to indiscriminately kiss people whom he obviously didn't even know. I wondered if I might become one of the lucky beneficiaries and sure enough I managed to luck out! After our few seconds of pleasure, I told him that my name was Paul and he responded that he was Troy. A brief conversation revealed that he was in need of a ride, and I offered to take him to any destination of his choosing.

I ran into Troy many times after that. Often he'd take his two attractive sisters to the bar and I'd give all three of them rides to late night parties. The more I got to know Troy, the more I admired him. Here was a gorgeous young hunk who was everything I wished I could be. Had he been so inclined, Troy could have made a lot of money as a strip dancer. How Troy actually did make his living was something that I never did find out. But on one occasion I remember paying him to clean up my dirty house.

One afternoon, I collected my mail at the Sun Station Post Office and decided to see if anything was going on at nearby Himmel Park. Seconds after I pulled into the parking lot, two young men ran up to my car. One proved to be Troy and the other was a friend that Troy had recently met. Kelly Nesbitt and Troy hit it off instantly when they realized that they were both from small towns in Wyoming. Kelly had just decided that he was Gay and had broken up with his girlfriend. He then invited Troy to move in with him. Kelly and Troy became inseparable friends. Frequently, I got invited over to their apartment.

Then, one day Troy and Kelly decided that they'd had enough of Tucson and they wanted check out life in "La La Land", as Troy called Los Angeles. As luck would have it, I happened to be at their apartment on their final night in Tucson. A rather spirited debate ensued, the topic being the appropriateness of

denoting transvestites as "Miss Thing". I just listened.

The next day, Troy and Kelly did leave for "La La Land" and I never was to see either one again.

Five years later, I was thumbing through the Observer and noticed an obituary for Troy Stephenson who had just succumbed to AIDS. Could this be the Troy that I knew in 1982? The newspaper article gave a mailing address for a newly formed AIDS coalition so I decided to send them a postcard and see if this was the same Troy.

The very next day, I received a phone call from a man with a French accent. He identified himself as Jerome Beillard and we spent about half an hour comparing notes on Troy. Jerome filled me in on how he and Troy had met in Los Angeles and had become lovers. I then suggested that Jerome try to contact Kelly and let him know what had become of his best friend. Jerome didn't seem to think there was much chance of reaching Kelly.

Over the next few years, I had several more conversations with Jerome. He offered to show me some photos that he had of Troy, but I was always too busy with business to take Jerome up on his offer.

Jerome died last October 18. On November 3, a memorial celebration was held to commemorate his life. I decided to attend. Among the memorabilia was a photo album that included the pictures of Troy that I'd wanted to see. Well, I though I wanted to see them. The Troy depicted in the photos was very different from the Troy I remembered; so different that I hardly recognized him.

This Troy was near death and the contrast was shocking. One photo showed Troy with a patch over his eye. A lady explained to me that his eye had become so badly infected that it had gone blind. The pain must have been horrible! Another photo showed Troy in a wheelchair; he looked emaciated. I left the "celebration" and headed for my car. By this point, my emotions were out of control and I began to wipe tears from my eyes. I kept asking myself how this world could be such a cruel place.

In mid-December, the "Star" carried an article about Stephenson Place and I began to wonder again about Kelly. Did he know anything about what had happened to Troy?

At the Tucson Public Library, I located a Wyoming phone book that included the town where Kelly originated. Sure enough, there was one listing for Nesbitt. When I got home, I decided that I had nothing to lose by calling that number. A lady answered. I asked here if she was related to Kelly Nesbitt. She responded that she was his mother.

"Do you have any idea how I might reach Kelly?" "That's impossible, Kelly's dead!" "Don't tell me he died of AIDS!" "That's exactly right. He died in June of 1990 at the age of 28. Kelly will always be my baby".

The saga of Troy Stephenson certainly had its element of tragedy.

"Llamas Are Smaller Than Frogs"

In presidential politics, Kansas Senator Bob "Older the dirt!" Dole, after winning the California, Nevada, and Washington primaries, officially declared he would be the GOP nominee. **BIG DEAL!**

The television commentator, and homophobic social commentator, Pat "Straight!" Buchanan hasn't ruled out a third party or independent bid, if he is shut out at the San Diego GOP convention. A possible party, the U.S. Tax Payers party, on the ballot in 20 states, and will hold their convention a day after the Republican debacle.

Another headache for Bob Dole, Texas zillionaire and raving ego maniac, H. Ross Perot, said in an television interview that he would run again for president, if the Reform party, founded by Perot, asks him to be their standard bearer at their August convention. Like that's not going to happen!

A headache for Bill Clinton, Consumer advocate Ralph "Corvair" Nader announced he will run for president this year. Nader won the Green Party Presidential Primary in California this Tuesday, and is getting seven percent in recent polls in the Golden State.

Ain't this just fun!

The United States Senate voted to repeal a controversial law requiring the Pentagon to discharge military personnel infected with the HIV virus.

The repeal was approved without debate and by voice vote. The bill had gathered 54 co-sponsors in the Senate. The repeal provisions faces an uphill battle in the House.

The Radical Right's homophobic attempt to circumvent legislative process to ban same-sex marriages [See accompanying story] in Arizona failed this past Monday.

The proposed ban, S.B. 1063, was sponsored by Rep. Jeff Groscost (R-Mesa). Groscost had surprised his fellow legislators by introducing the bill, a strike-all amendment, on Thursday, and scheduling the bill to be heard by the committee he chairs, the States Rights and Mandates, on Saturday, March 23. Members of the committee, had just learned about the meeting on Thursday, March 21.

Some lawmakers were angered by the lack of notice, and some said they had obligations to attend to. So Rep. Groscost could not get enough legislators for a quorum, so the meeting was re-scheduled for this past Monday, March 25. Several legislators boycotted the meeting, and many there argued that it violated the Open Meetings Law.

Rep. Groscost went ahead but later canceled the rest of the agenda, citing that he didn't think there would be a quorum if the committee re-convened. Groscost stated that he may try again to bring up the issue of banning same-sex marriages, or the recognition of, before the Legislature adjourns, which is expected to by April 16.

It's interesting that the religious, right-wing, Republican legislators who control the Arizona Legislature, declare us immoral and perverted, yet will not agree

to let Gays and Lesbians* in committed relationships show their love to the world, by letting them marry, even in a civil ceremony, which the state could make money off of. Can we say hypocrites! Yes, the Arizona Republican campaign slogan for the upcoming election should be, "Vote Republican, Vote Hypocrisy".

The proposed statewide hate crimes ordinance, with full criminal penalties, looked all but dead this week. But a parliamentary maneuver by the bill's sponsor has greatly improved it's chances for passage.

The bill, S.B. 1078 was stuck in States Rights, chaired by Mesa Rep. Jeff Groscost (R). Groscost seems to have his dirty hand in the cookie jar again.

Senator Noland, who in an earlier interview had vowed to "fight for the bill", had gone to House Speaker Mark Killian and asked to have the bill withdrawn from the States Rights Committee, where it was stuck, so it could be heard by House Rules. But Rep. Groscost had other ideas.

Groscost gutted S.B. 1078. Before Groscost gutted S.B. 1078, this past Thursday during the Senate Judiciary Committee, chaired by Senator Noland, she used a parliamentary maneuver to keep the proposed hate crimes bill alive.

Noland took H.B. 2050, gutted it, used it as a "strike all" bill, and turned it into a proposed hate crimes ordinance, with the exact language from S.B. 1078.


The new hate crimes bill, H.B. 2050, passed the Senate Judiciary Committee by a vote of seven to one, and goes to the Rules Committee, who according to capitol sources, will consider the bill next week.

Thus, Senator Noland, through this bold maneuver, has reduced the opposition's chances on thwarting the proposed state wide hate crimes ordinance. The opposition will have only one chance in the State House to kill H.B. 2050.

Lastly, Arizona Governor, and soon to be indicted, J. Fife Whitewash III (R-Mercado) in an interview this past week, took credit for the indictments of close associates, John Yeoman, George Leckie. Sounds like throwing meat to the wolves. But sources close to the investigation, expect the two to reveal evidence to nail Whitewash.

Is this true, or is the Spin Doctor spinning out of control?

So it goes for now kids!

our heritage. It could also be a national and international tourist attraction, which could revitalize the Castro and add substantially to the pleasures of San Francisco as a place to enjoy on foot.

How to pay for the Walk? In part by selling personalized bricks, engraved with the name of the purchaser, or in memory of a loved one, or to celebrate someone's own role model. These bricks would frame the triangle bearing the name of the man or woman to be celebrated.

The bricks would sell for \$50 or \$100 each with a certain percentage going towards an AIDS or women's health related non-profit organization. This would be a monument by, for, and about Gay and Lesbian people. Since San Francisco's Castro Street is known around the world, it's the perfect venue for such a project.

And San Francisco has three openly Gay supervisors: Tom Ammiano, Susan Leal, and Carol Migden. The new mayor, Willie Brown, Jr., has a decades long history of support for Gay and Lesbian equality.

The Walk would be a continuing project with the names from the past and those of the recent present. No living person would be commemorated. A Board of Trustees would be organized, composed of those of us who have contributed to the world and to our cause whose names would be commemorated on the Walk. The organization would be a 501(c) 3 group so that all contributions, including the cost of the bricks, would be tax deductible.

Many of the great names of the past may not be authentic heroes. Most did not broadcast their homosexuality. But they will be commemorated on the Walk with pride because of their unique contributions to the world and their time.

All helped make it possible for subsequent generations to be more open, out, and active. They may not all be household names, but they will be recorded on the Walk so that we, who follow in their footsteps, will learn from those who paved the way.

At The Movies...

This week we will review two films, "Fargo" starring W.H. Macy, Frances McDormand, Steve Buscemi and Peter Stormari and "Little Indian Big City".

First to "Fargo". Supposedly based on a true story, this film is set in North Dakota (hence the name) and Minnesota in the grips of a harsh, bleak winter. The characters move around in snowy landscapes where, with all the whiteness, it sometimes becomes impossible to tell where the land ends and the sky begins.

The story begins with the nervous and disingenuous Jerry Lundegaard (W.H. Macy), a creepy used car salesman, arranging the kidnapping of his wife. She hails from a wealthy family, and Lundegaard plans to keep most of the ransom money for himself. To achieve his ends, he selects two thugs (Buscemi and Stormari) who are not only incompetent but psychotic as well.

It is no wonder that the kidnapping plot, barely logical in the first place, soon begins to unravel. The kidnapers, with their victim in tow, are stopped by a state highway patrolman, who has the misfortune of being in the wrong place at the wrong time, and winds up quite dead.

Marge Gunderson (superbly portrayed by Frances McDormand) is the very pregnant chief of police of Brainerd, the home of the legendary Paul Bunyan, and it falls to her to solve the crime.

Margie, as her friends call her, sets about her task with a determined and patient sluggishness. Her character is very

close to caricatures, yet McDormand almost single handedly rescues the film.

It is difficult to believe that the good people of the upper Midwest are much impressed by the way they are portrayed in this movie. The characters all speak with pronounced Scandinavian accents, have a very dopey taciturn evasiveness, and fall all over themselves trying to be nice in a contrived sort of way. However, it is only here that the film approaches becomes a comedy, albeit a very dark one.

Don't look for this one to be up for an Oscar next year, but it is not bad entertainment.

"Little Indian Big City", on the other hand, is just plain fun. The film has been given to us by the French, and is reminiscent in many ways of "Crocodile Dundee."

As the movies opens, we find Steve Marchado, a Parisian future trader who is big into soy beans, in Brazil.

It seems that thirteen years earlier his wife had grown tired of the rat race that Steve was caught up in, and left him for the primitive life of the Amazon. Now he must find her and get her signature of divorce papers so he can marry his current love, Charlotte.

He is far more successful in his quest than he ever would have dreamed. Not only does he locate his wife, but he also discovers that he has a son, Meme Seku, which roughly translated means "Cat

piss"!

Meme Seku soon had his father promising that when he becomes a man, they will go to Paris. Steve is unaware of the fact that in this society a boy becomes a man at the age of 12. And, you guessed it, Meme Seku becomes a man in a special celebration the next day!

In short order, father and son are wending their way across the Atlantic. And now the fun of witnessing the clash between "primitive" and "civilized" societies begins.

Don't go to this one if you demand deep moral messages or a plot that takes abrupt twists and turns (if you can't see where this one is going, you must have gone to school on a short bus!). "Little Indian Big City" will only satisfy those who like to laugh and be silly for a short time, at least.



RESPECT YOURSELF

THE WHOLE MAN

Male and Female

My inner Woman is urging me to write this column about male and female energies inside of all of us. I've been opening to her more deeply recently, with less criticism or ridicule or subtle dismissal. She feels more respected, and I do respect her more. I'm letting her (or myself) write this column, after all!

The idea that the human soul consists of male and female energies is an ancient one. Plato believed this, the Gnostic experienced it, and in general it is associated with occult or mystical traditions the world over. Freud believed that everyone is inherently bisexual. Jung, drawing on insights from gnosticism and alchemy, drew up a full-blown theory to the effect that enlightenment consists of a passionate, all-consuming sexual relationship with one's inner opposite-sex aspect within the soul.

For a man, Jung called this figure the anima, the female within. Women, according to Jung's vocabulary, possess an inner man called an animus. These figures appear in dreams and myths, often as gods and goddesses. Jung recommended letting these inner parts of the soul speak and live and relate to the conscious ego. This is the spiritual path.

The study of sexology is interesting indeed. All human embryos start out basically female. Those of us destined to be male undergo a testosterone bath in the womb at a certain stage of uterine development, and this changes the course of the developing sexual tissues. What was becoming a clitoris and vulva becomes a penis; embryonic ovaries start developing as testes. It is easy to see that male and female are just inside-out versions of each other, with, if anything, femaleness being more basic than maleness.

This realization certainly promotes relaxation about issues of sexual orientation, and who has sex with whom. Male and female are variations on a theme. Cultural stereotypes about masculinity and femininity are so rigid and simplistic as to be laughable. Anyone should have sex with anyone one wants to, as long as each person takes responsibility for all the consequences of his/her choices.

I think it is in our experience of our own sexual attractions that we get the most vivid sense of our own basic androgyny. Speaking for myself only, I can say that some component of my sexual attractions is archetypally "female," in that it wants to be penetrated and to nurture. Other components of my sex drive are archetypally "male," in that they want to hunt and dominate others, to insert my penis and thrust away.

Is it because I'm Gay that I can

acknowledge this? Or do all people have as interestingly complex a sex drive as I do? I don't know the answer to this; others will have to talk openly about their own experience.

But I do know that being open to all the subtle facets of my sexual desires makes me richer as a person, less frustrated, more loving, more understanding.

I think that, being Gay, we have an easier point of access to some of this wisdom than some of our straight brethren. It's alright in Gay culture to be fluid in one's desires, to have the desire to be penetrated even if you are a man. We give ourselves a lot of freedom to express our eroticism, and this is a very good thing.

I wish we weren't pushed into being types quite so much, as in, "Are you a top or a bottom?" Even to say "I'm versatile" doesn't quite express what I am. It's a more fully felt, ambiguous omni-sexuality that I feel. I feel the freedom to be, not only either male or female, either top or bottom; not only both male and female (although this is already a high state of spiritual-sexual evolution), but neither male nor female!

We should forget about sex stereotyping and just let our bodies and voices flow in the ways they naturally do, when we don't interfere too much. We need more breathing room to be ourselves, not necessarily like any stereotype, butch or queen, straight-acting or kinky.

I got in touch recently with how poorly I treat my inner Woman. Growing up in a sexist society, I internalized many attitudes about women that are disrespectful, condescending, and humiliating to women themselves. I had a vivid realization recently that I treat my inner Woman according to those same attitudes, and she feels dis-respected. I'm just glad I was open enough to listen to her so that she could let me know this!

So I spoke with her within my soul, and found myself re-opening my eyes towards her, seeing interesting possibilities and talents and wisdom that she has, and that I would like to have around. I found myself respecting her sexuality as a mystery for me to learn more about. I found myself reassuring her of a safer space for her to express herself within my psyche. And then I found myself writing this column!

NEWS FROM P.A.C.T.

The following information is taken from the first issue of **A COMMON VOICE**, Feb/Mar '96, compiled by Bruce Porter.

A total of 501,310 cases have been reported to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention as of October 31, 1995. Nearly half of these cases were reported between 1993-95, while 10 percent were reported in the years between 1981 and 87, and 48 percent were reported from 1988 to 1992.

The proportion of female AIDS reports grew from 8 percent in the 1981-87 period to 18 percent during 1993 to October 1995. The rate of AIDS among European Americans fell from 60 percent to below 45 percent, yet the rate among African-Americans and Hispanics increased to 38 percent and 18 percent, respectively.

The proportion of AIDS cases among injection drug users rose from 17 percent between 1981 and 1987 to 27 percent in the most recent reporting period. A full 10 percent of the cases are attributed to heterosexual transmission, up

from three percent in the earliest reporting period.

The World Health Organization estimates that 18 million adults and 1.5 million children have been infected with HIV, resulting in approximately 4.5 million AIDS cases worldwide.

The National Research Council reported in December that the AIDS epidemic is moving as a "slow plague" in some African nations. The government advisory group said the disease will lower average life expectancy in Zambia from 66 to 33 YEARS BY THE YEAR 2010. Similarly, life expectancy in Zimbabwe could drop from 70 to 40 years, from 68 to 40 years in Kenya, and from 59 to 31 years in Uganda.

"Perhaps the most immediate argument for immediate action...is that in many parts of the region, the epidemic had not yet peaked," the report said.

My spouse received the same documents in the mail, and maybe you did too. That's the catch! These too-good-to-be true offers are often just that, with a hidden catch. I'm on one of "those" mailing lists, so I get all types of "supposed" winner's documents in the mail. Many of them require a purchase to remain in their contest, too. That's their catch when you read the fine print on the back of the winner's letter. Things aren't always what they seem to be.

When I was in college I became involved in a business for a short while. That too wasn't what it seemed to be. We were taught how to invite friends into our homes to learn about an "opportunity". That's what we were to call it. Then we'd do some demonstrations with the company's cleaning chemicals and products and convince our friends to also sign up to sell it. The more friends you signed up the more money you'd be making. That was a short-lived business for me. Not a single friend signed up, and I saw the catch there finally. Even the friend who initially-signed me up left the business after reaching a high level in the pyramid. Once again, there was a catch to that "get rich quick" offer!

Some people view Christianity with the same wariness that they give the sweepstakes offers. "It's too good to be true, it's for others, not for me, no one could believe a story like the Bible, why would Jesus died for me, only old people need it, it requires too much commitments, etc., etc., etc." I thought of some of those reasons before I became a Christian myself. I knew there had to be a catch to it.

At first I'd heard that if you became a Christian you'd become kind of weird. I knew some Christians, and they were different. And those of us who weren't Christians would laugh at them. What did they do for fun? They weren't getting drunk or stoned like us, they didn't sleep around like us, they didn't tell the same kinds of jokes. They were different. What I didn't understand is that Christians are called to live a life that is different. Oh sure, none of us reach that all of the time, but we're supposed to.





SAN FRANCISCO, CA - The Gay and Lesbian Medical Association, declared that unprotected male/male oral sex should now be classified as a low-risk activity for HIV.

Its position statement, supported by 36 scientific references, acknowledges that a few documented cases of HIV transmission through oral sex have been reported. Nonetheless, notes the statement, "most studies have not found a statistically identifiable risk," and thus prevention efforts should focus explicitly on unprotected anal intercourse.

Failure to focus on anal intercourse is dangerous, warns the group:

"Education that equivocates about the type of sex being discussed is confusing and potentially harmful because it implies that oral sex is equivalent in risk to anal sex," it counsels.

"We recognize that our statement will be controversial, but we believe there is a public health imperative to advocate this approach for the overall health of sexually active Gay men," said GLMA Executive Director Benjamin Schatz. "The confusion and mixed messages surrounding oral sex are harming our efforts to encourage Gay men to make rational choices about truly risky behavior. We hope that preventative programs that cur-



marriages are wrong because "it's impossible for homosexuals to truly bond."

But Lesbian and Gay couples don't see it that way.

Karen took Pat's last name when they had their own private wedding 12 years ago.

Three year old Zach Norman, thinks the setup between Pat and Karen Norman is great. "Mom and Mommy love each other, and they're already married," says Zach, conceived through artificial insemination.

For many couples, the wedding is a dream come true.

"I'm so excited," says Jerry Windley, who will marry Ted Knapp, his partner of two years. "This will be a special day, when we can show the world we're just like anyone else, that our bonds go as deep as heterosexuals."

"It's such a wonderful change for the Gay community to be getting together to celebrate life and love, rather than getting together for the funeral of yet another friend who has died of AIDS," Knapp says.

For Carole Migden, an openly Lesbian city supervisor, said that the fight to recognize Gay unions was "paving the way for tangible benefits in the future," including immigration rights, child custody rights and tax benefits.

Given the resistance among the various state legislators, any change will come slowly, if at all. But 300 happy honeymooners did not seem to care.

interview had vowed to "fight for the bill", went to House Speaker Mark Killian and asked to have the bill withdrawn from the States Rights Committee so it could be heard by House Rules. But Rep. Gruscot had other ideas.

Gruscot gutted S.B. 1078, using it as one of his nine "strike all" bills, turning it into a clean air measure, which was approved by the States Rights Committee.

But before Gruscot gutted S.B. 1078, this past Thursday during the Senate Judiciary Committee, chaired by Senator Noland, she used a parliamentary maneuver to keep the proposed hate crimes bill alive.

Noland took H.B. 2050, gutted it, used it as a "strike all" bill, and turned it into a proposed hate crimes ordinance, with the exact language from S.B. 1078. The new hate crimes bill, H.B. 2050, passed the Senate Judiciary Committee by a vote of seven to one, and goes to the Rules Committee, who according to capitol sources, will consider the bill next week.

But, the parliamentary maneuver, "strike all", is where a bill can be gutted, new language inserted, and if one legislative house approves the bill, it goes to the other house for a straight vote of concurrence. If approved by the other body, it goes to the governor's desk. If not, a conference committee meets to reach a compromise.

Thus, Senator Noland, through this bold maneuver, has reduced the opposition's chances on thwarting the proposed state wide hate crimes ordinance.

recently characterize male/male oral sex as 'high risk' or 'somewhat risky' will revise their materials accordingly."

"Prevention education must consistently acknowledge the essential importance of sexual intimacy for Gay men," noted GLMA Policy Committee Chair Alvin Novick, MD, a biology professor at Yale University. "Rather than attempting to impose an unrealistic zero-risk standard on all people, our prevention efforts should focus on reducing risk overall by helping each individual learn how to maximize fulfillment and minimize risk."

The GLMA statement notes that avoiding ejaculation in the mouth or using condoms can further reduce the low risk of oral-genital sex, but cautions against widely counseling condom use for oral sex. "Pushing condom usage for oral sex may actually be counterproductive in some case," warns Novick. "It may make some people feel that they have so few options that the don't want to use condoms, period. As a community we need to focus on unprotected anal intercourse and let each individual make an educated choice about

oral sex."

The GLMA statement was prepared only after an exhaustive review of the medical literature and of studies of Gay male sexual behavior. It calls for further research on the risks of oral sex, particularly in contexts in which risks may be higher: when there is significant mouth pathology, the presence of STD's, the use of pain masking drugs, or concentrated episodes of repeated or traumatic sex. "Under these special circumstances condom use should be recommended to lower risk," the group advises.

TUCSON - Tucson's Gay Mentor Project is underway! An advisory committee, made up of Gay adults and Gay youth, have laid plans for the program and are currently seeking volunteer applicants to become mentors.

In addition to the application and screening process, mentors must complete an 8 hour training. This training will deal with adolescent development, youth issues, substance abuse prevention, crisis intervention, safer sex negotiation and communication skills.

Lesbian and Gay professionals will lead the training. The first training will take place on Wednesdays, April 17, April 24 and May 1, from 7-10 P.M. at the PACT for Life offices.

The program is also seeking mentees. If you are a Gay or Bisexual young man, age 16-25, and are looking for guidance, support, or just a friend, the Gay Mentor Project may be for you.
